For 80 years Mission Aviation Fellowship has served over 1,000 remote destinations as a humanitarian air operator. This new Cessna 208 Caravan will deliver aid to remote regions in MAF Papua New Guinea.

community, in celebration of their 50th anniversary of Independence! The High Commissioner of PNG, Her Excellency Betty Palaso presented the King to members of the Papua New Guinean community in the UK.

# Historic buildings in Macroom and Castletownbere receive conservation funding

The Mayor of the County of Cork, Cllr Joe Carroll has welcomed Heritage Council grants totalling €450,000 for conservation works on two historic buildings.

Cork County Council successfully applied for funding for St Peter's Church, Castletownbere and Macroom Castle Gate Lodge through the Historic Towns Initiative 2025.

St Peter's Church is set to receive €250,000 to refurbish and preserve the building, transforming it into a dedicated community centre. The former Church of Ireland facility dates back to 1841 and was acquired by the Castletownbere Development Association in 2018.

Macroom Castle Gate Lodge has been awarded €200,000 towards sensitive restoration and conservation works to weatherproof the structure for the future. Located in the heart of Macroom's main square, the Gate Lodge is of significant culture and historical importance to the local community and is a symbol of the town.

Mayor Carroll said, "These two buildings are of great architectural and historical interest and the works being undertaken are a wonderful example of heritage-led regeneration delivering for and enhancing our County towns. I would like to acknowledge the significant community investment and effort in both towns, in particular Castletownbere Development Association, whose vision to acquire St Peter's Church to develop a community centre will soon come to fruition. A flagship heritage attraction could be created in Macroom Castle Gate Lodge, and I look forward to Cork County Council and Macroom Castle Demesne working together to achieve this in the years to come."

The Historic Towns Initiative is a joint undertaking by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage

and the Heritage Council which aims to promote the heritage-led regeneration of Ireland's historic towns.

The excitement was all worth it when Kim received the Best Caretaker Award! Kim always goes above and


beyond and the whole school community is so delighted she has received this well-deserved recognition.

# Saint John Passion on Palm Sunday by choir of St Patrick's Cathedral

The choir of St Patrick's Cathedral is giving a liturgical performance of Bach's Saint John Passion on Palm Sunday (April 13) at 6.00pm. All are very welcome to attend.

Bach's Saint John Passion is one of the towering achievements of western music, and tells in music the story of the arrest, trial and crucifixion of Jesus. Originally conceived as a liturgical piece in Lutheran Germany, it combines the narrative from St John's gospel with reflective solo arias, dramatic choruses and chorales (hymn tunes), the latter of which are sung by the entire congregation.

In this performance directed by David Leigh, the Schola (senior girls) and men of the cathedral choir are joined by an orchestra drawn from Dublin's finest professional players.

All of the solos, including the evangelist, are taken by current and former members of the choir.

to attend and will be commissioned at a later date.



- 2150. Kenmare. Jesus risen from the dead



# C of I Family and Children's Ministry Holy Week dioramas

As we approach Holy Week, a reminder of the dioramas you can download from our website and print. They can be used at Church. Home, School or Easter Club.

This is a simple paper craft that can help tell the Easter story over 5 dioramas.

We have two versions, one is full colour and the other is black and white so that children can colour in the scenery and characters as you chat about the story.



You can take one section of the story at a time if using it as part of a wider lesson for example on Palm Sunday. Or you might choose to do all 5 together to tell the story from the triumphal entry to the resurrection – we would recommend using the full-colour pack if doing all 5 in one session.

Pages should be printed back to back to ensure the Bible verse lines up with the back of the scene. Assembly instructions are included in the pack.

#### Parishes hear benefits of ChurchSuite

The ChurchSuite Evening Event, hosted by the diocese of Down & Dromore on 1 April, brought together over 60

representatives from diocesan churches to explore the value of ChurchSuite as a tool for good governance, effective communication, and church growth.

