



Ireland's Josh van der Flier endorses Dublin diocesan 'Shine a Light' appeal

Ireland and Leinster rugby player Josh van der Flier has taken time out from his busy Six Nations schedule to throw his weight behind Dublin & Glendalough's Shine a Light campaign for Al Ahli Hospital in Gaza City.

Belfast Cathedral stalwart's 100th birthday

Stanley McIlroy MBE, celebrated his 100th birthday on Thursday.

Stanley has been a member of the cathedral congregation for over 60 years and was also a member of the Cathedral Board for over 30 years. He was the leading cathedral fundraiser during the period of the development of the ambulatory and the Chapel of Unity. He was also the Christian Stewardship recorder.

With his late wife he was an outstanding supporter and fund-raiser for cancer research, raising over the years in the region of one million pounds. This was part of his voluntary service recognised by the awarding of the MBE in 2016. He was also active in the support of Masonic charities.

He was a close friend and supporter of Dean Crooks, and particularly in establishing the Belfast Cathedral Black Santa Sitout.

Stanley had a surprise visit from the Bishop of Connor, RT Rev George Davison and the Very Rev Stephen Forde who presented him with cards from the diocese and from the cathedral family.

Anglican reps meet with COMECE and EU in Brussels

A very encouraging meeting was held this week between Anglican reps including Archbishop Justin Welby and COMECE in Brussels discussing current issues including migration and Ukraine.

The Anglican Bishop in Europe Robert Innes said, "Pleased to welcome Archbishop Justin Welby to Brussels yesterday following his visit to Ukraine".





Archbishop Welby referred to "an important meeting with Stefano Sassino, Sec. Gen. of the EU External Action Service. We will stand together with Ukraine in all circumstances".

Gaza, our Jewish neighbours need to feel and know they are safe. We must stand in solidarity with each other and call out all forms of antisemitism".

Statement from the C of E House of Bishops on the war in Gaza -

With the onset of Israel's ground offensive into Rafah, we call for an immediate ceasefire. The relentless

bombardment of Gaza and its huge cost in civilian lives and civilian infrastructure must stop. The manner in which this war is being prosecuted cannot be morally justified.

We urge Israel to adhere to the ICJ order and to ensure that Palestinians have access to food, water, healthcare, and safety, that have long been denied to them. We welcome the Foreign Secretary's recent call for an immediate pause in the fighting and would also welcome further representation to the Government of Israel about the way that it is exercising its right to self-defence and to affirm adherence to international law.

We continue to advocate for the release of the remaining hostages and an end to the missile attacks on Israel by Hamas. All sides must begin to imagine a future beyond this conflict: for a just peace for Israelis and Palestinians. This war can't result in the consolidation of a system of occupation that has for too long denied Palestinians their rights and freedoms.

In praying for all those in Israel and Palestine living in the midst of war and the fear of war, we pray particularly for the Palestinian Christian communities, that they may know strength and the presence of the Spirit of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace.

As we consider the impact of the current conflict in the Middle East on community relations here in the UK, we again condemn all antisemitic and anti-Muslim sentiment. We are horrified by the growing threats and abuses of Jews on university campuses, in our neighbourhoods, and online. We appeal to our communities to be safe for all people whatever their nationality, ethnicity or religion. Dublin Rector hits the road for Lent

Canon Gillian Wharton's Lenten Challenge has become a regular fixture. During Lent 2024 Gillian is walking at least 5km every day – Wednesday February 14 to Saturday March 30 2024 inclusive – "no skipping out on Sundays!" she promises.

AshOriginally the Rector of Booterstown and Carysfort with Mount Merrion began the challenge in support of the Irish Cancer Society during COVID in response to not being able to have the usual parish Daffodil Service followed by a Daffodil Coffee Morning with Bring-and-Buy.

Since her first challenge in 2021, it has become a Lenten tradition with funds being raised for a variety of causes including the Irish Cancer Society, Protestant Aid, Blackrock Hospice, the Irish Motor Neurone Disease Association, the victims of the earthquake in Turkey and Syria (channelled through the Bishops' Appeal) and parish funds.



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"Lent is the season for examining ourselves and seeing how we can more fully reflect the life and love of Christ and his commandment to us to love our neighbour as ourselves. That means respecting and caring for others and for ourselves," Gillian comments.

"Therefore, again, this Lent, I am encouraging people to take up something that gives you a focus each day and that benefits you physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually, and lives out loving your neighbour as yourself.

"This year, I'll be walking each day for my spiritual, mental, emotional and physical wellbeing and for the victims of the conflict between Palestine and Israel, (channelled through the Bishops' Appeal and the Dublin and Glendalough Diocesan 'Shine a Light Appeal' to assist the Al–Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza which is run by the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem (which covers Jordan, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria and Israel). It is the only Christian hospital in the Gaza strip and the only cancer hospital in Gaza. It normally treats approximately 45,000 patients a year. Al–Ahli Hospital in Gaza welcomes and treats people of all faiths and none," she explains.


On Sunday 3rd March 2024, the Abaana New Life Choir will be coming to perform in St John's Church, Falls Rd., Belfast.


