## **Archbishop of Canterbury moved beyond words by Saint Oscar Romero**

This visit was at the invitation of Archbishop Hosam Naoum, the Anglican Primate in Jerusalem for the Episcopal Church in Jerusalem and the Middle East.

As Diocesan Bishop, Archbishop Hosam oversees the 28 parishes scattered across five political regions: Israel, Palestine, Jordan, Syria, and Lebanon.

At the Patriarchate, they received a warm welcome from Patriarch Nourhan Manougian and Fr. Aghan Gogchyan. Following this, they were given tours of St. James' Cathedral and the Armenian sections of the Holy Sepulchre, which included the rarely visited Chapel of St. Vartan.


## Elvis Presley's personal Bible has sold at auction for \$120,000

The Bible was one of three found on the singer's bedside table the night he died in 1977 at his home Graceland. He was 42.

Elvis' faith was very important to him and he often turned to the Bible for comfort and inspiration. He was known to say a prayer before every performance and his Bible is considered to be a significant piece of musical history. It contains underlined passages and bookmarked pages, including one from the book of Job, 31:24-28:

"If I have put my trust in gold or said to pure gold, 'You are my security,' if I have rejoiced over my great wealth, the fortune my hands had gained, if I have regarded the sun in its radiance or the moon moving in splendour, so that my heart was secretly enticed and my hand offered them a kiss of homage, then these also would be sins to be judged, for I would have been unfaithful to God on high."

The Bible which is embossed in gold with the singer's name, was discovered by Elvis's cousin, Patsy Presley and his father, Vernon as they sorted through his personal belongings. A letter written by Patsy accompanies the Bible: "Shortly after Elvis' passing, my uncle Vernon (Elvis' dad) and I went up into Elvis' bedroom at Graceland to organise and pack many of his personal belongings. This Holy Bible was one of three that Elvis had on his night table. After packing them, Uncle Vernon had me take them home for safekeeping and eventually gave them to me."



As a child Elvis' parents took him to church where he sang Gospel and in a 1977 interview he said:

"I've always liked music. My mother and dad both loved to sing. And they did tell me that when I was about three or four years old I got away from them in church and walked in front of the choir and started beating time...When I got

old enough, I started to sing in church. That is one of the ways I got into singing... It's just part of you. You don't even think about it.

"And when we get through work, what we have to do, we usually end up doing gospel," he added. "Because we wanna do it. We do two shows a lot of times and afterward we will go upstairs and sing gospel songs, until daylight."

His stepbrother, Billy Stanley told Faithwire: "He was a Christian, and most people don't know that...When I say 'Christian,' he was a Bible-carrying Christian...wherever he went, he took the Bible with him."

Stanley told Arkansas Democrat-Gazette that when fans described him as 'the King' he would say: "No, no, I'm sorry. There's only one true king, and that's Jesus."

The Bible received 23 bids before being bought by an anonymous bidder at Kruse GWS Auctions.



## Irish News - Meeting Pope Francis was a great and a moving event - Archbishop John McDowell

The Church of Ireland Archbishop of Armagh's meeting with the Pope reminded him of a lifetime of friendships with Catholics but also the cost of division in Northern Ireland

The meeting between the primates of the worldwide Anglican Communion and Pope Francis which took place on May 2 has been described as a significant event in the life of the Communion.

While continuing to acknowledge our many differences, the warmth of the relationship between the Anglican Communion and the Roman Catholic Church has deepened in every way and the meeting with Pope Francis was another example of the strengthening of that relationship.

A theological commission involving Anglicans and Roman Catholics has been in more or less continuous session since the 1970s and has produced regular reports which have been considered by the faithful in both traditions. All across the world parishes meet in groups and ecumenical fellowships to study and to worship together.



The same is true of Anglican and Catholic bishops. Here in Ireland we meet semi-formally each autumn to discuss matters of common concern.

At national level the friendship and fellowship in the gospel which I enjoy with Archbishop Eamon Martin has been a tremendous encouragement to me. I know too, for instance, from his own comments to Pope Francis, that my friend Azad Marshall, the senior Anglican bishop in Pakistan, derives great heart from his cooperation with his Catholic counterpart in a country where Christians of every tradition face the daily challenges of a persecuted minority.

I don't suppose we'll ever manage to find anything like complete convergence on the details of The Faith, although by careful listening we can at least ensure that we don't misunderstand or misrepresent each other.

However, we can work towards a deepening relationship in terms of faith, hope and love. Faith in the sense of standing outside the shelter of our own limitations and depending solely on the Lord of the Church with all the trust and expectancy of the earliest disciples. Hope, not in the sense of a false optimism that all is well, but in the conviction that the Lord of History is drawing us closer together in the building of the Kingdom to look just a little bit more like a new heaven and a new earth. And the deepening of our bonds of love and affection – actively caring for one another in a world where the challenges of the day are so vast and so complicated that no-one can carry this moment alone. However, speaking personally for a moment, the meeting with Pope Francis went deeper for me than even these great things.

Our attitudes and character are formed much more by early impressions and relationships than they are by almost everything else in later years.



On Thursday 2 May Archbishop John McDowell met Pope Francis in an audience with colleagues as part of the 2024 Anglican Primates Meeting in Rome.

My early years were marked by close friendships with Catholic neighbours and I can assure you that as children and adolescents we weren't talking about the Petrine Primacy or the doctrine of the Real Presence. The wax of our personalities was still soft and the impression went very deep – the impression of warmth and affection and of great fun and of lovWe shared our dreams and lived a common reality which the investment in division which has marked the ordinary experience of Northern Ireland has no power to erase. Much friendship; much laughter; great happiness.

Meeting Pope Francis was a great and a moving event. In part because of the personal warmth and geniality that he radiates, only half obscuring a profound mind and an iron will. But also because it was simply a continuation of all those years of happy meetings and happy memories which I have experienced since my childhood and which, I believe, every child has a right to have on offer and to enjoy.
