

New Archbishop of Liverpool appointed

Pope Francis has appointed Bishop John Sherrington as the next Roman Catholic Archbishop of Liverpool.

Bishop Sherrington will transition from the Diocese of Westminster to succeed the Rt Rev Malcolm McMahon OP, who has held the position since May 2014.

Reflecting on his appointment, Bishop John said he looks forward to "serving as shepherd of the historic and faithfilled Church in the Archdiocese of Liverpool, which is rich in its heritage of the English martyrs, Irish immigration, and now looks to the future."

Archbishop McMahon submitted his resignation to the Pope last summer, having reached the age of 75, the typical retirement age for bishops.

On X, the Archbishop of Westminster, Cardinal Vincent Nichols, expressed his pleasure at Bishop John's appointment. "Liverpool is, of course, my home diocese, and I am delighted that it is to be led by Bishop John. In Westminster, we know his gifts, dedication, and utter generosity only too well. We will miss him greatly.

"Today, we offer our profound thanks to Bishop John for all that he has given to us over these last fourteen years, and we assure him, wholeheartedly, of our prayers and constant support. And, of course, we continue to hold Pope Francis very much in our prayers too," he wrote.

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Archbishop Malcolm McMahon OP also commented: "We are receiving a new Archbishop with considerable gifts, talents, and skills, but most of all, we are receiving a man of deep prayer who loves the Lord Jesus and who loves His Church. I have had the pleasure to serve with Archbishopelect Sherrington in the Diocese of Nottingham and in the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, and I am delighted to welcome him today."

Archbishop-elect Sherrington will be officially installed at Liverpool's Metropolitan Cathedral on May 27.

'Death will come to us all': Bishop of Manchester reveals cancer diagnosis

The Bishop of Manchester has publicly shared that he is undergoing treatment for prostate cancer, which was discovered through a routine blood test.

The Rt Rev Bishop Walker, 67, is currently receiving care at The Christie Hospital in Manchester and says his prognosis is positive due to early detection.

"I am feeling well at the moment and have shown no signs of the disease," he told BBC Radio Manchester. "My prognosis is pretty good as they have caught it early which was the result of having the test done before I had any symptoms."

Reflecting on his diagnosis, Bishop Walker said the news prompted a deeper awareness of his own mortality and strengthened his spiritual perspective.

"It reaffirmed my Christian faith and made me feel closer to Jesus," he said. "Death will come to us all."

A father of two who was ordained in 1983, Bishop Walker added that he hasn't needed time off work, though he is managing some fatigue.

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer in men in the UK, with over 52,000 cases diagnosed each year.





Tom Hanks reads poem by Dietrich Bonhoeffer

The Sanctuary Foundation have released a video to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the death of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, just weeks before the end of the Second World War.

Bonhoeffer was deeply concerned about those suffering because of war. He not only helped those who were fleeing, but also challenged the Nazi regime about its xenophobic stance against immigrants living in their country. Six million Jews and other minorities and critics were executed in the war - Dietrich Bonhoeffer was one of them.

Tom Hanks, Hollywood legend, features in this video narrating a poem Bonhoeffer wrote shortly before his death.

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Clearly suffering from anxiety and self-doubt, it is a poignant reflection on identity, humanity and faith.

You can also hear the poem on this week's BBC Radio 4 special Sunday service recorded at the Bonhoeffer Church in London led by the Bishop of Chelmsford Guli Francis-Dehqani and Dr Krish Kandiah, to mark the 80th anniversary of the execution of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. The recording of that programme will be available for the next 28 days.

BBC interview shows tragedy of Welby -Angela Tilby in Church Times

There has been much criticism of the Rt Revd Justin Welby for saying, in a BBC interview with Laura Kuenssberg, that he "forgives" John Smyth.

In reality, his comments were much more nuanced. Watching the whole interview, I found it impossible not to be moved as he sat still like a prisoner, or at least a penitent, as, for nearly 40 minutes, Ms Kuenssberg politely but firmly hammered in the nails, and, again and again, he expressed profound sorrow at the safeguarding failures that led to his resignation last November.

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There has been much tragedy in Bishop Welby's life: an unhappy childhood, the death of his own child in infancy, and a depressive tendency that runs through the family. Towards the end of the interview, he expressed a longing for the obscurity of private life.

It left me wondering whether the greatest tragedy of his life was to have been appointed Archbishop of Canterbury. It was, after all, an unlikely appointment. He had only recently become Bishop of Durham; he was a late ordinand, having previously worked in the oil industry, and he was initially turned down for ordination.

But he was also an Evangelical with Charismatic leanings, and had worked briefly at Holy Trinity, Brompton. The everpowerful Evangelical networks chose him as their man, trusting him to promote their particular vision of mission and growth, which he did, as far as he could, setting the Church on a path of rewarding church-planting and innovation over traditional parish ministry. In the interview, rather touchingly, he claimed that the Church was actually growing, a claim for which there is, sadly, limited evidence.

In his years as Archbishop, he gradually outgrew his initial supporters. One of the most moving parts of the interview was when he spoke of conducting the funeral for the late Queen. Suddenly, it was as though he "got it": he understood what it meant for the C of E to be the national Church. As his archiepiscopate went on, he upset the Evangelical lobbies and a substantial part of the Anglican Communion over gay relationships, greatly overestimating his ability to bring them on board.

For all his well-earned reputation as a reconciler, he never really had the bandwidth to cope with the demands of those who had promoted him and expected him to toe the line. But then this was the central dilemma of his episcopate. He is a product of the Iwerne camps, with their repressed homoeroticism and, in some quarters, disregard for the wider Church of England. It was his misfortune to have come from the same stable as the serial abuser Smyth.

Plain Bishop Welby, in his blue open-necked shirt, has carried the can not only for safeguarding errors, but for the whole theology that has been used to mould the C of E into its image and is now exposed as theologically and morally bankrupt.
