Image of the day - Sam goes to church

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


"What a blessing as the parish in Armagh welcomed Sam Maguire to Mass in the Cathedral such a blessed week for the community and a great sense of joy for everyone".







Church leaders respond to recent acts of racial violence and discrimination



@Bishop of Down & Connor, Alan McGuckian SJ - In recent days, we have witnessed disturbing scenes of violence, rioting and protest, often motivated by Islamophobia, xenophobia and racism, organised and mobilised by social influencers. It is particularly concerning that some individuals and groups have deliberately used the recent attack in Southport, in which three children lost their lives and many others injured, to misinform and inflame fear within the local community and beyond.

It has come to my attention that there are also those in Northern Ireland, often cloaked with the anonymity of social media, that are similarly stoking the coals of fear and mistrust against Muslims.

Particularly in Northern Ireland, we have journeyed so far from a history of conflict and live now in a place that is rightly moving towards mutual respect, dialogue and tolerance. There is no place for racism and sectarianism in a modern civil society. Those who promote mistrust and fear do not speak in the name of Christianity.

Standing in solidarity and seeking an honest dialogue with our sisters and brothers from different cultures and religions is the only authentic Christian way forward.

I make an appeal calling for all to remain calm, to seek peace and to promote community harmony. Let us not be influenced by messengers of fear and misinformation.

Read novels and poems says Pope Francis

Pope Francis, who taught literature at a Jesuit school in the 1960s, has written a letter on why future priests (and all believers) must read novels & poems.

Francis says it is "unhealthy" that many training programmes see literature as "non-essential", and points out that "before our unremitting exposure to social media, mobile phones and other devices, reading was a common experience."

The pope says literature is an antidote to an "obsession with 'screens' and with toxic, superficial and violent fake news," and opens "new interior spaces."

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Update from The Quills in Sudan

The Reverend Andrew and Mrs Joanne Quill write - We are currently preparing to teach in the local Bible college (Bishop Levi College) every Tuesday starting next week.

Things can be frustratingly slow here. However we found out that the reason few of the students had turned up for the start of term was because they were "footing it" on overgrown roads in the rainy season, some walking more than 50 miles!

Andrew will be teaching 'Biblical Interpretation and Homiletics' (preaching) to the 5 theology students intraining, and Joanne will be teaching 'Healing the Wounds of Trauma' to them and other church leaders. She will be taking them through a healing group for their own healing and then equipping them to facilitate healing groups.




The parish church Sion Mills

It is lovely to have a team of 3 men: Rev Dennis, Stephen, and Niall, from Ahoghill/Portglenone in Northern Ireland here in Ibba for 10 days. The parish have recently partnered with Ibba Diocese through CMSI.

They have been such a blessing. At the VTC, they have been teaching welding and brought a rechargeable welding machine. They have seen the struggles on site of sourcing materials, transporting materials if not locally available, and having enough electricity from solar power, especially after a dull day! Rev Dennis has been teaching every day in the morning service, and he and Niall have been visiting schools and projects within the diocese, while Stephen teaches welding.

We are going to begin CHE training on a smaller scale, beginning at the cathedral, starting on 17th August (while we await funding). We trust this is all in God's wonderful timing. Finances are needed for food (when training all-day over a few days), training materials, and transport of certain materials for training on a larger scale, but once trained and running in their own communities, it should be self-sustaining.

We thoroughly enjoyed sharing in fellowship at Nazereth Parish just 1.2 km away. Andrew had the privilege to preach. They were having a fundraising for a new church building to replace the mud, wood, and grass structure. They have already completed the foundation.



We are also looking forward to a pastor's fellowship on 8th & 9th August, where all the serving pastors and Diocesan staff will come together for fellowship and teaching. Pray for us as we share, facilitate, and participate.

You'll see from the photo that our work permits are finally in our hands. Just got them last Tuesday! Now we just have to get another work visa and our alien registration renewed, which needs to be done every 6 months! Such is the life of an 'alien' in South Sudan

Laudato Si' and Trócaire launch parish resources for 2024 Season of Creation

Laudato Si' Working Group of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference, and Trócaire, the overseas development charity of the Catholic Church in Ireland, have published the 2024 Season of Creation resources on the theme: To Hope and Act with Creation.

The Season of Creation runs from 1 September to 4 October, the Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi, who is the patron saint of the environment and ecology.

