





King and Queen to make first official visit to the Vatican

King Charles III and Queen Camilla will make their first official visit to the Vatican in April.

According to a statement from Buckingham Palace, "The King and Queen will undertake State Visits to the Holy See and the Republic of Italy in early April 2025."

As part of their official state visit, Charles and Camilla will join Pope Francis "in celebrating the 2025 Jubilee Year," the statement said, noting that the two will have engagements in

Rome and Ravenna as part of their trip, "celebrating the strong bilateral relationship between Italy and the United Kingdom."

Though he has visited the Vatican in the past as Prince of Wales, this will be the first official visit to the Vatican of Charles as king.

Charles was crowned in May 2023, following his mother's death after a 70-year reign.

The coronation ceremony was hailed as a major step forward in terms of Catholic-Anglican relations for the British monarchy, as it marked the first time in 400 years a Catholic bishop

participated in a coronation.

The ceremony was also noted for its interreligious novelty and forward-looking openness. Religious leaders from various communities including Buddhist, Hindu, Jewish, Muslim, and Sikh traditions were also in attendance.

The presence of other Christian leaders and leaders of other faith communities was broadly hailed as part of the king's commitment to maintaining the role of religion in British society, the composition of which has changed drastically since his mother took the throne in the 1950s.

Seventy years ago, more than 80 per cent of England was Christian. In the intervening decades, the religious landscape of the country has changed significantly.

According to Fortune Magazine, fewer than half the people



in England are Christian, with the latest census figures saying 37 per cent state they have no religion, while 6.5 per cent declare

themselves Muslim, and 1.7 per cent Hindu.

London is where this change is felt most acutely, with more than a quarter of citizens adhering to a non-Christian faith.

Former President of St Malachy's College in Belfast

Tributes have been paid to Co Down priest and former president of St Malachy's College in Belfast, Canon Noel Conway, following his death this week.

The former parish priest of Strangford and Kilclief passed away "peacefully" in Nazareth Care Village in south Belfast on Tuesday.

Canon Conway was ordained as a priest in 1957 and spent the majority of his priestly career teaching at St Malachy's College in Belfast.

In 1983 he succeeded Bishop Patrick Walsh as president of the north Belfast grammar school.

He served as president until 1994 and then after recuperation from illness was, in 1995, appointed parish priest of Strangford in Co Down.

One of his most significant achievements was to preserve the college's O'Laverty collections of historical papers and

books that today forms an important resource for the wider history of Belfast.

Principal Paul McBride said that the school was "very saddened" by the news of his passing.

"Canon Conway had many years of distinguished service in the college, firstly as a teacher and then as president," he said.

"His work here not only built on our great traditions and values but secured a firm foundation for our success since his retirement.

"When living in Co Down, he continued to take a deep interest in college life, occasionally visiting us for public and celebratory events. May he rest in peace."

St Brigid's Primary School in Downpatrick, where Canon Conway later served as chaplaincy and member of the Board of Governors, also paid tribute to the late priest, describing "the gift of kindness and wisdom" that he brought to the school.

Social media tributes described him as a "true gentlemen and neighbour" and a "highly respected" priest who worked "tirelessly for his parishioners".



The prime minister who rehearsed for death

In my bathroom hangs a photograph of William Gladstone in 1898, dead on a bier in his library at home in Hawarden, lying in his Oxford doctoral gown on a white pall of Armenian



manufacture, his hands joined cleverly to disguise the finger lost in a shooting accident in 1842, when he was 32, Christopher Howse writes in the Daily Telegraph

Death and Gladstone go together like love and marriage. Only sin had a stronger effect on his mind. As with most things Gladstonian, ironies break in, as when he, a rich beneficiary of West Indies slave plantations, visited William Wilberforce on his deathbed; the anti-slavery campaigner kindly asked after his Evangelical mother. But some of his encounters with death are painful for the reader. His daughter Jessy died in 1850 aged four. Looking back on her life, Gladstone noted that she was a loving child who would "kiss again and again the wretched stump" of his finger.

This detail comes in Michael Wheeler's new William Ewart Gladstone: The Heart and Soul of a Statesman, an enjoyable and acute examination of the Victorian politician's spiritual life. The author knows what he is talking about and chooses accurate facts from original sources judiciously to tell the story in under 200 pages.

He does not duck the ambiguities of Gladstone's work encountering prostitutes and helping many to settle more happily. He sketches the sexual tensions of Gladstone's friendship with Laura Thistlethwaite, a former courtesan or kept woman. Gladstone's disregard for judgment (even perhaps by his wife) was shown by his having a ring from her inscribed "LT to WEG", and wearing it for the rest of his life.

I still find Gladstone more fascinating than Disraeli despite the air of pitch pine and harmoniums that his prose can exude. He did take Christian belief seriously. Before a railway journey in 1845, even though "the risk of travelling be now only infinitesimal", he wrote to Henry Edward

Manning, Jessy's godfather, asking whether she should be baptised first. Manning replied by return of post: "Yes."

It was with a feeling of betrayal (of God more than him) that in the sad year of 1850 he saw Manning and his other spiritual adviser James Hope turn from the Church of England to the Catholic Church (the Church of Rome), following John Henry Newman's path of 1845. At Oxford, Gladstone had heard one Sunday morning a preacher at St Ebbe's of such a low tendency as to become later a member of the Plymouth Brethren and in the afternoon Newman at the University Church.

Newman had also been an Evangelical in his youth, but it is surprising to learn that Gladstone was also like him beguiled as a boy by the Arabian Nights. Like Newman, Gladstone latched on to The Analogy of Religion of 1736 by Bishop Butler (Gladstone's other three "doctors" being Aristotle, Augustine and Dante, though he later argued for a sort of divine revelation to Homer). He never got over the "catastrophe" of Newman's apostasy, as he saw it, in the Oxford Movement that "threw all the brightest and noblest of the University as wrecks upon every shore". His resistance to Rome was such that he went through his sister Helen's books after her death for evidence (by how much each seemed to be used) that she had not persevered in her conversion to Catholicism.

Still, in his final illness, when cancer of the face made his nights an agony, he could be heard at Hawarden declaiming lines from Newman's poem "Praise to the Holiest in the height".
