Richill Methodist is Young at Heart

There was a warm welcome for guest speaker Ron Wilson from Richhill Methodist Church at the monthly meeting of the Young at Heart Club at Tullyroan.

Ron showed slides and spoke about his small beginnings selling goat's milk around numerous houses, and when asked to supply potatoes it was the start of an interest in

that crop. He now grows 2,500 acres in various counties of Ireland which are pre-packed at his factory in Portadown and are supplied as Wilson's Country to numerous supermarkets.

The staff of 130 pack 850 tons per week. They have built two digesters to use up waste materials to generate electricity which helps run the factory.

Members also learned of Ron's great passion - the Fields of Life international development organisation - in which he has been involved for 25 years. It operates mostly in Uganda where 900 wells have been dug to supply fresh water to 700,000 people. It has also been involved in building 100 schools over the past 30 years - courtesy Portadown Times



Black Santa funds distributed to Dublin charities

Dublin's Black Santa appeal continued to spread goodwill last Sunday February 18, as €55,000 was distributed to local charities.

The funds were collected during the annual sit out at St Ann's Church, Dawson Street, in the days before Christmas and representatives of the charities joined parishioners for a service of thanksgiving where they received their cheques.

During Choral Matins the lessons were read by Dr Ruby Morrow, secretary to the Select Vestry, and Major Gordon Fozzard, Chaplain of Dublin Homelessness Service of the Salvation Army.




In her sermon, the Revd Natasha Quinn–Thomas, Curate Assistant in Castleknock and Mulhuddart with Clonsilla outlined her 'Five Fs of Lent' which she devised as part of her ministry with school children.

The first F relates to the length of Lent – 40 days and 40 nights during which we carve out time from our daily lives to find space to be in closer relationship with God.



The second F is for Fasting and what we give up or take up to get closer to God. The third is Favour to which she returned later. The fourth F is Forgiveness and the fifth is Faith.

Focusing on Favour, she explored the generosity of giving. "This community which lies in the heart of Dublin has given with generous hearts. We have demonstrated through the appeal that we are charitable, that we want to help people in need in our community. This is our obligation to mission and our obligation to help those in our community to develop a deeper relationship with God and ultimately with God's kingdom here on earth," Ms Quinn–Thomas observed.



She added: "By giving we receive even more. Through this appeal we have received even more," she explained adding that her first visit to St Ann's was on the first day of the 2023 Black Santa Sit Out with the pupils of Castleknock National School. "When I was outside singing and dancing, what I received was the joy of people passing by, their encouragement of the children and watching the children grow in confidence... Those people who gave financially that day received so much more in happiness and the gratitude of the children collecting the money," she said.

She said that this favour had demonstrated that St Ann's has a Christian heart for mission and its people were keen to give so that they may receive a greater gift which is uniting God's kingdom on earth. She urged the congregation to explore the Five Fs over the coming 40 days and nights and continue to demonstrate the gift of love and giving in the heart of the city.

Speaking after the service, the Vicar of St Ann's, Canon Paul Arbuthnot, thanked all who helped coordinate the sit out.

On behalf of the charities who benefited from the appeal, Sandra Younge of the Brabazon Trust thanked the people of St Ann's for their generosity in giving so much time and energy to running the appeal each year. She said the donations were appreciated by all the charities and added that she knew that the donations would be wisely spent to the benefit of all the people who used their services.

+Miss Caroline Dickson former Diocesan Architect

Tributes have been paid to the former Diocesan Architect for Derry and Raphoe, Miss Caroline Dickson, who passed away on Friday after a short illness.

Miss Dickson retired from her diocesan role last year after 40 years' service. Throughout those four decades, she worked diligently on the Diocese's behalf, displaying

formidable expertise when it came to working on buildings of great historical significance.

Last year, at the Diocesan Synod, a special presentation was made to Miss Dickson by Bishop Andrew to acknowledge the outstanding service she had given Derry and Raphoe.

Miss Dickson's funeral will take place in her beloved local church, St Mura's (Fahan) on Thursday afternoon at 2.30pm.

She was predeceased by her parents Christine and Peter Dickson and is sadly missed by her cousins, her fellow parishioners, her many friends and colleagues, and by the wider community in Fahan.

The story of St. Malachy's Church, Alfred Street, completed 1844

This was the fourth Roman Catholic church in Belfast, needed to cater for the rising numbers coming from rural areas. The population of 'The Markets' nearby was expanding in the first decades of the 1800s, supplying labour for the burgeoning linen industry.

Three people closely associated with this church bought burial lots at Friar's Bush, but none of them are actually buried there.

Captain Thomas Griffith left a bequest that paid over half of the building costs. In 1838, he was buried in Shankill cemetery.

Peter Lundy completed the spectacular interior of this church. Shortly afterwards, he was declared bankrupt and emigrated to the US.

Felice Piccione executed large paintings that grace the elaborate altar. We do not know his place of burial.

By 1844, when this church opened, Friar's Bush had become the main burial place for the Catholics in the city, and hence many from this parish are buried at Stranmillis. This is a stunning building, inside and out, and it is usually unlocked during the day. It is well worth wandering through the quiet backstreets behind City Hall to have a look.

Leaving behind us the alien, foreign city of Dublin My father drove us through the night in an old Ford Anglia, His five-year-old son in the seat beside him,

The rexine seat of red leatherette,

And a yellow moon peered in through the windscreen.

'Daddy, Daddy,' I cried, 'Pass out the moon,'

But no matter how hard he drove he could not pass out the moon.

Each town we passed through was another milestone And their names were magic passwords into eternity:

Kilcock, Kinnegad, Strokestown, Elphin,

Tarmonbarry, Tulsk, Ballaghedereen, Ballyvarry;

Now we were in Mayo and the next stop was Turlough,

The village of Turlough in the heartland of Mayo,

And my father's mother's house, all oil-lamps and women, And my bedroom over the public bar below,

And in the morning cattle-cries and cock-crows: Life's seemingly seamless garment gorgeously rent By their screeches and bellowings. And in the evenings I walked with my father in the high grass down by the river Talking with him – an unheard-of thing in the city.

But home was not home and the moon could be no more outflanked

Than the daylight nightmare of Dublin city:

Back down along the canal we chugged into the city And each lock-gate tolled our mutual doom;

And railings and palings and asphalt and traffic lights,

And blocks after blocks of so-called 'new' tenements –

Thousands of crosses of loneliness planted

In the narrowing grave of the life of the father;

In the wide, wide cemetery of the boy's childhood.
