Meet Up Tuesdays project a hit in Ardkeen local community

Meet Up Tuesdays is a new outreach project at Christ Church Ardkeen that is already attracting people of all ages from the local community.

The drop-in began in late February and is initially to run for 3 months, but it's going from strength to strength with 19 folks coming along last week to enjoy crafts, chat, and light refreshments.

Diocesan Lay Reader, Melanie Houston, is helping to lead the church, and is very encouraged by the response.

"We're seeing all age groups drop into the hall on Tuesdays-



women and men – including a gentleman who is learning to knit as he has wanted to for years! It's especially encouraging that around half of those attending don't belong to Ardkeen. We've also found that the project is strengthening bonds among those who do come to church."

What is Meet Up Tuesdays?

Each Tuesday from 10.30–12.30 the church hall is open and local people welcomed to drop in for conversation, refreshments, and the opportunity to begin crafting projects, all free of charge. It's an opportunity to make new friends and explore new interests.

There are several crafters among the six volunteers who can teach the basics to get people started, and if crafting isn't your thing, you are more than welcome to drop in for a cuppa and a chat. There's also a book nook where books can be browsed or borrowed or donated and a play corner with toys and art materials for young children.

Melanie continues:

"At the heart of this project is our desire to show the love of the Lord Jesus in action, so that those who do not already know Him may be drawn to Him, and those who have drifted away from the Lord may come to walk more closely with Him.

"Meet Up Tuesdays is all about planting seed. We are starting with a small allotment, but our hope is, that with God's help, there will be growth and development. The workers are few, but we will plant and water, knowing that it is God who gives the increase."

Scottish cathedral marks 800th anniversary with special malt whisky

To commemorate the 800th anniversary of the laying of the first foundation stones of Dornoch Cathedral, a unique cask of malt whisky has been filled.

Dubbed 'Cathedral Spirit,' this special whisky was set aside on 1st April, St Gilbert's Day, and aged for 15 years in storage.

Scheduled to be uncorked and bottled in 2039, it will coincide with the 800th anniversary of worship services commencing at Scotland's smallest operational cathedral.

Profits from the sale of bottles will be put towards the upkeep of the building, which has three stained glass windows, donated in memory of the Scottish/American industrialist Andrew Carnegie, who often holidayed at his Skibo estate nearby.

Rt Rev Sally-Foster-Fulton, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, is expected to visit Dornoch Distillery to observe the cask being put aside.

Dornoch Cathedral's history is marked by turmoil, including a devastating fire in 1570 and desecration of Gilbert's tomb during a clan feud between the Murrays of Dornoch and the Mackays of Strathnaver.

This week's portrait by Harry R Douglas (1862-1934) is entitled RG McCrum Esq, JP, DL (1909).

Robert Garmany McCrum (1828-1915) was a successful linen manufacturer and owned the company McCrum, Watson and Mercer. He built the mill village of Milford beside his factory which employed hundreds of workers and he was a prominent member of several public bodies including Armagh County Council. He also gave generous financial



support to the First Armagh Presbyterian church where there is a stained glass window to his memory. (36.1973).

Hot Press - Irish-German sculptor Imogen Stuart dies at age 96

Imogen Stuart was a prominent figure in Irish sculpture, known for her distinctive works adorning churches and public spaces across Ireland, Dylan Cardona writes for Hot Press.

a pioneering female artist and one of Ireland's leading sculptors, has died. Born in Berlin in 1927, Imogen Stuart's artistic legacy spans over seven decades, leaving a lasting mark on Ireland's cultural landscape. Her remarkable career saw her creating an extensive array of sculptures, each bearing her unique and expressive style.

Moving to Ireland in 1949 after marrying Ian Stuart, Imogen Stuart's art was influenced by both her German heritage and the artistic traditions of her adopted homeland. Throughout her career, Stuart's sculptures blended German expressionism and native Irish art, culture and beliefs.

Stuart's works decorated numerous churches and public spaces, including the Angel of Peace at St Teresa's Carmelite Church in Dublin, the ornate doors of Galway Cathedral, and the iconic Flame of Human Dignity in Paris.

In a post on X, Dublin Castle wrote: "Today (25th March, 2024) marks the death of Imogen Stuart, the German-Irish sculptor. She was one of Ireland's best known sculptors with work in public and private collections throughout Europe and the U.S.

Recently Dublin Castle (OPW) hosted the IMOGEN exhibition in the Coach House Gallery (November 2023 -February 2024) which exhibited the diverse range and breadth of Stuart's work over seven decades.

We are very sad to hear of her death, but honoured to have displayed some of her remarkable work on site."

Stuart was honoured with membership of Aosdána and the title of Saoi in 2015. Her last major design was unveiled in May 2022, and is a granite standing stone, Stele, carved by Ciaran Byrne, on a hillock adjacent to the Forty Foot in Sandycove with carved representations of King Laoghaire and St Patrick on two sides.

That work was officially unveiled by President Michael D Higgins. Opening a 2022 retrospective of her work in Mary Immaculate College, Limerick, Mr Higgins said: "As a nation we can be deeply grateful to Imogen for her great spirit of generosity and for the rich wealth of public art which has so enhanced our society and our shared environment."

President Higgins said Ms Stuart made "a singular contribution to the enrichment of the lives of so many throughout Irish society, not only through her inspiring and challenging work, but by her committed vision of art as an essential public good, something that must for that very reason be accessible and available to the public.

"As a nation, we are all deeply indebted to Imogen for this great spirit of generosity and for the rich wealth of public art which she has left us and which, not only for our generation, has so enhanced our society and our shared environment, but will give joy to future generations," he said.

President Higgins said he and his wife were fortunate to call Imogen a friend "for many years" and that the couple have always been "fervent admirers, not only of her work, but of this generosity of spirt to which I refer that has ensured that her beautiful sculptures have become firmly rooted in the public space to be shared by all.

"Not only on behalf of Sabina and myself, but on behalf of all who will continue to encounter her work, may I express my deepest condolences to Imogen's daughters Aisling and Aoibheann, and to all of her family and many friends," he added.
