Bishop of Edinburgh announces retirement date

The Right Rev Dr John Armes has announced that he will retire as Bishop of Edinburgh on 31 August this year.

Bishop John, who was consecrated as 26th Bishop of Edinburgh in May 2012, will reach his 70th birthday later this year. Confirming his retirement in a letter to the Clergy of the Diocese of Edinburgh, he said: "By then I shall be in my fourteenth year as your bishop, a period of ministry which, for me, has been full of joy and a sense of huge privilege."



He continued: "I shall, of course, continue to hold the diocese in prayer as collectively you discern who God may be calling to be your next bishop. I shall do all I can to ensure that the transition is a smooth one – this will include keeping out of the way when necessary!

"In the meantime, please pray for Clare and me and our family at this time of personal transition. After 46 years of full-time ministry there will be a lot to get used to. Please pray also for the Dean and Standing Committee and others who will have particular responsibilities in the electoral process."

Prior to his election as Bishop in 2012, he was Rector of St John's, Princes Street, Edinburgh and Dean of the Diocese of Edinburgh. He arrived in Edinburgh in 1998 after spending time as Area Dean of Rossendale and Priest in Charge of Goodshaw and Crawshawbooth in the Diocese of Manchester.

Candlemas Procession in Christ Church Cathedral



The season of Christmas and Epiphany drew to a close on Sunday (February 2) and was marked in Christ Church Cathedral with a beautiful Candlemas Procession.

Celebrated by Archbishop Michael Jackson and sung by the Cathedral Choir the liturgy for the service was in two parts. A candle lit vigil was kept recalling in readings and music the journey of the holy family to the temple courts of Jerusalem, culminating with the singing of the Candlemas Gospel.

by the vergers joined the procession around the cathedral, ending with the clergy in the baptistery.

The presentation of Jesus in the Temple, greeted by Simeon and Anna, calls for rejoicing. But the prophetic words of Simeon, look towards the passion and Easter.

Christian Aid Ireland's appreciation of the Belfast Cathedral Sitout

We are hugely grateful to the Dean of Belfast, the Very Rev Stephen Forde and all the canons and clergy of the Belfast Cathedral of Saint Anne whose Black Santa sitout this year raised an amazing £200,000.

We went along to the cathedral on Sunday for the annual Good Samaritan service when more than 100 local charities received their share of the total sum. We were delighted to be awarded £20,000.

A portion of the money we received has been ring-fenced to support our humanitarian response in Gaza, with the rest supporting our long-term development projects in countries such as Honduras and Zimbabwe.

Special guest at the service was Lady Mary Peters, who won pentathlon gold at the 1972 Munich Olympic Games.

Last week also marked a new phase in BCC's engagement with local schools as they began a Scripture Union group with P3 and P4 children in Braniel Primary School. This is a partnership with SUNI and Braniel Methodist and 29 children came along – a great start and a wonderful privilege to 'Speak Jesus' in the school setting.

'Speak Jesus' is an initiative to connect and reconnect every home in the Diocese of Down and Dromore with a local parish church so that we can speak Jesus into every life.


In 2025 we want to declare hope and peace in God's presence over every community in the diocese.

Former Canadian PM's view on claims by US President

Former Canadian PM Stephen Harper: "There is no migrant flow happening from Canada to the United States of any significant numbers... And I'm going to tell you right now, drugs, guns, crime—most of those things flow north, not south."

If there is a problem with border security between the States and Canada, it's not on our side. Between Oct. 2023 and September 2024, roughly 43 lbs of fentanyl was seized passing from Canada to the States (compared to 21,100 lbs at the Mexico border). That's the equivalent of a single suitcase.

...but just two weeks ago, 1,840 LBS of cocaine was seized by the Toronto Police, coming from the States INTO Canada.

The Toronto Police have also found that 85% of crime guns they recover have entered Canada from the States.

What does President Trump intend to do to resolve this? Move the goalposts some more, apparently.

First it was "drugs and illegal migrants are pouring in over the Canadian border!" (they aren't); then it was "we're subsidizing Canada by \$200B/year!" (they aren't), then it was "Canada has been treating us unfairly!" (referring to the

trade deals that HE signed last time he was in office), and now it's "they don't allow U.S. banks into their country!"

First, this is false; as of right now, there are 13 American banks that have branches inside Canada.

Second, here's the true part: it HAS been challenging for American banks to make much headway in Canada, but this is for a significant reason: Canada's tighter financial regulations mean that the way those American banks would LIKE to do business (and do south of the border) are illegal in Canada.

Remember during the financial crisis of 2008, when the American government had to bail out their largest banks or they wouldn't survive? ... Yep, because that's what happened.

Remember during the financial crisis of 2008 when the Canadian government had to bail out OUR banks? ...Nope, because that never happened.

There have been 534 bank failures in the States since 2001. The number of Canadian bank failures in that same time is 0.