The platform is already used by some parishes and Judith Kinnen (Magheralin) and Revd Anna Williams (Ballynahinch) gave an overview of ChurchSuite's various module options, explaining their practical applications for church administration.

Revd Rodney Blair (Shankill Lurgan) gave a live demonstration showcasing key functionalities, equipping attendees with hands-on knowledge of how to navigate and use the system for everyday tasks.

The event also included an engaging panel discussion, where participants had the opportunity to ask practical questions about implementing ChurchSuite in their own contexts. The evening ended with a meaningful time of prayer in small groups, seeking God's guidance in using technology to strengthen church ministry and mission.

From public service collapse to sectarian voting, Ulster is the canary in the coal mine, writes Ruth Dudley Edwards

Of the many lessons I learned from covering Northern Ireland for decades, the most depressing was that the British state almost always employed bribes and appearement to shut up troublemakers.

British ministers – relieved that by and large these days political violence is off the agenda – have the pathetic belief that, if sufficiently humoured, everyone will see sense and work together for the good of the province.

This reached its apogee in 2007 when, after years of lying and stonewalling from the IRA over decommissioning, Jonathan Powell – Tony Blair's chief of staff and now, God help us, Keir Starmer's national security adviser – invited Gerry Adams and Martin McGuinness to his wedding.

The latest example is a report from the Northern Ireland Select Committee: it confirmed that public services are worse in the province than anywhere else in the United Kingdom.

NI has the highest waiting lists, the longest A & E queues, and the greatest number of prescriptions for antidepressants. Par for the course, the call from most quarters is already for the provision to get more money.

But last year, the Conservative Government agreed to fund Northern Ireland according to its estimated level of need of 124 per cent. In simple language, this means that the province gets £124 for every £100 to England.

Since the Belfast/Good Friday Agreement Stormont has been in a state of collapse: there is no collective

responsibility at ministerial level in the devolved government; the civil service is demoralised; Sinn Féin still refuse to take their Westminster seats, and since they want Northern Ireland to fail, most of the party's republicans are focussed on doing it damage while extracting the maximum from the British Treasury.

The NI Committee sympathetically attributes the problems to comparatively widespread poverty and a higher proportion of the people in receipt of benefits.

The Labour chair of the Committee, Tonia Antoniazzi, has condemned the "too little, too late approach" to funding. The buzz phrase that keeps coming up is "according to need", with all its Marxist overtones.

Of course, the greatest need are in the areas wrecked by terrorism and tribalism, and with the cynical representatives who shout the loudest for government assistance. But no one argues with them.

This is because whoever shouts the loudest gets the most. In Northern Ireland, quiet patriots are elbowed aside by noisy enemies of the state.

In England, we humour Islam because we are afraid of it and sneer at Christianity because we are not.

Anyone who feels frightened on this front should study what happens when – fearful of the threat of terrorism – electorates vote on sectarian lines.

England is heading that way, with the recent striking success of Muslim independents in elections to the House of Commons last year; their priority is Gaza.

Their stoutest supporters are Sinn Féin, who are uncompromising supporters of Palestinian activism and have led the way in making Ireland the most anti-Semitic country in Europe; sectarian voting is the key to their success.

And what's going on in impoverished Stormont? Well, the Sinn Féin infrastructure minister "stands firm" in her decision to approve £150,000 for bilingual information boards and ticket vending machines at the shiny new Belfast Grand Central Station, although she had not consulted the Executive, which she was obliged to do.

This is a tried and tested way of what is popularly known as "winding up the Prods", who know there isn't a single Irish speaker in Ireland that can't speak English.

Anyone trying to understand what's going on with some of our Muslim politicians should nip across the Irish Sea and study how republican tacticians got their way in war and in peace.

We are in peril as a society because our enemies have skilfully learned how to turn a liberal democracy against itself. And we have a metropolitan elite that hates its own country, undermines its culture at every turn, and thinks free speech should be restricted because – like our Prime Minister – they don't know it's an essential bastion of every democracy. JD Vance was right.
