Book of condolence opened in Belfast City Hall

The Lord Mayor of Belfast has led tributes to Pope Francis as a book of condolence was opened in Belfast City Hall for the pontiff.

Micky Murray opened the book alongside Father Tim Bartlett, who was the principal organiser of the late Pope's visit to Ireland in 2018.

Speaking as he signed it, the Lord Mayor said: "I was saddened to hear of the death of Pope Francis just a day after he gave his final Easter blessing at St Peter's Square on Sunday.

"We extend our sympathies and condolences to all those who are mourning Pope Francis's death.

"We can all reflect on the way Pope Francis worked to bring people together from different backgrounds through mutual respect and understanding."

A special council meeting has been organised to allow members to pay tribute to Pope Francis and reflect on his legacy.

The meeting will take place today at 5pm

The city hall will also be illuminated in yellow and white on Saturday evening to pay tribute to the late pope, who passed away on Easter Monday after a period of illness.



Lectionary Revision Workshop hosted by Indian churches

The Church of South India hosted the sixth phase of the Lectionary Revision Workshop of the Liturgical and Theological Committee of the Communion of Churches in India (CCI) on April 22 and 23, 2025, at the CSI Synod Centre, Chennai.




This significant ecumenical workshop brought together representatives from the Church of North India (CNI), the Mar Thoma Syrian Church (MTC), and the Church of South India (CSI) to collaboratively engage in the revision of the Common Lectionary used across the member churches of the Communion.

The primary goal of the workshop was to ensure that the shared lectionary maintains liturgical relevance and theological depth, rooted in the realities and spirituality of the Indian context.

The Department of Pastoral Concerns of the CSI played a pivotal role in coordinating and facilitating the sessions, providing space for mutual learning, theological reflection, and ecumenical engagement.

The gathering reaffirmed the churches' shared commitment to a common liturgical life and united witness, emphasizing the value of ecumenical cooperation and contextual theology in the shaping of worship that speaks to the hearts and lives of Indian congregations.



An honour, he was very personable: Belfast city priest on meeting with pope

Belfast priest Fr Martin Magill has recalled meeting a "personable" Pope Francis as part of a pilgrimage to Rome in 2022, writes Gabrielle Swan in the Belfast Telegraph.

The St John's the Evangelist parish priest also believes the pope may have been "holding on" to celebrate one final Easter before he passed.

The Argentinian native died after battling a respiratory illness for two months.

He made a TV appearance on Easter Sunday to give blessings to those gathered in Rome.

"I have had the experience, as a priest of 37 years, that some people do 'hold on'. It's as if they're waiting for a certain moment," said Fr Magill.

"There is a sense that if there was a time to go, it would be Easter time, the celebration of Easter Sunday. Easter is the most important time of the year, so there is something very appropriate about it."

As part of an inter-faith pilgrimage to Rome, Fr Magill recalls meeting Pope Francis.

"There is a whole sense of his humanity, compassion and generosity. I would also add in humour as well, his sense of joy.

"But the humanity — he had a real ability to relate to people.

"He was very much concerned for the world and in particular for the poor. I think in choosing the name Francis of Assisi [after St Francis of Assisi, who devoted his life to the poor], that would have been really important as well.

"My friend Rev Steve Stockman, who is a Presbyterian minister, he and I are the co-founders of Four Corners Festival, promoting peace and reconciliation. We met [Pope Francis], along with a group from the Catholic chaplaincy, a group of students and their leaders, in his private library in Rome.

"He was very personable... he handed the room over to us to ask questions.

"He added that he found the experience 'lovely, so positive'.

"It really was such an honour to meet him... he was excellent with us, answering our questions. We had about an hour of his time. He greeted us at the door, though he was in considerable pain."

Bob Dylan's tribute to Pope Francis, on his passing today at age 88.

"Pope Francis was a voice of mercy in a time of noise. He walked with humility, spoke with fire, and dared to love the unloved. He reminded the world that compassion isn't weakness, and faith doesn't have to shout to be heard. May he rest in the eternal peace he so often preached."
