# Guatemala reflections by Archbishop of Canterbury

Archbishop Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury, recently spent three impactful days in Guatemala, discussing climate change and its effects on vulnerable communities.

He led prayer services, visited indigenous communities, and offered support to migrants at 'Casa del Migrante.'

"I sat at the feet of a man who had walked for four months with his family from Venezuela," said Archbishop Justin. "His young children were holding my hand. My heart was cracking with the grief of a world where this is necessary.

But he was in the care of Casa Del Migrante, he was surrounded by love. May God give fruit to this love."

Archbishop Justin also travelled to the town of Antigua, where he was given a tour of the ruins of the Cathedral and learned about its restoration. He worshipped with the Anglican community of St Alban and learned about the mission and outreach work the community does in the local area.

visiting Down and Dromore all the way from Pakistan, almost a year after these dioceses formally established a partnership link.



# **Dromore** rector

The Revd Ian
McGrath has
been appointed
as Incumbent of
the Parish of
Knocknamuckley
in the Diocese of
Dromore.



Ian is currently Curate Assistant in the parishes of St James' Shireshead and St John's Ellel, in the Diocese of Blackburn. A date for the service of institution will be announced in due course.

#### **New canons in Dromore Cathedral**

New canons were installed in Dromore Cathedral on 6 June – Revd Canon Myrtle Morrison, rector of St John's Newcastle, and Revd Canon Scott McDonald, rector of St Patrick's and St. Mary's, Newry.

Family friends and supporters came from the two parishes as well as Downpatrick, the Shankill area of Belfast, and Cork.



Dean Geoff Wilson installed the canons, presenting them with their scarves and leading them to their cathedral stalls. Scott becomes Prebendary of Dromara and Myrtle becomes Treasurer.

Archdeacon Mark Harvey preached from 2 Timothy 2:1–15, which depicts the Christ follower as a soldier, an athlete and a farmer. In this passage the Christian life is one characterised by death to self and endurance.

Mark noted that Myrtle and Scott are both commissioned Church Army evangelists whose ministries had followed not dissimilar paths. Both worked in the Shankill Road area (St Matthews and Glencairn), both have ministered in housing estates (Craigavon and Glencairn) and both are now in the Newry and Mourne area.

He continued: "Similar in other, more significant ways – both Myrtle and Scott have been prepared to follow God's call to the hard places, and to the unglamorous places, sometimes at personal and family cost. They have shown faithfulness in those places.

"Our reading from Timothy chapter 2 speaks into this kind of faithfulness in ministry, which applies to some of us here tonight, but it also calls all of us to faithfulness in discipleship."

In concluding his address Archdeacon Mark said: "This evening we thank God for the faithfulness, the hard work and the fruitfulness that we see in Myrtle and Scott, in their lives and in their ministries, and we rejoice that this is being recognised by the wider church."

#### **+Revd Michael Houston**

### The Reverend Michael Houston died on Tuesday 11 June at the Ulster Hospital, Dundonald.

Michael was ordained to the auxiliary/non-stipendiary ministry and served in Bangor Abbey and Donaghadee, before becoming part-time priest-in-charge of the Parish of Ballyphilip and Ardquin in Portaferry.

He spent three years as chaplain to a congregation in Cyprus before retiring to South Down, where he served in the Lecale Group and subsequently LAMP, looking after Ballyculter and Kilclief churches.

The Revd Adrian Dorrian, Vicar of LAMP, said, "Michael was a consummate priest who always brought dignity to the services of worship he conducted. He had a real gift for encouraging and equipping others.

Even after stepping back from day—to—day ministry he continued to lead our Evergreens Group in LAMP. He and his wife June made a real difference in the lives of many of its members. We extend June and the wider family circle our deepest sympathy and the assurance of our love and prayers."

The Funeral Service took place in Christchurch Ballyculter on Saturday past, 15 June.

Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI) host the Churches Election Website which is a central hub for information and resources. There, you will find guides and issue briefings from many of CTE's Member Churches and Charities and Networks in Association. Through the news

section you can keep up to date with how the churches are responding to the election.

#### **Hustings**

Many local Churches Together groups may be hosting a hustings event for their constituency. The Joint Public Issues Team (from the Methodist, Baptist and United Reformed churches) has written an invaluable, detailed hustings guide. If you are holding or plan to hold hustings please also register them on the CTBI site.

#### Using your vote

The deadline to register to vote in the General Election is 18 June. Find out how to register.

At this election, as well as being registered, you will need to show photo ID at the polling station before you vote. Find out what this means for you.

Churches Together in England is a Voter Registration Champion. CTE Principal Officer for Pentecostal, Charismatic and Multi-cultural Relations, Min Shermara Fletcher-Hoyte said: "As well as having a spiritual duty to the communities they serve, churches also have a civic duty and one of the ways they can fulfil this is by encouraging participation in democratic election processes. From this year, voter ID registration is a key requirement for participation and we do not want this to be an obstacle or a tool of ostracism."

The Revd Dr Jonathan Arnold is Executive Director of the Social Justice Network in the Diocese of Canterbury, a charity that helps people at times of crisis, including migration, debt, hunger, homelessness, modern slavery and



exploitation, the rehabilitation of ex-offenders and rural justice. He is an Honorary Research Fellow at the University of Kent, an Associate of Sidney De Hahn Centre for Arts and Health, Christ Church Canterbury University. Jonathan was formerly Dean of Divinity and Fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford, where he was tutor in ecclesiastical history and chair of examiners for the theology faculty. Other books include Music and Faith: Conversations in a Post-Secular Age (2019); Sacred Music in Secular Society (2014); The Great Humanists (2011) and Dean John Colet of St. Paul's (2007).
