

Garda action in Carlow highlights CPR and defibrillator

In the early hours last week, Gardaí were on patrol in Carlow town when they were flagged down about a young woman who was out socialising with friends and had suddenly become unconscious - she urgently needed help.

It was clear right away to Garda Tommy O'Loughlin and Student Garda Matthew Forrest that the woman was unresponsive and not breathing.

While Student Garda Forrest immediately began CPR on the woman, Garda O'Loughlin went to grab a nearby defibrillator.

Taking it in turns, Garda O'Loughlin and Student Garda Forrest continued CPR for eight minutes, and liaised with emergency services over the phone.

Just as the ambulance arrived, the woman began to breathe again but with great difficulty. Luckily, ambulance personnel

stabilised her condition and brought her to hospital for treatment.

It was a big relief for all of us working in the station in Carlow, to hear from the young woman and her mother that she has been released from hospital and is resting up following a serious medical episode.

In training, we're taught to stay calm and composed in emergency but for two members very much settling into their roles in policing, they've shown enormous skill and ability to think quick and as an efficient team.



Supporting your child's transition to secondary school



Talk About the changes to expect

Discuss the changes in routine including timetables, new classes and subjects. Prepare your child for these adjustments, emphasising that it's a normal part of growing up and learning.

Help them develop their organisational Skills

Help your child develop organisational skills, such as managing a timetable, keeping track of homework, and packing their own school bag. Try giving them more responsibilities around home in the run up to starting school.

Be patient and understanding

Understand that the transition to secondary school might be challenging for your child, and they may experience a range of emotions. Be patient and offer understanding during this adjustment period.



Empower Independence



Gradually encourage your child to take on more responsibilities, such as organising their school materials and managing their timetable. Secondary school may also be the first time that they have to make their own way to school, help them prepare for this by exploring the journey to and from school by bus, train, bicycle or walking.

Be their emotional support

The greatest support you can provide to your child is to encourage them to explore their thoughts and express their feelings openly, both positive and negative. Engaging in conversations with your child enables them to discuss their emotions as they prepare for their new school.

Dr David Caron began the event with an insightful introduction to the legacy of Irish stained glass. His expertise set the stage for a deep dive into this beautiful art form.

We were honoured to have Ruth Sheehy as our key speaker, who illuminated the artistry of Richard King (1907-1974), a renowned Irish artist and former pupil of Harry Clarke. Ruth's research, focusing on religious art and stained glass in Ireland during the twentieth century, particularly King's

work, offered invaluable insights into his contributions both in Ireland and abroad.

Historic church will be Ulster Orchestra's new permanent home

A landmark church, former school and memorial hall in Belfast will be restored and become the Ulster Orchestra's new permanent home.

The Ulster Orchestra has a nearly 60-year history as Northern Ireland's only professional symphony orchestra.

Townsend Street Church is Grade B1 listed. Built in 1833, it's known for its organ which is dedicated to congregation members who lost their lives in France during the First World War and is one of few official war memorials in Belfast. The former Presbyterian church sits at an interface gate in an area with a strong industrial heritage.

Removing barriers to music

Initial development funding will help Ulster Orchestra plan for the buildings' conservation and connect them with the local community through opportunities to experience orchestral music.

The project's ultimate goal is to bring the buildings' history to life and enable them to once again play a vibrant role within the local community. Extensive restoration will reinstate deteriorated architectural features and create:

a rehearsal and event space a music learning and community engagement hub a dedicated recording studio

additional rehearsal rooms spaces to rent

Auveen Sands, Ulster Orchestra Chief Executive, said: "We want to create a flexible space that removes barriers to music for all, acknowledging both the heritage of Townsend Street but also that of the Ulster Orchestra as one of the UK's premier orchestras for almost 60 years.

"Our key vision is to be a vital force in the cultural, social and educational life of Northern Ireland."
