Derry Church Service for Royal Naval Association marks Battle of the Atlantic

On Sunday morning All Saints' Cloooney welcomed

parishioners, members of the local community and representatives of the Royal Navy to mark the 80th Anniversary of VE day and the surrender of the Battle of the Atlantic.

The Band of HM Royal Marines lead the parade to church with pageantry and flair. Their unique blend of military music and tradition set the tone for the service to follow.

Vice Lord Lieutenant Mr Alan Moore OBE, Senior Naval Officers, Royal Naval Association Shipmate Robert Buchanan (Chairman No.12 Area) as well as other members



of the Royal Navy Association, Royal Navy Veterans and Royal Navy Cadets were all in attendance. The service was also attended by Lord Hay, Gary Middleton MLA, Niree McNorris, Deputy Mayor Darren Guy and several other dignitories.


Canon David McBeth, Chaplain of the local branch of the Royal Naval Association, delivered a poignant sermon. He spoke of how these men gave themselves for others. "They



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did not seek fame. They only sought to serve and to keep hope alive across an ocean."

Canon McBeth said how this echoed "the greatest sacrifice ever made: the sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the Cross." He spoke of how "Jesus laid down His life; not just for friends, but for enemies. For sinners. For you. For me. He crossed not a raging ocean, but the abyss of sin and death." This emphasised how



sailors of the Atlantic convoys stood between tyranny and freedom and Christ stood between sin and salvation.

The solemnity continued at the wreath laying and the tolling of the bell ceremony, for lost shipmates. It was a powerful reminder of the strength and resilience of those who served and the supreme price they paid. These Acts of Remembrance honoured the courage of all those who faced the cruel seas and how over the course of the battle,

thousands of merchant ships and tens of thousands of lives were lost.

The parish stated, "We are thankful for every person who shared in today's memorial service. Together we remembered the heroes of the Battle of the Atlantic, we honoured their courage, their sacrifice, and the legacy they left behind. Let us carry their memory forward and never take for granted the freedom they fought to protect."

### An international delegation of Anglican Primates and church leaders joined representatives from global Christian Communions at the inauguration of Pope Leo XIV.

In his address from St Peter's Square, Pope Leo XIV emphasised themes of unity, peace, and mission. He called on the Church to be a "sign of unity and communion, a leaven for a reconciled world," and invited all believers to

the "listen to Christ's offer of love and become his one family for in the one Christ, we are one."

Leading the Anglican delegation was the Most Revd Leonard Dawea, Bishop of Temotu and Primate of the Anglican Church of Melanesia. Archbishop John McDowell of the Church of Ireland was a delegate.

# Tipperary priest recalls his time in Rome with newly elected Pope Leo XIV

A Tipperary priest, who met the man elected as Pope Leo XIV on several previous occasions, has said the new pontiff knows Ireland very well.

Speaking to RTÉ after the new pontiff's election earlier this week, Fr Iggy O'Donovan and Pope Leo XIV met while studying for the priesthood in Rome and are both members of the Order of Saint Augustine.

"The first time I met Bob Prevost, as I knew him, was in 1981 when he came as an undergraduate student to Rome.

"I was studying history there at the time, and we knew each other there. I would have been there a few years while now Leo XIV was a student.

"Canon law was his specialty at that time. And I do recall that in 1982, he was ordained, and I was one of those invited to his ordination in Rome, a sweltering day in '82."

Fr O'Donovan now lives in Dublin and is based at St Augustine and St John's Church - or John's Lane Church as it's known locally - in the Liberties.

He said the new leader of the Catholic Church rose through the ranks quickly.

"He was certainly organised. He was a worker, highly organised, highly intelligent, a polyglot - he speaks several languages - and very determined at whatever it was he did.

"He became Prior General of Augustinian Order, provincial of the American province and then bishop in Peru.

"Pope Francis saw something (in him) and brought him to Rome and put him as the head of the bishops' congregation and now his fellow cardinals have selected him, so it is a proud moment for us Augustinians."

Asked about what sort of papacy he thinks Pope Leo XIV will have based on his previous meetings with him, Fr O'Donovan said it will very much be a case of "steady as she goes".

He said: I noticed in his, if we call it, his victory speech, he invoked Pope Francis a great deal, and kept using that word, peace, peace - pace pace pace in Italian - all the time.

"I think he will be using, like Francis did, the moral authority of the papacy - which is very important given the moral bankruptcy that is politically around the world at the moment - to have a bit of hope on the horizon as Francis gave us. And I think Leo XIV will do the same."

Fr O'Donovan also said that Pope Leo XIV is no stranger to these shores.

