Nominating the next Archbishop of Canterbury

As part of the nomination process for the next Archbishop of Canterbury, the Church of England has launched a public consultation inviting input from around the Anglican Communion. The consultation runs from February 7 to March 28.

The consultation is an opportunity to gather the views of a wide range of people from across the Anglican Communion on the gifts, qualities and skills needed in the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury. Those who take part will also be able to submit names for the Crown Nominations Commission (CNC) to consider.

The CNC will use the themes that emerge through this process to inform the Commission on the needs of the mission of the Church of England and the wider Anglican Communion.

The role of the CNC is to discern whom God may be calling to the ministry. The CNC is a 20-member body, including 17 voting members and up to 3 nonvoting members. 5 of the

voting members are representatives from the Anglican Communion.

Once the full membership of the CNC is known in March, the Commission will convene for its first meeting in May, followed by two further meetings – one in July and one in September. Through these, the Commission will agree the 'Role Profile' and 'Person Specification' for the next Archbishop of Canterbury, and discern the longlist, to shortlist and to interview candidates.

It is not possible to apply for the role of Archbishop of Canterbury. Instead, individuals will be invited into a careful and prayerful process of discernment.

C of E Synod approves new Clergy Conduct Measure

The new Clergy Conduct Measure (CCM) received final approval from the General Synod on Wednesday afternoon to replace the much-criticised Clergy Discipline Measure (CDM).

The Measure passed overwhelmingly in all three houses of the Synod, with no votes against and only three recorded abstentions.

Members warmly welcomed the radical overhaul of clergy discipline, especially the new minor grievance track and protections against vexatious complaints.

A number of speakers, including the Archbishop of York, said that the CCM would help to rebuild trust in the workings of the Church of England.

Canon Kate Wharton (Liverpool), a member of the steering committee for the Measure, reminded the Synod of the significant changes being introduced by the CCM, which would divide complaints into three pathways, depending on the severity of the allegations.

There would also be streamlining of bureaucracy, the abolition of the 12-month time limit for serious misconduct, the integration of safeguarding professionals into the process, better protections against vexatious complaints, and more information-sharing between dioceses and provinces. Deposition from Holy Orders had been reintroduced for the most serious offences.

"To say we need to implement these reforms seems like an understatement in light of recent events," Canon Wharton concluded. "The current system is sick, and we need a healthier one to take us forward."

Many contributors to the debate spoke of the terrible toll that the CDM had taken on clergy who had been unfairly accused and dragged through a years-long stressful and complex judicial process.

Amanda Robbie (Lichfield) said that her husband now suffered from lifelong health problems because of the stress of a vexatious complaint against him. Rebecca Hunt (Portsmouth) told members that she knew of one priest who

had a complaint made against him for not visiting a parishioner while they were in hospital.

The new grievance track available under the CCM should keep minor disputes out of an "inflexible and cruel" tribunal process, Canon Wharton said, as well as protect clergy from complaints arising from pastoral breakdown or doctrinal differences.

The full details of how the CCM would work in practice are still to come, including a definition of the distinction between misconduct and serious misconduct, and will be debated

during July's Synod meeting, when the CCM's rules and code of conduct are due to be brought.

Members nodded through some minor amendments that would bring those clergy working for Royal Peculiars into formal disciplinary proceedings for the first time.

When the Measure came to a vote for final approval, it was carried in all three Houses: Bishops 25-0, with no recorded abstentions; Clergy 128-0, with one recorded abstentions; Laity 145-0, with two recorded abstentions.

Mass attendance rises in the UK, though still far below pre-pandemic levels


Though not yet near pre-pandemic levels, Mass attendance numbers are on the rise in England and Wales, according to figures from the national bishops' conference.

In 2023, an estimated nearly 555,000 people attended Sunday Mass in England and Wales, a roughly 50,000-person increase over 2022, a spokesman for the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales told CNA via email.

The spokesman described the figure as "not a full return to pre-COVID levels, but it is an improvement on recent years." He also noted that the figure may be a "slight underestimation as some parishes may not have given their figures when their diocese requested them."

Stephen Bullivant, director of the Benedict XVI Centre for Religion and Society at St. Mary's University in Twickenham, London, told CNA he is "tentatively hopeful that this trend for modest (re)growth will continue in subsequent years."

He pointed to a 2024 article he wrote for the Tablet in which he noted that while Mass attendance in the U.K. has significantly decreased over the past several decades leading to projections of a near-extinction of Catholicism —

such dire projections seem unlikely due to signs of growth in some areas of U.K. Catholic life. That said, Mass attendance stood at roughly 829,000 across England, Wales, and Scotland on a "typical Sunday" in 2019, Bullivant wrote, meaning attendance still has a long way to climb before it reaches pre-pandemic levels, if ever.


Ex-bishop admits historical indecent assaults on boy

A former bishop has admitted indecent assault on a child, the Church in Wales has said in a statement, BBC News Wales reports.

Anthony Pierce, who was bishop of Swansea and Brecon between 1999 and 2008, appeared at Swansea Crown Court on Friday.

He admitted five counts of indecent assault on a male child under the age of 16, the church said.

It added the offences date from between 1985 and 1990, when Mr Pierce was a parish priest in West Cross, Swansea.Mr Pierce has been remanded on bail and a provisional date of 7 March has been set for sentencing at Swansea Crown Court, the church said.



