Thy Kingdom Come 2024 - insight from Churches Together in England

This worldwide call to prayer takes place between Ascension and Pentecost from 9 May to 19 May this year.

Thy Kingdom Come is a global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray for more people to come to know Jesus. This year it spans from 9 to 19 May, from Ascension to Pentecost.



Since it began in May 2016, Thy Kingdom Come (TKC) has developed into a movement which unites more than a million Christians in prayer, in nearly 90% of countries worldwide, across 85 different denominations and traditions – so that friends and family, neighbours and colleagues might come to faith in Jesus Christ. Every person, household and church is encouraged to pray during the 11 days in their own way.

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell said: "The disunity of the church is a scandal! During Thy Kingdom Come 2024 pray that the Spirit may make Jesus's prayer for unity amongst his disciples a reality. I encourage churches

of all denominations to join together and pray together as a visible witness to our common faith. I'm particularly looking forward to joining young people on Pentecost Sunday and many others online as we make our prayer: Thy Kingdom Come!"

How can I get involved?

Thy Kingdom Come also provides a great opportunity to bring Christians together in ecumenical prayer events online and in villages, towns, and cities. For example, Rev Dr Ben Aldous, CTE's Principal Officer for Mission and Evangelism is speaking at the TKC Beacon Event in Exeter Cathedral. He's joining Dr Ruth Valerio from Tearfund (a Charity and Network in Association with CTE), Andy Flannigan from Christians in Politics and the Rt Rev Jackie Searle, the Acting Bishop of Exeter. Another local event is being held by Churches Together in Haverhill, Suffolk where there is a "God Loves You" – Balloon Give Away on Pentecost Sunday.

Find out what is happening in your area via the Thy Kingdom Come events listing. And why not list your church or Churches Together event?

There are also many resources to encourage personal, family and church prayer. This year's new resources include an ecumenical prayer journal, which has contributions from Orthodox, Catholic, Methodist, Elim Pentecostal and Baptist voices as well as those from within the Church of England. The beautiful illustrations in the journal are by Baptist Minister Rev Chris Duffett.

Other resources to help inspire prayer this year are a novena, videos and reflections and also specific resources for children, young people and families. More information can be found on the TKC website. Many of them are free of charge (postage costs apply).

'It's Jesus, not me' says Scottie Scheffler after second Masters win

Golf's Masters champion Scottie Scheffler has said his Christian faith keeps him grounded.

The golfer won the tournament at the weekend for the second time, by four-shots at Augusta National, finishing on 11-under par.

But speaking at a press conference he said being a Christian defines him rather than being a golfer.

"I'm a faithful guy," he said. "I believe in a creator. I believe in Jesus. ... I feel like I've been given a platform to compete and show my talent. It's not anything that I did...

"I've been called to come out here, do my best, compete and glorify God."

He admitted that he craved victory but said being a Christian gives him a sense of perspective:

"I was sitting around with my buddies this morning. I was a bit overwhelmed because I told them I wish that I didn't want to win as badly as I did. Or as badly as I do. I think it would make the mornings easier, but I love winning. I hate losing. I really do. And when you're here in the biggest moments

when I'm sitting there with a lead on Sunday, I really, really want to win badly.

"And my buddies told me this morning, you know, my victory was secure on the cross. And that's a pretty special feeling. To know that I'm secure for forever and it doesn't matter. You know whether or not I win this tournament or if I lose this tournament, you know, my identity is secure for forever."

Scheffler who secured his four-shot victory over Sweden's Ludvig Aberg, last won The Masters in 2022 and he tied in tenth place last year.

The 27-year-old who is expecting his first child with his wife, Meredith, said his home life also keeps him grounded:

"All I can think about is getting home. It is a special time for us. I will go home, soak in this victory and enjoy the birth of my first child. I am looking forward to celebrating with Meredith - it's been a long week without her.

"My priorities will change very soon. My son or daughter will be the main priority, along with my wife, so golf will now be probably fourth in line."

Pastor admits robbing Kildare church of €125k after 'road to Damascus type moment' - Sunday World

Taxi driver and preacher who 'dipped his hand into the church's purse' confronted over thefts

A pilfering pastor who fleeced his church out of more than €125,000 claimed to gardai he confessed after experiencing a 'road to Damascus type moment'.

But, Naas Circuit Court heard this week that when Ebenezer Oduntan confessed his crimes, the plundering preacher had already been confronted by a fellow church official and forced to admit 'dipping his hand into the church purse'.

A part-time taxi-driver, Oduntan (58) held the position of pastor at the City of David Church in Naas from 2012 to 2020, during which time he had sole access and control of the finances.

At a sentencing hearing on Wednesday, prosecutor Seoirse O Dunlaing detailed to Judge Martina Baxter how, during this time, Oduntan stole €52,000 from the church via a Credit Union account and another €75,000 through the issuance of blank cheques. Among the illegal payments subsequently discovered were disbursements to cover Oduntan's own personal health insurance plan and a payment of over €1,650 to a childcare service run by Oduntan and his partner.

The father-of-four was convicted last month of 73 counts of theft, five counts of deception and nine company law offences.
