Give Jesus another hearing, says Bishop Stuart Bell

The Down & Dromore Bible Week speaker encourages folk to expect the unexpected as they gather to study Jesus' parables next week.

"I'm going to speak on four different parables of Jesus at the Down and Dromore Bible Week, and taking a considerable risk because many people will say, 'Ah well, we've the parables since Sunday school days and we want something deeper and meatier than that'. I don't think that Jesus would let us get away with such a comment.

"Jesus' parables have converted lives, transformed cultures, challenged nations, stimulated hearts and have always been relevant.

"Jesus made up lots of stories out of his own head. They were neither fairy stories nor morality tales but stories with an edge - a spiritual edge, a divine edge. Pablo Picasso said that 'a good picture has to be bristling with razor blades.' He could have been describing Jesus' parable

stories. They still cut into the soul, slice away our concealments and address the deepest needs of humanity in every generation.

"How could Jesus have known about the culture wars of the twenty first century, about the mental health needs of our children, about the current epidemic of instability and fear? Was he prescient or simply speaking with the insights of the man from heaven? It's time to give him another hearing.

"Please join me at 7.45pm each evening in St Saviour's Dollingstown, beginning on Tuesday 27th August and running through to Friday 30th."

#### **Bishop Stuart Bell**

Stuart has ministered for over fifty years in various parishes in Wales and is currently leading a new congregation called Fellowship 345 in Rhydypennau, Ceredigion.

He was consecrated as a Bishop in the Anglican Convocation in Europe in March 2023.

Stuart is married to Prudence, a trained occupational therapist and magistrate and they have three children and three grandchildren.

He is the author of 'Recovering His Reputation' which recounts his 25-year ministry in St Michael's Aberystwyth.

Stuart enjoys long distance walking, sea fishing and bread making.



Hildegard von Bingen was a visionary, ecologist, cosmologist, preacher, prophet and singer, and one of the first named composers of Western music and plainchant.

The Rev. Terry Mitchel says:

In this afternoon taster workshop, we will explore Hildegard's spirituality through the embodied experience of singing, thereby opening ourselves as channels for the grace that flows through her work. The workshop will include a brief performance by course leader, Eilish Butler. With an MA in chant and song, Eilish has been performing and teaching Hildegard's chant since 2010.

We will focus on learning one short chant for which you will be provided with copies of Hildegard's original neumes as well as 'Gregorian' and modern transcriptions. We will take up a voluntary contribution to cover the costs of the quiet day.

# Doug Beattie wanted an attractive and intelligent form of unionism in Northern Ireland - News Letter editorial

The Ulster Unionist Party will soon have had seven leaders in 14 years.

Reg Empey, who stood down in autumn 2010, Tom Elliott, Mike Nesbitt, Robin Swann, Steve Aiken, Doug Beattie – and then whoever will replace Mr Beattie.

He has quit in frustration at the UUP's ruling 14 party officers for thwarting his "positive, optimistic, pro-union vision". Mr Beattie's insistence in the statement that only an "inclusive" party can secure its own future will be music to the ears of nationalists who love to depict nationalism as inclusive and unionism as not.

There is a important debate to be had about whether Mr Beattie is right that liberal unionism is the path forward or whether it will just hasten the 'process' that republicans think politics in Northern Ireland to be. Indeed, the recent relative electoral success of the Ulster Unionist Party and the decline in the Alliance vote in once UUP strongholds of East Antrim, North Down and East Belfast suggests the opposite is true – that a small but noticeable number of Alliance

voters are uneasy with its flirtation with 'New Ireland' discussions and woke politics.

But that debate is for the coming months. Now is a time to record that Northern Ireland is fortunate that Doug Beattie entered politics, bringing the wisdom of a successful previous military career.

At time's Mr Beattie's newness to politics was apparent, but his commitment to an attractive and intelligent form of unionism was clear.

Many unionist voters want unionist unity, and most agree that unionism is not big enough for a three-party split. But a single party would almost certainly see some moderates return to Alliance – something unionism cannot afford.

The Ulster Unionist vote has remained solid, averaging 12% of the overall vote for that aforementioned 14 years period of leadership turmoil. The party faces big challenges, but is far from finished.
