Image of the day – Drumhead service opens Armed Forces Day

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"Let us remember and give thanks for the huge commitment and sacrifice of the many who serve, and for the steadfastness of their families and loved ones".

Last weekend, all of Northern Ireland's Armed Forces, Cadets, Veterans Charities and supporters from across the community came together in Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough area for Armed Forces Day 24, to celebrate and promote all our Armed Forces and all they do, and have done for us.

Prior to the event the Mayor of Antrim and Newtownabbey, Councillor Neil Kelly, had the honour of raising the Armed Forces Day Flag to recognise the immense sacrifices made by Armed Forces personnel in many wars and conflicts and to pay tribute to the gallantry of those brave men and women.

The ceremony at the Loughshore Park commenced with a Drumhead service conducted by Canon Nigel Baylor, Rector of Jordanstown, and Rev. Colin Bell, Senior Chaplain Royal Army Chaplains Department.

A Drumhead service draws on the history and traditions of the armed services. It commences with the placing of the drums of the regiment or unit. The drums are always

dedicated. Because they form the altar and the pulpit for the service.

Placed on the drums are the colours of the unit. Mostly these are of two colours - The King's Colour and the unit colours on which will be embroidered any battle honours won by the unit. These serve as the altar falls reminding those present of unit members who have fallen in service. The colours have a tradition of being the rallying point of troops in the days prior to electronic communications. It was around the colours that troops rallied to focus the strength of the unit. And the colours would have been the altar cover from which members would have received Holy Communion before battle and encountering their fate.

Thus the tradition emerged of hanging colours in cathedrals and churches. In remembrance of their role as a rallying point and the sacrifice of those for whom they had been communion vestments.

The parish was founded as a mission area within Fanlobbus in 1843 and ministry was provided by the ACS - The Additional Curates Society. But it's primary vocation was to meet spiritual needs in areas of England affected by the industrial revolution. Coolkellure (Cúil Chéiliúir - the corner of the warbling birds) is in beautiful rural Ireland"

Sad but uplifting service marks closure of Immanuel C of I church

A reader forwarded - "Attending the sad but also uplifting occasion of the final service at Immanuel Church of Ireland, Ardoyne Road - a service of Celebration & Thanksgiving for 60 years of witness and contribution to local community life".



The church was almost halfway between St Mary's on the Crumlin Road and St Mark's, Ligoniel. It was a short distance away from the Ardoyne junction which was a focus of inter-community conflict.

Despite the backdrop of tension the parish proceeded with its range of activities. The scout group went the full distance in maintaining its programme.

Clergy names come to mind such as Canon Warren Jones (c-in-c 1960 - 63), Canon Noel Wilkinson (Rector 1970 - 79) and Canon William Bell.

Bishop Andrew Forster was the Celebrant at a Service of Holy Communion in Saint Columb's Cathedral on Monday morning – the Feast Day of the Birth of Saint John the Baptist – as clergy from throughout the Diocese gave thanks for and celebrated the anniversaries of their ordinations.



It was 45 years to the day since two of those present, the Dean, Very Rev Raymond Stewart (Right) and the Reverend Canon Sam McVeigh (Left), were made deacons in the Cathedral on 24th June 1979.

Other clergy who were celebrating the anniversaries of their ordinations this month were also invited to attend.

Bishop Andrew thanked the Dean for organising Monday's service and thanked all the clergy present for their ministry. "Anniversaries are very special moments, aren't they," he said. "Anniversaries give us the opportunity to reflect back with thankfulness on the journeys that we have – sometimes bumpy, sometimes smooth – of ministry. I want to take the opportunity as Bishop to thank all of you on significant days as we remember and are thankful for ministry, for all that you have given to God and to the Church.

"Ministry isn't about a job, it's vocational. It's who we are, not what we do; and who we are is borne out in the actions of love and faithfulness and diligence in caring for the people of God and in promoting the kingdom of God in a needy world."

The new Curate Assistant, who was ordained to the diaconate last September, had been serving since then in St Patrick's Parish in Broughshane, many of whose congregation made the 45-mile trip to Clooney for the evening Service.

Their journey can't have been as eventful, though, as Bishop Andrew's earlier in the day when – after preaching at an anniversary service in Holy Trinity Church in Dunfanaghy – a Garda motorcycle escort facilitated his passage through heavy international rally traffic to help him get to the church

in Londonderry on time. The Bishop said that as he drove past the Mount Errigal Hotel, flanked by Garda outriders, he thought that some in the crowd of spectators mistook him for the winner of the rally.

A Spirituality of Summer by Gemma Simmonds CJ

The liturgical life of the church tells us that times and seasons matter. Our whole cycle of life as Christians expressed in liturgy and sacrament offers embodied signs of the presence around us of the incarnate God, alive within our own bodies, in the bodies of others and within the whole of creation.

Liturgically, summer is 'ordinary time', when, after the Ascension, we begin to come to terms with the absence of Jesus' earthly body and get the measure of what 'This is my body' might mean in day-to-day terms.

Of course, it has a specific meaning in connection with the Eucharist and Jesus' words at the Last Supper. But part of what we might call a 'spirituality of summer' is an invitation to a more contemplative approach to the life of our senses, noticing more acutely the world as it comes alive all around us.

Summer reminds us of the insane generosity of God. Trees and plants flower and fruit in a way that can seem almost criminally wasteful. Neither animals nor humans can eat and use all the fruit that emerges from the trees and bushes. If a spirituality of summer tells us anything, it is that the fruition of the earth, the fruit of time spent contemplatively going about our daily tasks, is always going to be more than we can calculate and make use of in obvious ways.

A sense of 'the sacrament of the present moment' can liberate us from the tyranny of time, dominated by market forces and the idolization of work and of productiveness as value. The God whose times and seasons are full of generous wastefulness invites us in the summer, perhaps more vividly than at other times, to hear 'this is my body' as an invitation to savour the beauties of creation.
