Honours for Clogher Diocese parishioners

Two people from Clogher Diocese were honoured in the New Year Honours List. Joy Coalter, a Diocesan Reader from Brookeborough and a member of Colebrooke Parish, has received the BEM in the New Year Honours List while Norman Coalter, an Enniskillen businessman and member of Enniskillen Parish at St. Macartin's Cathedral, is the new High Sheriff for Fermanagh.

Joy Coalter, a member of St. Ronan's Church, Colebrooke in the Aghalurcher Group of Parishes, retired in 2022 as Cleaner and Caretaker at Brookeborough Primary School



after 35 years of service.

Joy said her immediate reaction when she received an official letter informing her she had been nominated for a BEM was, "I thought it was a scam as I'm always so wary of scams."

Joy was part of the life of the primary school for decades. supporting the teaching staff at key times of the year and encouraging the pupils. She said she would have dressed up in fancy dress outfits during charity events or helped to raise money for charity. She also acted as a keyholder and in earlier years of her service, helped out as a classroom assistant.

She worked with three school principals during her career and was proud to see her four children attend the school.

As a parishioner of Colebrooke Parish, Joy was firstly a Parish Reader before becoming a Diocesan Reader and has taken services across the diocese as well as in her own parish. She also represents the parish on the Diocesan Synod and in earlier years was a GFS leader. She is also a member of the Mothers' Union.

Norman Coalter runs the Horseshow and Saddlers Bar in Enniskillen.

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Historic meeting of Africa's Anglican women bishops held in Kenya



The first ever meeting of Africa's six female Anglican bishops was held in Kenya last month.

The gathering took place from 8 to 14 January at St Julian's Retreat Centre, Limuru, Kenya, under the theme "African Anglican Women Bishops embarking on a journey of faith: defying conventions and leading with Grace."

Bishops Filomena Tete Estevão (Diocese of Bom Pasteur, Angola), Dr Emily Onyango (Diocese of Bondo, Kenya), Elizabeth Awut (Diocese of Rumbek, South Sudan), Dr Vincentia Kgabe (Diocese of Lesotho, Southern Africa, Rose

Okeno (Diocese of Butere, Kenya) and Dalcy Badeli Dlamini (Diocese of Eswatini, Southern Africa) issued a communique in which they reflected on five key principles:

Re-defining the Church; Moral and Ethical Leadership; the Triple threat of Gender-Based Violence, teenage pregnancies and HIV/AIDS.

They stated, "For far too long, the voice of the Church has been silent on gender inequalities that have been worsened by endemic cases of gender-based violence (GBV), teenage pregnancies and HIV/AIDS. We note that the affected are our congregants who could be described as perpetrators and survivors of the aforementioned triple threats and demand of us to intervene." They also reflected on Women Leadership Empowerment and Climate Justice.

They were guided by a Bible verse from Proverbs 27:17 "As Iron sharpens iron so one person sharpens another."

In their communique they stated, "We humbly adopt the inspiring message of Archbishop Dr Jackson Ole Sapit to us: Women of faith shall continually be instruments of hope, transforming the world and offering thoughtful and practical leadership in various issues that affect society; Women of faith are placed at the core of progressive communities and their voices add valuable contributions to build a stronger Church; The church must remain vocal in highlighting the reforming and transforming power women hold as agents of change".

I was very sorry to hear of the death of John Bruton this morning. I offer my sincere sympathy and prayers to his wife Finola, son Matthew, daughters Juliana, Emily and Mary-Elizabeth, his brother Richard and to his sister Mary.

John will be remembered as a man of principle and virtue, which was evident in his successful tenure in public life and as Taoiseach from 1994 to 1997. He was also a man of faith who recognised the notions of service and the common good in his career as well as the importance of faith and parish. John was a valued and active member of the Dunboyne parish community.

He was also a person of integrity and stature and the people of Meath have always been proud of John's leadership as both Taoiseach, and as European Ambassador to the United States, roles that he served with distinction.

John Bruton's legacy to our society is that of a committed Christian, a patriot, a selfless public servant who innately understood that sacrifice was a perquisite to the common good.

On this sad day for John's family, I pray for the happy repose of his soul, mindful of the blessing from the ritual: Blessed are those who have died in the Lord; Let them rest from their labours, For their good deeds go with them.

Outgoing Irish News Editor speaker at Imagine Festival of Ideas and Politics

Noel Doran will reflect on 25 years as editor of The Irish News at Belfast festival event

The outgoing editor of The Irish News will reflect on his career in journalism at an event in Belfast aimed at exploring political and societal issues.

Noel Doran, the longest serving editor of a daily newspaper in Ireland and the UK, will stand down from his role in April.

Joining journalist Amanda Ferguson at the Imagine Festival of Ideas and Politics ahead of his departure, Mr Doran will look back on the past 25 years he has spent as editor.

The free event at the Crescent Arts Centre next month is part of the annual festival that includes discussions on the

"big issues of our times including new ideas on politics, culture and activism".

While Mr Doran will leave his role as editor in April, he will continue to play a consultancy role with the paper.

Chris Sherrard, former Reach Ireland editor-in-chief, has been appointed as Mr Doran's successor.

Mr Doran began his career with the Antrim Guardian in 1978, before moving to the Ballymena Observer and later joining the Belfast Telegraph.

Working in Derry and Belfast, he also served as the paper's local government correspondent, before a period as duty news editor with Downtown Radio/Cool FM.

Mr Doran joined the Irish News as deputy editor in 1993, becoming editor in 1999.

During his distinguished tenure, The Irish News has amassed a raft of UK and regional awards in recognition of its consistent top-level content.

In 2020 he was voted by readers of the Hold The Front Page website as the best UK regional editor of the 21st century.

He has been credited with winning a wider cross-community readership for the paper.

According to the Audit Bureau of Circulations, The Irish News is now the UK's biggest selling regional daily.

He will join Ms Ferguson, a freelance journalist who has worked as a Northern Ireland editor and Ireland stringer for a wide range of clients, including Reuters news agency and the Washington Post, on March 22. 

Archbishop of Canterbury shelters as Russians bombard Kyiv in early-morning attack

"It is heartbreaking to hear of the loss of life in Kyiv this morning in this appalling attack by Russia. I am praying for all those affected and their families", Archbishop Welby said on Wednesday afternoon.

"We were safe and well in a very secure shelter but it is a stark reminder of the dangers people here are facing every day, even when it doesn't hit the headlines.

"A reminder again that, with all the crises in the world, we must not and will not forget Ukraine.

"It is now almost two full years since that dreadful day of the full-scale Russian invasion — an act of great evil — and we know that the need for support is going to be very long term".

Bishop Andrew Forster on the story that shaped him

Andrew has been Church of Ireland Bishop of Derry and Raphoe since 2019, and is the current President of the Irish Council of Churches.

He studied at Queens University, Belfast and started his ministry in the city as a curate at Willowfield Parish, before becoming Church of Ireland Chaplain at Queens, until 2002, when he headed "out west": first to Sligo, then to Dungannon, before becoming Bishop.
