Grant funding available for heritage projects in Offaly

Heritage Council's Community Heritage Grant Scheme is now open for applications

The Heritage Council is now accepting applications from community groups and not for profit non-governmental organisations in Offaly for its Community Heritage Grant

Scheme 2024. All relevant information is available from the Heritage Council's website.

A broad range of project types are eligible for funding under the scheme including:

Conservation works to collections, objects or places, including natural heritage projects e.g. control of invasive species or habitat restoration works; conservation works to buildings, including churches; stabilisation works to ruined structures;

Surveys, reports, plans, and audits to inform the future management of buildings and monuments, habitats, collections, or objects.

Accessibility projects that make heritage activities more accessible for people with disabilities e.g. building ramps, automatic doors, handrails, tactile interpretation

Projects that help people engage more with their heritage e.g. interactive maps, videos, virtual exhibitions, podcasts, websites

Purchase of specialised equipment e.g archival boxing for vulnerable documents, monitoring equipment for humidity or light, interpretation/multimedia equipment, specialised software

Projects that address the heritage of minority groups e.g. an oral history project documenting Traveller heritage

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Training in traditional skills and crafts e.g. workshops on skills such as roofing, thatch, dry stone walling etc.

Citizen science projects on environmental conservation.

A recently funded project under this scheme in Offaly was the conservation plan to repair and stabilise three badly damaged items from the Parsonstown Poor Law Union archives in Birr, including the indoor registers of the workhouse from the famine era. The minimum grant that can be requested through the scheme is €500. The maximum is €25,000.

Cathedral Calls

Embrace difference with love, Racial Justice Sunday Service

“The world needs to see us embracing one another’s difference with love and harmony as one people of God,” said the Revd Kevin Ronne who was the preacher



at Choral Evensong in St Patrick’s Cathedral, Dublin to mark Racial Justice Sunday on February 9.

“They need to know that colour is beautiful and only the very sad cannot see how beautiful the colours of God and Jesus Christ are. We are the colour of God and Jesus Christ,” he added.

The service took place in the presence of the Archbishop of Armagh, the Most Revd John McDowell and members of his Reference Group on Ethnic Diversity, Inclusion and Racial Justice. It was introduced by the Dean, the Very Revd William Morton, who outlined the work of the Primate’s Reference Group and the background to Racial Justice Sunday.

The group advises the Archbishop of Armagh on ways in which the Church of Ireland can reflect upon and practice

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the full inclusion of ethnic minority and migrant members in church and wider society.

The theme of this year's Racial Justice Sunday was, 'Coat of Many Colours', reflecting the increasing diversity that exists in churches in Ireland.

In his sermon, the Revd Kevin Ronne said that we needed to be the vine and see the branches coming in from all over the world. He said that colour was one of those branches and white and black were both beautiful.

Kevin is Rector of Raheny and Coolock in Dublin and a member of the Primate's Reference Group. He is from South Africa and spoke of his own experiences growing up

during the time of Apartheid as a member of a bi-racial family, his father being European and mother French Mauritian.

“I was born with twins inside of me. These twins I wrestled with all of my life. I had a black twin and I had a white twin. Sometimes they were good. Other times they left me quite angry. When we deal with racial prejudice we deal with colourism. And colourism is found within your very own because you belong to neither – for the one you are not right because you are too white and for the other you are not right because you are too brown. So where do we fit into the scheme of things?” he asked.

He said growing up in the Apartheid era he knew that white was good and black was bad. “The more white you were the more blessed you were, the more prosperous you were. The more black you were... well you didn't want to be black,” he commented.

But he said inside his church he began to discover that difference was beautiful and black was magnificent and from the Scriptures he realised that the Creator was a loving Creator. “This Creator loves me so I am exactly the right person to be. I am not you and you are not me,” he said.

