

# Church Army UK & Ireland facing difficult decisions amid restructuring due to financial pressures

Church Army UK & Ireland, a registered missional charity focused on evangelism among marginalized communities, has issued an urgent call for prayer as it faces severe financial strain—warning that job redundancies are "likely" and that "significant changes to the way we work" are imminent, Chris Eyte writes in Christian Daily International.

A press release issued in February, followed by a LinkedIn post on March 24, announced that major restructuring is underway to address the financial shortfall, with changes affecting both the organisation's structure and how it delivers its services.

To date, the charity has covered its operational deficits through financial reserves, but projections indicate those reserves will be exhausted within a year unless immediate action is taken.

"Like many other charities today, we are facing financial challenges," stated the Church Army post on LinkedIn. "So, we are proposing a major restructure to become more sustainable, while also re-focusing on our core mission of igniting faith and restoring life across the UK and Ireland.

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"We'll have to make some tough decisions, including likely redundancies and significant changes to the way we work."

Employees were informed about the proposed changes on Feb. 26, with a formal consultation now underway. The charity said it is working alongside Anglican dioceses and other missional partners to explore sustainable solutions and prevent the closure of key projects.

Implementation of the changes is expected by April 2026.

"Yet, we know that as the world grapples with division, loneliness, and uncertainty, the role of faith in providing meaning and purpose has never been more vital," the release said.

**Church Army CEO Matt Barlow** affirmed the organization's ongoing commitment to gospel outreach, even amid transition.

"As we refocus our resources, we want to ensure that the message of Jesus Christ remains accessible and relevant to those searching for meaning in the midst of the challenges they're facing," Barlow said. "Thank you for standing with us as we pray for Church Army."

The planned changes include a strategic shift from operating high-cost projects to prioritizing training and equipping people for evangelism—particularly in communities facing poverty and distress.

Church Army UK & Ireland has gained good standing for training evangelists in providing practical support to those in need, while sharing the good news about Jesus.

Barlow expressed deep regret over the impact the restructuring will have on staff and communities.

"We've had to make incredibly tough decisions to ensure a financially sustainable future for Church Army, while delivering more broadly on our mission and charitable objectives," he said. "I feel deeply for every member of our

team and the communities we serve who these proposed changes may impact. The changes are not a reflection of the passion and dedication our staff demonstrate every day in their work, nor a reflection of the positive impact we have had in the communities we serve."

He added that the charity is investing in compassionate transition support, including career assistance and pastoral care.

However, Barlow also believes the charity still has an important role in addressing the issue of spirituality as the world struggles with "division, loneliness and uncertainty."

"This restructuring is an opportunity to position ourselves to meet this growing openness," he said. "We recognise the deep need for faith, hope, and connection in today's world. As we refocus our resources, we want to ensure that the message of Jesus Christ remains accessible and relevant to those searching for meaning in the midst of the challenges they're facing."


"While the process of resizing and restructuring is immensely painful, we believe there is a bright future for Church Army. Returning to our core mission of training and equipping not just commissioned evangelists but anyone with a sense of calling to mission and evangelism, especially to those facing poverty and distress."

The Right Reverend Dr. Guli Francis-Dehqani, chair of the Board of Trustees, said the decision came after "deep reflection and prayer."

"We remain committed to financial integrity, transparency, and mission-driven action and open to what God might be leading us towards next," she said. "Our responsibility is to sustain the work of this 140-year-old charity for future generations."

# Delegates from Irish churches will take part in Focolare community event in Rome this week

The Focolare community day on Sunday 23rd March was marked with variety, internationality, but most of all, an atmosphere of family. People from Canada, Mexico, Brazil, Lithuania, Ukraine and Italy were among the 80



## or so people who filled the Focolare Centre in Prosperous, Curryhills, Co Kildare.

The morning programme, where adults and children were together, featured music, a game with balloons, throwing a huge 'dice of love, a minute of silence for peace (Timeout), and a focus on this month's word of life: 'Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye'. (See Word of Life March 2025 @FocoB).

In mixed age buzz groups, participants enjoyed a moment of introspection as they considered how they had or had not lived this phrase from the Gospel this month. One man commented that he liked the emphasis in the commentary of reviving a practice of the early days of Focolare: to see the people we meet – at home, school, work etc, as new..... covering everything with love. A woman studying psychotherapy shared how this introspection and non judgemental approach to people was perfect for counseling.

In the afternoon, the children and young people had a separate programme involving, among other things, games and planting trees, while the adults focused on the second pillar of the Focolare's spirituality: the Will of God. An audio visual presentation lead to an exchange of powerful stories from life highlighting the freedom and creativity released in people when they do God's will. (see The Will of God I Ep.2 "On Point: A Guide to Living a Spirituality of Unity").

The day concluded with some local news – two recent retreats for Confirmation classes in Curryhills; an upcoming

Ecumenical meeting in Rome next week to be attended by 14 delegates from Ireland from the Church of Ireland, Presbyterian, Methodist and Catholic Churches; and an upcoming presentation of the Join the Dots Together initiative to NI Executive Office Committee next week. Join the Dots together involves over 100 faith groups who are working together for climate justice and peace.

# Scottish Episcopal Church joins call for U.K. government to act on child poverty

On March 23, the Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, the Most Rev. Mark Strange, joined more than 30 faith leaders across the United Kingdom in sending an open letter to call for bold action on child poverty.

The letter was sent to Liz Kendall, secretary of state for works and pensions, and to Bridget Philipson, secretary of state for education.

