Archbishop of Canterbury commends Carers Week

Archbishop Justin Welby said - Caring is at the very heart of what it means to be human. It goes beyond what we do for one another to who we are and were created to be.

By attending to the needs of their relatives, neighbours or friends, unpaid carers point us towards the great aspiration of a society marked by service as love-in-action. I know from my own experience of life and ministry that caring is both hard and life-giving. Children and young people are also often carers and need special support.

Irish comedians to meet Pope Francis during special Vatican event today

Three Irish comedians will be among the 100 entertainers to meet with Pope Francis at the Apostolic Palace on June 14.

Irish comedians Ardal O'Hanlon, Patrick Kielty, and Tommy Tiernan are among 100 entertainers who are set to meet with Pope Francis at The Vatican this Friday, June 14.

O'Hanlon, from Co Monaghan, is perhaps most famous for his role as Father Dougal McGuire on the beloved comedy "Father Ted," while Kielty, from Co Down, took over as host of RTÉ's "The Late Late Show" last year.

Meanwhile, Tiernan, who was born in Co Donegal and later lived in Co Meath, has featured in the smash hit "Derry Girls" and also has his own talk show on RTÉ.

The trio of Irish comedians will be joined by several Irish American comedians as well - Conan O'Brien, Jimmy Fallon, Stephen Colbert, and Jim Gaffigan are also set to attend the event on Friday, according to Vatican News.

Jointly organized by the Vatican's Dicastery for Culture and Education and Dicastery for Communication, Friday's event in the Apostolic Palace is intended to "establish a link"

between the Catholic Church and such artists, a June 8 press release from the Holy See said.

The meeting aims to "celebrate the beauty of human diversity ... [and] promote a message of peace, love and solidarity" and "promises to be a moment of meaningful intercultural dialogue and sharing of joy and hope."

Reuters notes that the press release from the Vatican said Pope Francis "recognizes the significant impact that the art of comedy has on the world of contemporary culture."

"Through the humorous talent and the unifying value of laughter, unique reflections on the human condition and the historical situation are offered today," the Vatican statement said, saying comedy can also "contribute to a more empathetic and supportive world."

Vatican News reports that the statement from the Holy See recalled Pope Francis during an interview with Italian TV channel TV2000 when he said that he prays daily in the words of St. Thomas More, asking the Lord to grant him a sense of humor.

In the past, Pope Francis has acknowledged the power the art of comedy has to contribute to a more empathetic and sympathetic world. He also observed, during his June 2023 encounter with artists in the Sistine Chapel, that, after all, Scripture itself is rich in moments of irony.

On that occasion, the Pope likewise expressed to the artists gathered under Michelangelo's frescoes, his belief that humorists, including actors, artists, cartoonists, and writers, Church News Ireland Page 11

have "the ability to dream up new versions of the world," and often do so "with irony, which is a wonderful virtue."

With fifteen years of leadership experience within the Missionary Sisters of Our Lady of Apostles congregation, Sr. Mary has passionately promoted inter-congregational initiatives, fostering collaboration and unity among us.

In addition to her work within her congregation, Sr. Mary has served as a joint coordinator of a mission animation project in Ireland and has held key roles in SEDOS (Service of Documentation and Study on Global Mission) in Rome, where she currently serves as President.

In 2019, she was elected to the Executive Board of the International Union of Superiors General (UISG), becoming its President in September 2023.



Presbyterians to debate assisted dying as palliative care deemed 'better way'

Church's General Assembly to hear of 'assault on the value of human life, Amy Cochrane writes in the Belfast Telegraph

Euthanasia and assisted dying will be discussed at the Presbyterian Church's General Assembly next week.

The event, which begins on June 20 at Assembly Buildings in Belfast, is one of the largest annual church gatherings on the island of Ireland.

Ministers and elders from the Presbyterian Church in Ireland's 500-plus congregations will attend.

Rev Trevor Gribben, the clerk of the General Assembly, has said the three-day event will include discussion on the reconfiguration of ministry due to declining attendance numbers at weekly services, and resolutions concerning assisted dying and euthanasia.

Assisted dying is illegal in Northern Ireland, but calls have been made in the UK and the Republic of Ireland to bring in legislation on the issue.

Rev Gribben outlined the Presbyterian Church's stance on the issue and explained how, at both the 2015 and 2018

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General Assemblies, members voted to "strongly oppose any legislation which allows assisted suicide or euthanasia". Members also called on the governments in Northern Ireland and the Republic "to ensure the adequate resourcing of both research and delivery in this important area".

Rev Gribben said: "Since then, the issue has become more prevalent.

"While we presented our concerns in December to the Joint Oireachtas Committee on assisted dying, there have been moves since 2018, and more recently than that, to legislate for it in Scotland, the Isle of Man and Jersey.

"This year, new resolutions will be debated on what seems to be a concerted and ongoing assault on the innate dignity and value of human life in these islands."

He suggested that more needs to be done by the Government to fund palliative care for patients.

"We believe all life is sacred, it is the gift of God, and at the Presbyterian Church we are very concerned with issues surrounding abortion and the start of life, but also in issues towards the end of life," he said.

"We are against legislation for assisted suicide and euthanasia. We believe that is wrong.

"We also want to say that there is a better way; it's not the only way.

"And in our report, with some experts in palliative care, including leading academics and physicians, we are calling Church News Ireland Page 20

on the Government to prioritise that better way — and that better way is palliative care.

"In both the north and south of this island, the vast majority of the hospice movement, for instance, is funded by private donations and fundraising and the Government don't really invest in palliative care, which is the better way. "Last year, we gave evidence to the Oireachtas Committee on assisted dying, where two of my colleagues gave evidence and promoted what we believe is a Biblical case that life is a gift of God and sacred, where we shouldn't be going down the road where people will feel pressured to end their lives because they see themselves as an inconvenience to society.

"I think sometimes in what appears to be well-meaning legislative changes, there are unforeseen consequences. And in this area of either people taking life, euthanasia or assisting people to take their own lives, this is something which will make a huge historical change in our society.

"It's not something we should rush into, because it is the latest issue people feel they need to deal with in a modern society."
