



C of E General Synod: Fifth of Synod vote to block speech by Archbishop

Caretaker leader survives proxy vote of no confidence amid allegations of 'poor judgment' and bullying

The Archbishop of York is facing a major rebellion from Church leaders amid calls for his resignation over allegations of bullying and "poor judgment".

Stephen Cottrell admits he has made mistakes

A fifth of General Synod members voted to block the Most Rev Stephen Cottrell from delivering his opening speech at Mondays Synod gathering in London. In a provocative move, a lay Synod member proposed skipping the Archbishop's presidential address, which has traditionally opened the Church's main legislative assembly.

Sam Margrave argued that the Church could not "continue as if nothing is wrong" and should not give a platform to an Archbishop facing "credible allegations of bullying, poor judgment, and safeguarding failures", including accusations from a serving bishop.

The Bishop of Newcastle, the Rt Rev Helen-Ann Hartley has been the only bishop to publicly call for his resignation, telling BBC Radio Four's Today programme that he is "the wrong person" to be leading the Church.

Explaining his motion, Mr Margrave asked: "Do we continue as if nothing is wrong, when many across parishes and communities, and even here, believe that this office should be vacant, and our national leadership is causing harm by refusing to step aside?"

The lay member said that some Synod members had planned "protests", others "walking out", but added: "We are here to act and not remain silent, that's why I'm moving this." Although the motion fell short of the required three-quarters majority, 73 members voted in favour of it, with 239 against and 43 abstentions. Having survived what amounted to a proxy vote of no confidence in his interim leadership, the Archbishop said in his address that he did not want to pretend "that we are not in difficult and challenging times".

The caretaker-leader of the Anglican Church assumed most of the Archbishop of Canterbury's responsibilities after the Rt Rev Justin Welby resigned over his failure to report serial abuser John Smyth to the police.

But the interim leader has come under pressure for his own safeguarding record in recent months.

He has been accused of not acting quickly enough in his previous role as Bishop of Chelmsford over David Tudor, a child abuser, who was allowed to remain in post as a priest despite having been barred from being alone with children by the Church and having paid compensation to a sexual abuse victim.

The Archbishop learnt of "longstanding safeguarding concerns" about Tudor in 2010, but said he had no power to

remove him. He has also "categorically rejected" claims he bullied committee members to secure Dr John Perumbalath's appointment as Bishop of Liverpool in 2022.

Dr Perumbalath resigned last month following media reports of sexual assault and harassment allegations, which he denies.

Addressing the Synod, the Archbishop of York said: "I know that trust has been broken and confidence damaged. And I am more sorry about this than I can say. I know mistakes have been made and I know that I have made mistakes."

He said he was "determined" to do what he can to work with others "to lead the change we all know we need". He admitted the Church had "failed greatly" on safeguarding and that he had "long believed that greater independence is the missing piece in the safeguarding jigsaw".

Yesterday the Synod debated and voted on a new safeguarding model for the Church.

Canons installed to Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin

Two new Canons were installed to the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, at Choral Evensong on Sunday February 9.

Canon Suzanne Harris and Canon Paul Arbuthnot were installed by Dean Dermot Dunne during the service which was sung by the Cathedral Choir.

The Revd Suzanne Harris is Rector of Castlemacadam, Ballinatone and Aughrim while Canon Paul Arbuthnot is Dean of Residence of Trinity College Dublin. They were appointed by Archbishop Michael Jackson in succession to Canon Roley Heaney and Canon Arthur Barrett.

Hailing from Dublin, Canon Harris has been Rector of Castlemacadam, Ballinatone and Aughrim since June 2022 having been Priest in Charge in the parish for the previous year. Prior to entering parish ministry was Chaplain to Newpark Comprehensive School in Blackrock from 1992 until 2022. Following her ordination to the priesthood in 2010, she served in non–stipendiary ministry in Booterstown and Mount Merrion.

Originally from Carrickfergus, Co Antrim, Canon Arbuthnot was ordained to the priesthood in 2011. He served his curacy in St Paul's, Glenageary. He subsequently became Precentor of St Albans Cathedral in Hertfordshire and Sacrist of Westminster Abbey. On his return to the Church of Ireland in 2018 he became Rector of Cobh and Glanmire

Union of Parishes and was elected a Chapter Canon at St Patrick's Cathedral in 2021. He then served as Vicar of the Parish of St Ann with St Stephen and St Mark. He has been Dean of Residence of TCD since January 2025.



Thomas Melon

Thomas Mellon, the Ulster-Scot from Omagh who would go on to found Mellon Bank, one of the largest investment firms in the world, was born in 1813.



Mellon was born on a farm at Camp Hill Cottage, Lower Castletown, parish of Omagh, County Tyrone, Ireland. The original family house now forms the centrepiece of the Ulster American Folk Park Museum.

His family had come into Ireland from Scotland and Holland around the middle of the seventeenth century. In 1816, his grandfather, Archibald Mellon.

emigrated to the United States; Andrew and his family followed two years later.

Thomas Mellon began a career in law after graduating and became very successful, using his income to buy much real estate in downtown Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

In late 1869, he decided to retire from the bench, and rather than return to the legal profession, "concluded to open a banking house." On January 2, 1870, he opened the T. Mellon & Sons' Bank with his sons Andrew W. and Richard B.

Mellon died on his 95th birthday, February 3, 1908, at his home in East Liberty. He was survived by his wife, who lived for about a year after his death, and three children. Thomas Mellon and his wife Sarah are buried in Pittsburgh's Allegheny Cemetery.
