Methodist President congratulates new PCI Moderator

The Rev Dr John Alderdice, President of the Methodist Church in Ireland on hearing the designation of the 2025-26 Presbyterian Moderator has said:

“I am delighted to hear of Rev Trevor Gribben’s election as Moderator Designate of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland for 2025-26. It has been a privilege to share with Trevor this year through the Church Leaders group in his capacity as Clerk of the General Assembly. Trevor will be in our prayers as he prepares for his year in office.”

Known as the Moderator-Designate, he will be formally elected and installed as Moderator by the General Assembly, when it meets in Belfast this June. The Tandragee-born 63-year-old is the 13th minister to hold the office of Clerk of the General Assembly since the establishment of the Church in 1840, and will be the 7th Clerk to serve as the Church in its highest office.

Silent church bells are not marrying type

Couples are being “put off” from marrying at a church where bells can no longer be rung because of health and safety concerns, a vicar has said.

The bells at St Wendreda’s Church in March, Cambridgeshire, have been silent since January 2023 when damage to its 140ft (43m) tall spire was discovered.

The Reverend Ruth Clay said she became aware of the problem when a piece of damaged metal, thought to be a bolt, fell to the floor.

Specialists found that metal tie bars in the spire were corroded and recommended that the bells not be rung until the tower could be repaired, the 60-year-old said.

But Ms Clay, who is trying to raise £250,000 for the repairs, said the continued silence of the bells had caused bookings for the building to plummet.

She told BBC News: “It’s really sad when I have to tell a couple that we can’t ring the bells, and perhaps, they might think that they should go somewhere else.”

The bells had been a feature of the church for centuries. Residents were used to waking up to them and hearing them during celebrations, Ms Clay said.

“Couples want all the bells and whistles when they are arranging their big day,” she added.

Ms Clay, who became vicar in 2022, said: “When we investigated, it was discovered that the bells were no longer safe so we had to stop ringing them. We couldn’t risk further metalwork falling until it was mended.”

The church has put in bids for various funds, including the National Lottery Heritage Fund, but has so far only managed to raise £46,000 from donations.

Trump to tackle 'anti-Christian bias' with new White House task force

U.S. President Donald Trump has said he will create a new White House faith office aimed at eradicating what he called "anti-Christian bias" within the federal government.

“You never heard about that one before, but it’s about time,” Trump told attendees of the National Prayer Breakfast,

vowing to sign an executive order making Attorney General Pam Bondi head of the task force.

Trump did not give any examples of anti-Christian bias in the US, and experts say the actions could pose constitutional questions about the separation of church and state.

Trump added that he would create a new commission on religious liberty.

"If we don't have religious liberty, then we don't have a free country," he said.

"Religion is a very good thing. We have to have religion. It suffered greatly over the last few years, but it's coming back. It's coming back strong."

Referencing an assassination attempt on his life in July, the president said: "None of us knows exactly when our time on earth will be over. You never know. A truth I confronted a few short months ago when there was an incident that was not fun. It was not a good thing. But God was watching me.

He continued: "I really believe you can't be happy without religion, without that belief.

"So, let's begin religion back, let's bring God back into our lives."

He joked that his son's faith had also grown since the assassination attempt. "My sons are really good shooters, Don and Eric. They said the chance of missing from that

range with that gun - Don equated it to a one foot put. That's pretty bad. Two feet I can see missing but one foot you can't miss," he joked. "He gained some religion. He went up 25 per cent. If you know him, that's a lot."

Attending the prayer breakfast were families of Israeli hostages. The president said that those still in captivity were in his thoughts, and that he would see every hostage returned.

It comes as an anonymous member of Trump's team expressed shock at his plans for the US to take over the Gaza strip. The source told the New York Times he had not heard of the plans until Tuesday, when Trump announced them.