It reads in part, "We write to you as faith leaders from communities across the UK to encourage you to be bold and ambitious in your upcoming Child Poverty Strategy. We welcome the government's acknowledgement in its manifesto that the UK's increasing levels of child poverty and reliance on emergency food are a 'moral scar' on our nation. Without action this scar will deepen, with an additional 400,000 children set to be pulled into poverty over the next decade."

Strange said, "This letter comes from a place of hope – hope that the call for action on child poverty [will](#) be

heeded by those in power, and that our representatives take the time to listen and learn from those most affected.

"Across the Scottish Episcopal Church there are congregations large and small that are doing their part in their local communities to target poverty; from hosting food banks, clothing banks and breakfast clubs, to offering warm spaces in cold weather or simply a place to be welcomed on Sundays or during the week.

"This is part of our call to minister, and as people of hope, we are always seeking to do more. This letter calls on our leaders to do the same – to seek to do more to support those whose lives are made that much more difficult due to the grinding effects of poverty."

# Vatican launches new pastoral guide to strengthen advocacy for human Life

Amid ongoing global challenges that threaten human dignity, the Vatican has introduced a new pastoral resource titled "Life is Always a Good: Initiating Processes for a Pastoral Care of Human Life".

The initiative, released to mark the 30th anniversary of "Evangelium Vitae", seeks to inspire a renewed commitment to the defense and promotion of life in all circumstances.

Cardinal Kevin Farrell, Prefect of the Dicastery for Laity, Family, and Life, highlighted the urgency of this initiative, emphasizing that every human life must be valued and protected. In his introduction to the resource, he drew

attention to contemporary crises—including war, violence, poverty, and discrimination—that make a pastoral approach to life more necessary than ever. He also referenced the Vatican's recent declaration "Dignitas Infinita", which reaffirmed the inalienable dignity of every human being, regardless of their condition or circumstances.

The document is the result of extensive dialogue with bishops from around the world, many of whom expressed their concerns during their "ad limina" visits to Rome.

According to Archbishop Dario Gervasi, the Dicastery's Adjunct Secretary, this collaboration reflects a collective desire to enhance the Church's efforts in defending human life at all stages.

A webinar held in 2024 with representatives from episcopal conferences laid the groundwork for this process, ensuring that the pastoral strategy aligns with the Church's latest teachings.



A Synodal Approach to Defending Life The new resource offers a method for applying synodal discernment to life-related issues, helping dioceses develop tailored pastoral programs suited to their specific cultural and geographic contexts. Rather than providing rigid guidelines, it encourages an open and dynamic approach, allowing local churches to adapt their strategies according to their needs.

Bishop Gervasi underscored the importance of collaboration in this endeavor, stating that the goal is to equip dioceses

French and Spanish versions are set to be released soon.

## St Dominic's off to the Old Bailey after win in mock trial contest

Students from a Belfast school will visit the Old Bailey next month after being judged the best in Northern Ireland in a courtroom competition, Mark Bain writes.

Year 10 pupils from St Dominic's Grammar got a taste of courtroom drama in the Young Citizens Magistrates' Court Mock Trial competition.

After losing out by a point in the judging last year, they made no mistake making the case when they returned for the regional heat at Newry Courthouse.

#### March 29, 2025

They will now be judged against some of the best young legal minds in the UK in the national final.

"It has given everyone a real buzz of excitement," said teacher-in-charge Katy Tweed.

"We lost out last year to Strathearn School and the girls were determined not to miss out this year.

"They all put in hours of preparation, working on the case notes, making sure they knew everything inside out."

In the Northern Ireland final, St Dominic's were pitted against Belfast Royal Academy — taking it in turns to play defence and prosecution in a bid to win the case involving possession of an offensive weapon at a football match.

"It gave them all an incredible insight into what it takes to run a courtroom," added Ms Tweed.

"There were plenty of nerves ahead of the case being heard, but it was fantastic for the girls to have the help of barrister Lauren Bohill — a perfect young female role model for them to aspire to when they were preparing the case.

"And now they'll likely have to do it all again. We're just waiting anxiously to see what the case will be for the national finals.

"Even being in and around Newry courthouse sparked a real enthusiasm in the pupils."

All those involved in judging the performance of the schools were professional court judges, KC barristers and magistrates.

"The pupils got a lot of great feedback from the judges and it's really helped some of them believe it might be a career they wish to follow," Ms Tweed said.

"They all showed a great maturity in what they were able to show in a courtroom setting.

"They're 13-14 years-old and it was remarkable to watch them perform so professionally in what was a high-pressure setting. They managed to win both as prosecution and defence." Courtesy Belfast Telegraph 27/04/2025

# Cathedral Calls

A Golden
Cope and
Magnificent
Mitre

This object of the month is an impressive cope and matching mitre from the collections, which were made for Archbishop Robert Runcie.



Did you know?



This year marks the 45th Anniversary of Robert Runcie's enthronement on 25 March, 1980.

A 'cope' is a semi-circular cloak worn by clergy for major ceremonies; a 'mitre' is the headwear of bishops, and a symbol of their office.

The cope and mitre were designed by Beryl Dean (1911-2001), one of the most important embroiders of the 20th century, who developed a distinctive and ground-breaking style of church embroidery. The cope was worked mainly by Elizabeth Elvin, and the mitre by Pamela Waterworth.

They were worn by Runcie for a Eucharist on 26 March 1980, the day after his enthronement - a day which was also Budget Day. This cope is made from gold lurex fabric and



other materials, with rich embroidery and appliqué, lined in brown cloth. Its clasp, known as a 'morse', was made by Jim Brasier, the then Head Virger. The embroidery design is based on ordnance survey maps of Kent. The Canterbury Cross features in the design of both cope and matching mitre.


