Baby Basics is proud of their very first patron Rev Kate Bottley, who is a church minister in North Nottinghamshire.

She is noted for her roles as a journalist, media presenter and reality television star. She hosts Radio 2 Good Morning Sunday and is a regular presenter on BBC1 Songs Of Praise.

Baby Basics UK is one of the largest networks of baby banks in the country - Through our network of centres across the UK we support families with all the practical essentials they need for life with children from pre birth -5 yrs.

Although the increase we see in demand shows the sad situations faced by families in the UK, we are honoured that we can be there to support them and will continue to grow our network into localities of need across the UK.

Every baby basics centre is run by, for and with the local community

Taking referrals from trusted health & social care professionals.

Any young family, at any time, could find themselves in need of the service of a baby bank.

Families that we support include but are not limited to families in poverty, families seeking asylum, families arriving to the UK as refugees, families fleeing domestic abuse, families fleeing trafficking & families who are homeless or in temporary accommodation.

Having a safe space for a newborn to sleep, such as a moses basket is the most basic provision that every parent wants for their child and this was the premise for the creation of Baby Basics.

Since our inaugural centre opened in Sheffield in 2009 we have seen the service we deliver across our network grow to provide so much more than just a moses basket starter pack for a newborn.

Provision of clothes enables a child to stay warm and dry as they grow, provision of toys & books to support development, provision of a pram/pushchair/sling to help a family access their community safely, provision of a cot/cot bed/toddler bed to support good and safe sleep as children grow, provision of nappies & toiletries to enable good hygiene for all the family, provision of feeding equipment and formula so no child goes hungry.

Huge thanks to Bara Studio for their incredible work in bringing the Baby Basics vision to life



BB Captain and Chaplain undertake St Patrick's Way Pilgrim's walk for building and mission projects in Uganda with Abaana



The Countdown is well and truly on. This time, two weeks, ahead Rev Peter and Timothy will have completed the first leg (22 miles) of the Pilgrim Walk - St Patrick's Way

The 4 day journey begins on Sat 5th April at the Navan Centre/Fort in Armagh...leaving at 8am sharp.

They will weave their way through the city of Armagh, the ecclesiastical capital of Ireland, with fascinating Christian heritage, rich in elegant Georgian architecture and alongside a beautiful tree lined Mall.

There will pause a few minutes at Saint Patrick's Church Of Ireland Cathedral, where St Patrick established the city as a great seat of Christianity, as it remains today, and




where Brian Boru, last High King of Ireland was buried in 1014.

Passing by the Palace Demense to get their Pilgrim's stamp, they will stride out towards the country side skirting by Lowry Lakes, then the back of Gosford Forest (near



Mullabrack Church), Mullabrack and Kilcluney Parish Group, then onwards along the backroads to Tandragee and will eventually join the Scarva to Poyntzpass canal/tow path.

They will breathe a sigh of relief at reaching the flattest part of the walk or sip tea



maybe at Hollie Berries and this would be an ideal stretch to join them ... finishing off at Poyntzpass train station junction.

That night blisters will be treated, muscles will be soothed and sleep will be needed.

Bishop of Edinburgh visits Middle East

The Bishop of Edinburgh on Friday last travelled to Amman, the capital of Jordan, to join nearly twenty other senior clerics for an international summit aimed at strengthening links between Anglicans and Lutherans.

The Rt Rev Dr John Armes was representing the Scottish Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Edinburgh at the Summit of the Anglican-Lutheran International Commission on Unity and Mission, also known as ALICUM.

Taking place between Friday 28 March and Thursday 3 April, the Summit brought together ten pairs of senior church leaders from the Anglican Communion and the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) whose jurisdictions are twinned with another in their respective partner's province

Peel Cathedral Choir to honour WWI soldiers with moving trip to Ypres

A group of 13 children and 9 adults from the Cathedral Choir in Peel will embark on a poignant journey to Ypres, Belgium, from April 7th to 9th, to participate in the evening Remembrance Ceremony at the iconic Menin Gate.

Under the direction of Dr. Peter Litman, the choir will pay tribute to the brave soldiers who lost their lives during the First World War, with a particular focus on Peel-born Private Robert Arthur Vick.