Allegations came to the church's attention in 2023 when the survivor made a disclosure to its safeguarding officer.

It said the disclosure was immediately passed to the police.

It added following sentencing, the Church in Wales Disciplinary Tribunal would consider further appropriate action.

Jesuit report 'step in right direction' - One in Four CEO

The Chief Executive of One in Four has said she has no doubt that more people will be named as perpetrators and abusers, both by religious orders and other organisations, RTE News reports.

It comes after the Jesuit Order named a further 15 deceased Jesuits who have been the subject of child sexual abuse complaints, eight of whom were already the subject of complaint during their lifetimes.

The other seven first became the subject of complaint after their deaths.

All allegations in these cases have been reported to gardaí and statutory authorities.

Deirdre Kenny welcomed the publication of the report from the Jesuits Order yesterday, but said past experience has proven that organisations have protected themselves.

"This information, being drip fed for decades, is not particularly helpful but I've no doubt - we've known from the scoping inquiry - there are thousands of people out there," she said.

Cardinal Michael Czerny, a Czech-born Canadian Jesuit, is one of the cardinals most closely associated with Francis' pontificate and heads the Vatican office responsible for migrants, the environment, the church's Caritas Internationalis charity and development.

Caritas on Monday warned that millions of people could die as a result of the "ruthless" U.S. decision to "recklessly" stop USAID funding, and hundreds of millions more will be condemned to "dehumanizing poverty."

USAID is the main international humanitarian and development arm of the U.S. government and in 2023 managed more than \$40 billion in combined appropriations, accounting for around 40% of the global aid budget. The Trump administration and billionaire ally Elon Musk have targeted USAID hardest so far in their challenge of federal government spending: A sweeping funding freeze has shut down most of USAID's programs worldwide, though a federal judge on Friday put a temporary halt to plans to pull thousands of agency staffers off the job.

Appointment of Dean of Down

Bishop David McClay of Down & Dromore has appointed the Revd Henry Blair as Dean of Down.

Rev Blair will be instituted as rector of the Lecale Area Mission Partnership (LAMP) on Wednesday 26 February and installed as Dean in Down Cathedral on Sunday 2 March.



He succeeds Dean Henry Hull who retired in December 2023.

Bishop McClay said, "I am delighted that in addition to his new role as rector of LAMP the Revd Henry Blair (Photo above) has accepted the role of Dean of Down.

"A cathedral church today needs increasingly to be a centre of mission. Our heritage of St Patrick's life and ministry gives Down Cathedral a mission focus and the impetus and opportunity for the proclamation of the Gospel.

"Henry's demonstrated zeal for that same Gospel and his love for the worldwide church makes him an outstanding candidate to become the next Dean of Down and rector of LAMP.

"Please pray for him as he undertakes both these roles."

Henry is the Ireland National Director for Sharing of Ministry Abroad (SOMA), prior to which he was Incumbent of the Parish of Tullanisken and Clonoe in the Diocese of Armagh.

He was ordained in 2004 and has a background in both agriculture and accountancy. Henry is married to Helen and they have four grown up sons and three grandchildren.

He said of his appointment, "Helen and I are looking forward to the new season of ministry as rector of the Lecale Area Mission Partnership and getting to know everyone in the area. My appointment as Dean of Down comes as a pleasant surprise and I thank Bishop David for the trust that he is placing in me in this role. We do pray that God will bless our ministry in Down Cathedral and the parish as we see God's kingdom grow in the Lecale area."

Saint Oliver Plunkett honoured on the 400th anniversary of his birth

The 400th anniversary of the birth of the martyred Saint Oliver Plunkett was celebrated at a service of prayer, reflection and celebration in Saint Peter's Jubilee Church, Drogheda, Co Louth, Archdiocese of Armagh, on 12 February.

Those gathered included Archbishop Eamon Martin, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland; Father Eugene Sweeney, Parish Priest of Saint Peter's Church; Father Paul Clayton-Lea, editor of Intercom, who launched the 'Saint Oliver Plunket 400' commemorative booklet; local clergy; Councillor Paddy McQuillan Mayor/Cathaoirleach of Drogheda Borough District; Councillor Kevin Callan, Cathaoirleach, Louth County Council; members/councillors of LCC, Drogheda urban and rural; Joe McGuinness, Acting Chief Executive, LCC; David Conway, Chief Executive Designate, LCC; Colette Moss, Senior Executive Officer, LCC; Moya Hodgers, Acting Arts Officer, LCC, as well as staff and students from Saint Oliver's National School, and from Saint Oliver's Community College.

Father Sweeney said: "Oliver Plunkett lived at a remarkably difficult and chaotic time. His resilience, courage and constant efforts for peace and justice are truly inspiring, and therefore it is appropriate to honour his memory not just in Ireland but further afield.

"We warmly welcome all to the National Shrine of Saint Oliver at Saint Peter's Church, Drogheda, in this special year to honour the martyred Archbishop. We urge pilgrims to pray for peace throughout the world through his intercession, to share with the Lord in the Saint's presence all their hopes and joys, and leave to him their stresses and sufferings, trials and tribulations.

"We are honoured that Saint Peter's Church has been designated a Jubilee Church in this Jubilee Year of Hope. Saint Oliver Plunkett did not succumb to despair, and neither should we 400 years later."