There is now a full page of resources available on the Bishops' Conference website catholicbishops.ie. These resources are specifically developed to support parish Care for Creation groups, Liturgy Groups, Parish Pastoral Councils and youth groups.

The resources include:

A guide for the five Sundays of the Season of Creation with suggested homily notes, content for prayer of the faithful, ideas for music and activities to bring this year's theme to life in every parish; a colourful leaflet with helpful tips on

biodiversity, a 'rubbish graveyard' display, a Creation Walk, a service for the Blessing of Pets on 4 October.

The Season of Creation has a special significance for the Church, particularly since Pope Francis established 1 September in 2015 as an annual World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation. The Season is marked throughout the Christian world to celebrate the joy of creation as well as encouraging awareness-raising initiatives to protect the natural environment.

Launching this year's resources Jane Mellett, Church Manager for Trócaire said, "we hope that this content and material will help parishes communities to celebrate the Season of Creation 2024. The resources have benefited from valuable feedback from the Laudato Si' Working Group, and from Trócaire, and can be accessed here" Ms Mellett concluded, "May this Season of Creation inspire us all to live 'our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork' (Laudato Si', 217)."

In their joint statement for the Season of Creation 2024, Pope Francis, the Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew and Archbishop Justin Welby of Canterbury said, "future generations will never forgive us if we miss the opportunity to protect our common home. We have inherited a garden; we must not leave a desert for our children."

Unique book sale towards maintenance of Culdaff's St Buadan's Church

Culdaff's St Buadan's Church which dates back to the 1740s is to host unique book sale.

St Buadan's Church of Ireland is holding a book sale on Saturday, August 10 at 3pm of items from the collection of Bruce and Wallace Clark.


The sale will include specialist religious books, as well as books on political history and literature.

Rachel McLaughlin of Donegal Daily wrote the following of a recent event - "A captivating journey through time unfolded in Culdaff this week as locals and visitors gathered to learn about the village's patron saint...

22nd July, the feast day of St. Buadàn, was aptly chosen by Culdaff Development Association and Tidy Towns as a day to invite interested public to find out more about the cult of Culdaff's patron saint, and to explore the history of the village and area, hidden in plain sight.

Led by local historian and member of Culdaff and Cloncha Heritage Group, Neil McGrory, the audience of over 30 locals and visitors were treated to a rich explanation and exploration of the early medieval history of Culdaff.

An important artefact and tangible evidence of the village as a monastic site is the bell of St. Buadàn. A copper hand-bell which is estimated to be from the 7th or 8th century and which, remarkably has not left the parish of Culdaff in 1300 years. One of nearly a hundred hand bells that have been preserved in Ireland, the bell of St. Buadàn is a significant relic in the stories of the Early Irish saint and has played a role in the feast day and cult of St. Buadàn throughout the years.



The talk in the Wee Hall, led to a small Turas or pilgrimage, around sites of interest in the village. The first, Ardmore Graveyard, which is significant as a possible site of an early Christian church founded by St. Buadàn, and part of a site linked to the Church of Ireland church. Then Neil took the

group to the Culdaff River to the site of the steps and holy well. Although high tide covered the rock known as St. Buadàn's boat the role of the river, as a key transport route to Scotland, and as part of the sacred monastic complex was explored.

The last site, of the Turas, was the Church of Ireland church. Beside the river, its location suggests that it has been the site of religious importance prior to the establishment of the current building. The chairperson of the Culdaff Development Association, George Mills, provided background to the dedications on the walls of the church bringing the group into the more recent past of the village.

Leading the St. Buadan's Feast Day event to the Church of Ireland church in Culdaff Village.

The event was made possible through the Culture & Creativity Project Scheme Award 2024 awarded to the Culdaff Development Association by the Donegal County Council and Creative Ireland. The success of the St. Buadàn's Feast Day event has encouraged the local organisers to plan further events for August and September. Neil McGrory, from Culdaff and Cloncha Heritage Group commented "The inaugural Turas Buadàn event will hopefully reawaken interest in Culdaff's monastic heritage and help us toward securing support for the restoration of the ancient stone steps and the Holy Well at Culdaff River."

He added, "the large turnout and community interest underpins the local engagement and appreciation

of our unique heritage dating back to the sixth century. The restoration process could provide an important new location to add to the heritage sites of Inishowen."
