# Pope invites Anglican woman bishop to Council of Cardinals meeting

With the help of a woman Anglican bishop, a Salesian sister and a consecrated virgin, Pope Francis and his international Council of Cardinals devoted the first morning of their February meeting "to deepening their

## reflection, begun last December, on the role of women in the church," the Vatican press office said.

Matteo Bruni, director of the Vatican press office, said Feb. 5 the pope and cardinals heard from Bishop Jo Bailey Wells, deputy secretary-general of the Anglican Communion; Salesian Sr. Linda Pocher, a professor of Christology and Mariology at Rome's Pontifical Faculty of Educational Sciences "Auxilium," and Giuliva Di Berardino, a consecrated virgin and liturgist from the Diocese of Verona, Italy.



The pope and council were to continue meeting the afternoon of Feb. 5 and all day Feb. 6, focusing on other themes, Bruni said.


The Vatican has not shared details about the discussions on the role of women in the church nor the texts of presentations made at the meeting.

Cardinal Gérald Lacroix of Québec was present at the meeting; in Jan. 30 video message said he would "temporarily withdraw from activities in my diocese" after he was accused in a civil lawsuit of inappropriately touching a 17-year-old girl on two occasions in the 1980s. He has denied the allegations.

The Vatican press office did not comment on the cardinal's participation in the council meeting. In addition to Lacroix, those at the February meeting included Cardinals Juan José Omella Omella of Barcelona; Seán O'Malley of Boston; Fridolin Ambongo Besungu of Kinshasa, Congo; Pietro Parolin, Vatican secretary of state; Oswald Gracias of Mumbai, India; Sérgio da Rocha of São Salvador da Bahia, Brazil; Fernando Vérgez Alzaga, president of the commission governing Vatican City State; and Jean-Claude Hollerich of Luxembourg.



# Caring and imaginative cleric to serve again in Cashel diocese


The Bishop of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory, the Right Reverend Adrian Wilkinson has appointed the Reverend Canon David Bayne as incumbent of Tinahely and Carnew Union.



David was born in Stirling, in Central Scotland, and attended Stirling High School followed by St. Andrews University, graduating in History and Economics. After a fifteen-year career in business, he returned to college, to Coates Hall in Edinburgh, in 1987, to study for Ordination. His entire ministry was within the Scottish Episcopal Church & Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway, serving firstly as Rector of Dumfries, then of Castle Douglas and as Rural Dean of Galloway. The Church made much use of his previous experience, as a Convener both of the Diocesan

Administration Board and of the Provincial Finance Committee, and as a Trustee of the Pension Fund.

For 17 years David was a Chapter Canon of St. Mary's Cathedral, Glasgow, and was made an Honorary Canon on his first retirement, to Askamore on the border of Wicklow and Wexford.



He is married to Alison, who is an artist and speech therapist, and whose family is from Wicklow. They have one son, Andrew, who is married to Yasmin and lives in Ayrshire.

After almost seven years of retirement, during which David has officiated in over 30 Churches in the Diocese, Alison and he are excited to begin a new chapter of their ministry, in the Tinahely and Carnew Union.

Bishop Wilkinson says 'I am delighted that Canon Bayne has accepted this incumbency. He is a caring and imaginative priest. Since moving to Askamore, David has been very active in the Diocese, covering in parishes where there have been vacancies. The people of Tinahely and Carnew Union know both David and Alison as much-loved and committed parishioners already and they will be delighted with this news. I know also that David's clerical colleagues in the Diocese will warmly welcome this appointment too.'

A date for the institution service will be announced in due course.

# Silent disco is not a 'rave in the nave', Canterbury cathedral insists

Canterbury Cathedral has claimed its silent disco is "appropriate" following backlash over the "rave in the nave", Gabriella Sterling, Social and Religious Affairs Editor, writes in the Daily Telegraph

Clubbers will take to the nave in sell-out events on Thursday and Friday for a 90s-themed disco featuring hits from the Vengaboys, Britney Spears, Spice Girls and Eminem. It is expected that 750 people will attend each day. Tickets were £25 but are now sold out.

Church leaders are using the event, where alcohol will be available, as a way to reach out to younger people and raise "large sums" in order to keep the Cathedral running, with the landmark's historic Nave as a dancefloor.

However, petitioners say silent discos belong in nightclubs, not "the most important Christian church in England". But Canterbury has hit back and defended the event, insisting it will be "respectful" of the historic site, first established in the year 597.

The Dean of Canterbury, the Very Rev David Monteith, said: "Whilst dancing of all different kinds has happened in the cathedral over the centuries, there are many different views on the secular and the sacred. Our 90s-themed silent disco will be appropriate to and respectful of the cathedral – it is categorically not a 'rave in the nave' – but I appreciate that some will never agree that dancing and pop music have a place within cathedrals."

Dr Monteith added: "Cathedrals have always been part of community life in a way much wider than their prime focus as centres of Christian worship."

Critics said it is inappropriate to host this sort of event at a cathedral.

A petition to stop the discos has attracted more than 1,600 signatures.

Andrea Williams, chief executive of Christian Concern, said: "Will the real Church of England please stand up, please stand up.

"The reason why cathedrals were built was to point towards the majesty and beauty and reverence of God and Jesus Christ, not the lyrics of Eminem."

Dr Cajetan Skowronski, who organised the petition, said: "It will not bring young people closer to Christ, rather it will send the message that Christ and his church, and all the truth, beauty and goodness it has to offer, are unimportant – that entertainment deserves attention more than God."

#### +Very Rev Dr Stephen White

The death has taken place of Very Rev Dr Stephen White, who was Priest-in-Charge in the Gweedore Group of Parishes from 1988-92 and Dean of Raphoe from 1992 until 2002.


Dr White, who was born in London, left the Diocese of Derry and Raphoe to become Dean of Killaloe and served there until 2012, when he returned to parish ministry in England. He was married to Frances, and the couple had two grown-up sons, Samuel and Charles.



# Kilkenny's famous Grammar School founded in 1538

One of the most famous schools of 16th century Ireland was the Grammar School founded by Piers Butler, 8th earl of Ormond, in c. 1538 within the Cathedral Close of St Canice's.

The school was at the vanguard of the transformation of Kilkenny from a medieval town to a Renaissance city. One of the masters of the school was Peter White who taught humanism, classical Renaissance thought and had progressive ideas about how to educate children, including that the beating of children in schools should be banned! Much of the building still survives today in the library and

residence in the south-west corner of the Close and incorporates a tower on the town wall of Irishtown known as Black Rath castle.

In c. 1585 it was used as a public lecture room and in 1615 it became a public school. The Cromwellian attack in March 1650 led to its closure but it was re-established in c. 1666.

In 1684 it was transferred to a new premises on John Street and became Kilkenny College. Its site is now the Kilkenny County Council offices. Kilkenny Archaeology.