Private Vick, a member of the King's Liverpool Regiment, went missing in action on 25th September 1917. His name is inscribed on the Great War Roll of Honour on the War Memorial in the Cathedral grounds, making his story an integral part of the choir's journey. During their time in Belgium, the choir will follow in the footsteps of Private Vick, visiting key sites of remembrance in the Ypres Salient, where many soldiers made the ultimate sacrifice.

A Journey of Reflection and Remembrance

The choir's trip will begin with a visit to Tyne Cot Cemetery, the largest Commonwealth War Graves Commission cemetery in the world. Here, the choir will perform "Ellan Vannin," a moving tribute to the Manx lads who perished in the Great War. The choir will then visit several significant sites, including Vancouver Corner, Langemark Cemetery,

Hooge Crater, and Essex Farm, where the tragic history of the war is brought to life through the preserved trenches and the poignant museum exhibits.

The choir's guide for the day will be John Lee of 'Battlefield and Education Tours,' who will provide insightful commentary on the sites, helping the group to understand the personal stories behind the monuments they visit.

The Menin Gate Ceremony

The highlight of the trip will be the choir's performance at the Remembrance Ceremony held every evening at the Menin Gate in Ypres. The ceremony, which has taken place every day since 1928, honours the soldiers who died in the Ypres Salient and have no known grave. The choir will perform two moving pieces: "O Come Y Servants of the Lord" by Christopher Tye, and the beloved hymn "The Day Thou Gavest, Lord, is Ended," written by the former King William's College pupil, Rev'd John Ellerton. The latter hymn was chosen for its personal connection to the Isle of Man and the Cathedral community.

The choir will be joined by Alan Jones, Peel Commissioner and standard bearer for the Peel Royal British Legion, who will proudly carry the Royal British Legion flag in uniform. The Very Rev'd Nigel Godfrey, Dean of the Cathedral, will also accompany the group on his final choir tour before his retirement in 2026, adding another layer of significance to this emotional journey.

A Special Tribute to the Young Soldiers

This trip holds special meaning for the choir, particularly for the young members, many of whom are close in age to the soldiers like Private Vick who were called up during the war. The children will have the opportunity to reflect on the sacrifices made by those their age and younger, bringing a deep sense of personal connection to the events they are commemorating.

Support from the Community

The trip has been made possible thanks to the generous support of The Brien Trust, The Elizabeth Clucas Trust, The Admiral Feteris Foundation, and numerous individual donors who contributed through a crowdfunding campaign. The choir and Dr. Litman are deeply grateful for the support that has enabled this powerful trip to become a reality.

Dr. Litman said, "This will be an unforgettable experience for the choir. Not only will they be able to honour the sacrifice of Private Vick and so many others, but they will also connect with history in a very personal way. It is truly special to witness young people taking part in such a meaningful and reflective journey."

The choir's visit to Ypres will provide a unique opportunity to learn, reflect, and honour those who gave their lives during one of the most devastating periods in history. Through music, remembrance, and a deep connection to the past, the Peel Cathedral Choir will pay tribute to the fallen soldiers of the Great War, ensuring that their stories continue to live on.

Methodist Centenary Church use of Eco Congregation Small Grant

Maureen Rowan, Eco Congregation Coordinator at Methodist Centenary Church in Dublin shares how they used their ECI Small Grant - 'Instead of briers, the myrtle will grow.' Isaiah 55:13.

Following completion of its first phase of refurbishment and energy-efficiency improvements, Methodist Centenary Church was at last able to begin a pollinator friendly planting programme. The first step was made possible with the support the ECI Small Grant and the purchase of a myrtle tree in a large pot for the church entrance. The pot was enthusiastically filled by the children during Sunday service,

the scattering of soil around the communion table reflecting the determination with which the task was completed.

The Myrtus communis was chosen because of its attraction for bees and other pollinators in summer when its crisp white, star-like flowers will appear. The aromatic purple berries that follow in autumn will also attract the birds.

Rev Andrew Kingston placed an inscription beside the tree, taken from Isaiah 55:13: 'instead of briers the myrtle will grow'. In his sermon, he spoke of the significance of Isaiah's message of hope, renewal, blessing and growth in a time of corrupt leadership and oppression before the Babylonian exile. Sustaining our own sense of hope in this era of authoritarianism, brutal conflict and climate disruption is a daily challenge. As the myrtle tree blossoms, we will look to it as a symbol from which to draw spiritual nourishment, as well as awareness of our dependence on the pollinators. Well done to all!