But he said that the world we live in does not appreciate the beauty and joy of colour. He asked if Christians had a responsibility in this regard. “How many people of the Church of God are truly speaking in our communities, talking about this difficult topic. To me it is not difficult. It is a topic I like to engage with. When I found that the brown and the black and the pink were a good thing... and when I

accepted that I learned to accept you and all other people. We can love. The answer lies in taking the chance on each other, loving each other,” Kevin stated.

“People of God, racism is real. It lives among us. We as the people of God can make the difference. We can say ‘no’ to this racism. We can say ‘yes’ to the goodness of God... that the colours of the world are beautiful. But we need to do it if we are to be part of the vine.” He observed that Jesus said people would know the people of God by the love they have for one another. “We all need to stand up as the Christian family of God and let them see the love of God in action,” he said. He urged people not to be afraid to use the words black or white as they were the words given to describe colours, but do not let that be the excuse not to love each other.

Racial Justice Sunday is an initiative of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland, of which the Church of Ireland is a co-founding member.

This year marks the 30th anniversary of Racial Justice Sunday, which was established by the Methodist Church in 1995 following the tragic racist murder of Black teenager Stephen Lawrence in southeast London in April 1993.

This is a terrific promotion and a great honour for Fr Michael and his family on the Yellow Road, Castlecomer.



St. Patrick's Pilgrimage starts at The Big Fish - Belfast

In this cross-community journey, we will visit sites linked to St Patrick's story and reflect on how it can speak into our lives today, with moments for reflection, prayer and song along the way.

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St Patrick is now widely accepted as a common Christian saint who crossed the ford at the Farset river near the Big Fish and made his way through what is now the Cathedral Quarter to establish the “Church of St. Patrick of the White Ford” which later became known as “The Old Church” or Shankill.

Meeting at the Big Fish and walking through the Cathedral Quarter, visiting Belfast Cathedral and St. Patrick’s Church which houses a fragment of the bone of St. Patrick, taken from Downpatrick to Rome a thousand years ago and returned to Belfast in the 1860’s, finishing at St. Matthew’s Church on the Shankill Road, site of the first church in Belfast, which it is believed was founded by St. Patrick.

Ireland to be reconsecrated to the Sacred Heart in June

Ireland will be reconsecrated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus June 22 in a special Mass celebrated by Archbishop Eamon C. Martin at the International Eucharistic and Marian Shrine in Knock, County Mayo.

Ireland's bishops consecrated the country to the Sacred Heart for the first time in June 1873. The Church celebrates June as the Month of the Sacred Heart, and the feast day occurs annually on the Friday following the second Sunday after Pentecost. This year, it falls on June 27.

According to the Jesuits in Ireland, the countrywide spread of devotion to the Sacred Heart was first initiated by Jesuit Father James Cullen's 1887 appointment as director for Ireland's branch of the Apostleship of Prayer. A 1937 study estimated that about a million faithful were consecrated to the Sacred Heart in connection with the nation's Apostleship of Prayer.

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Consecrating the family to the Sacred Heart was a common practice in Ireland until the 1960s. Families displayed a picture of the Sacred Heart in a central place in their home and kept a lamp burning in front of it.

All-Ireland Sacred Heart Crusade aims to promote devotion to the Sacred Heart throughout the nation in preparation for the June reconsecration, CatholicNews.ie reported Feb. 5. Irish musician Dana Scallon launched the Crusade Feb. 2 during a Sacred Heart Concert in Abbeyleix, County Laois. The event drew attendees from across Ireland and featured four Sacred Heart statues blessed by Pope Francis. These statues will journey throughout the country accompanied by several priests, including Father Shane Gallagher and Father John Mockler.

“The Sacred Heart has brought us all together in His love,” Fr. Mockler said at the event. “My prayer is that the flames of love of the Sacred Heart will penetrate our country and the heart of every person.”

During the annual retreat of the Bishops of Ireland at the shrine, Archbishop Martin, the Primate of All Ireland, introduced an initiative to promote the Sacred Heart Devotion across Ireland as part of the 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope.