"He has been to Ireland several times, certainly at Augustinian gatherings and chapters and so forth.

"I have a distinct memory of him visiting my native Tipperary in Fethard. He certainly was there, and there must be a photographic record of that.

"He's been to Ireland. He would know Ireland very very well, and the Irish Augustinian province very, very well."

As he takes up his new ministry in the Vatican, Fr O'Donovan said he will be praying for the man that he studied there with all those years ago.

"He's facing an awesome task. It's a lonely job, and in great parts of the world, the Church is in grave crisis, like our own part of the world that is true, and he knows that."

"He's realistic enough to face that. The Church is thriving in other parts of the world, but overall, there are many problems that are only too well known that he faces.

"It's a difficult lonely job, and our prayers and good wishes go to him," Fr O'Donovan added.

### Westminster Abbey memorial to World War 1 nurse

# The funeral of British nurse Edith Cavell took place at the Abbey this month 1919.

Cavell served as a nurse during the First World War in German-occupied Belgium, where she famously treated wounded soldiers from both sides whilst helping some 200 men escape the country.

The funeral at the Abbey took place five years after her death. Her coffin, draped with the Union flag, was carried on a gun carriage through streets lined with mourners. ### Practical resource to help encourage connections and conversations across the generations

The C of I Children and Family Ministry write -Following on from our video we want to provide a simple, practical resource to help encourage connections and conversations across the generations in your church.

Fostering a sense of belonging and value is particularly important for Children and Young people. They are active

members of the Church family and co-journeyers in faith, not a passive audience. So we hope that this pack will help inspire new conversations, connections and a greater sense of belonging and ownership - as well as helping to share the load.

Many Churches struggle to get people practically involved in the running of the Church, and in a lot of cases, it is left to the Wardens and Clergy to do most of the jobs. We hope to counter this trend by helping people rediscover the Church as a family where everyone has a valuable role.

Think through all the little jobs that happen before, during and after a service, choose ones which others can easily do and write them out clearly on the cards in our pack. Communicate to your congregation (all ages) a week or sobefore you start, that this is a great opportunity for everyone to get involved in the life of the church, regardless of age, experience, language or time in the church.

Use the template cards in the pack. Write clearly: The task; What they will need; Where they find the equipment they need; When in the service they carry out this task; Who to ask for help - and ideally include a photo, don't assume everyone knows everyone else's names!

Laminate and pin the cards to a board before people arrive, and encourage families and individuals to choose a card and task to do that week. Every week, they can choose a new task to try.

Two main reasons that put people off from helping out are fear of long-term commitment and uncertainty about tasks. Church News Ireland Page 18

We hope that this resource will encourage clarity about the tasks and give opportunities to try different things. In turn, this will not only help increase volunteering in the church across all ages, but crucially provide practical ways in which adults, young people & children can build connections with each other and foster a greater sense of belonging.

Yes, some days it might feel like it would be easier to just do it all yourself! But consider how much more connected people will feel when they take an active role, how the sense of belonging will grow, how conversations might blossom between people who wouldn't ordinarily mix together, and how the rhythm of participation will increase until it becomes habit.

### **Going Home to Mayo, Winter, 1949** by Paul Durcan - who died last week

Leaving behind us the alien, foreign city of Dublin My father drove through the night in an old Ford Anglia, His five-year-old son in the seat beside him,

The rexine seat of red leatherette,

And a yellow moon peered in through the windscreen.

'Daddy, Daddy,' I cried, 'Pass out the moon,'

But no matter how hard he drove he could not pass out the moon.

Each town we passed through was another milestone And their names were magic passwords into eternity:

Kilcock, Kinnegad, Strokestown, Elphin,

Tarmonbarry, Tulsk, Ballaghaderreen, Ballavarry;

Now we were in Mayo and the next stop was Turlough, The village of Turlough in the heartland of Mayo,

And my father's mother's house, all oil-lamps and women, And my bedroom over the public bar below,

And in the morning cattle-cries and cock-crows:

Life's seemingly seamless garment and gorgeously rent By their screeches and bellowings. And in the evenings I walked with my father in the high grass down by the river Talking with him - an unheard of thing in the city

But home was not home and the moon could be no more outflanked

Than the daylight nightmare of Dublin city:

Back down along the canal we chugged into the city And each lock-gate tolled our mutual doom;

And railings and palings and asphalt and traffic-lights, And blocks after blocks of so-called 'new' tenements -Thousands of crosses of lonelinesses planted In the narrowing grave of the life of the father; In the wide, wide cemetery of the boy's childhood.
