Blessington Union cooks up a storm for church restoration fund

Blessington Union of Parishes received huge support for their first fundraising event in aid of the restoration of St John's Church, Ballymore Eustace on Thursday May 1.

The parish welcomed celebrity chef, Neven Maguire to Tulfarris Hotel & Golf Resort for a cooking demonstration which launched the major restoration project for St John's.

The renowned chef and his highly professional team presented a spectacular cookery demonstration in front of an enthusiastic crowd of over 400 attendees.

Nevin absolutely wowed the audience, as did Aisling Giltrap–Mills who was the MC for the night. Aisling's incredible sense of humour quickly set the scene for what was to come – a thoroughly relaxing and good humoured approach to good food, cooked beautifully. It wasn't difficult to see why Neven has such a loyal group of followers. His easy manner and friendly disposition, combined with his exceptional skill as a chef, had everyone engaged from the very beginning.

Before the cookery demonstration began, Neven took time to browse around the selection of artisan's stalls in the courtyard of Tulfarris, chatting with the stall-holders and checking out their produce.

To the delight of the fundraising team, the enormous goodwill and support for this project from the wider Church News Ireland

community in the Blessington, Ballymore and surrounding area was evident on the night.

Fr Joe Connolly from the Church of the Immaculate Conception in Ballymore Eustace and Fr Gerry Kane from the Church of Our Lady Parish in Blessington were in attendance, along with many of their parishioners. Public representatives were also in evidence.

St John's is a beautiful church of the 'First Fruits', which was built in1820. It is nestled in the trees on a hill just outside Ballymore Eustace and holds a very special place in the hearts of so many who live in the area.

The church is situated close to the site of a medieval church which dates back to 1192. The graveyard contains important High Crosses and ancient grave slabs. Inside the building, there is a large 12th century granite font which is thought to originate from the earlier medieval church.

St John's is home to a stone effigy of a knight, Thomas FitzEustace who died in 1454. It is thought to have been brought to the church for safekeeping in 1919 from Old Kilcullen.

There are several spectacular stained glass windows attributed to Drake, Hardman and Powell, including a vivid depiction of Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane in the Sanctuary, thought to be the only depiction of its kind in the country.

The Restoration work, which is due to commence this summer, will be carried out over a series of phases and will Church News Ireland Page 8

include roof and structural repairs, heating system upgrades, external wall restoration and stained glass window conservation.

Representative Church Body Library's special screening at General Synod of 'A Hundred Years After Disestablishment'

Thanks to the work of the C of I's Representative Church Body Library there will be a special screening of a film produced by Radharc Films to mark the centenary of Disestablishment of the Church of Ireland, broadcast on RTÉ in 1970.

This special screening for General Synod 2025, which begins this Friday (9th May), has been made possible with the permission of The Radharc Trust:

Fifty-five years ago, in 1970 a 29-minute film produced by Radharc Films for the national broadcaster RTÉ marked the centenary of the Disestablishment of the Church of Ireland. Whilst its existence was known about (as the RCB Library holds still images or cuttings of the footage devoted to the opening of the Library in Braemor Park), the full original Church News Ireland

footage of the film was considered lost. Lost, that is, until staff in the Library located an unmarked 16mm cine film.

With the assistance of the Radharc Trust the film was digitally remastered to reveal the original broadcast footage,

which opens with the presenter Paul Loughlin standing on a roof top in Tailors' Lane, Dublin, with the Synod Hall and Christ Church Cathedral in the background.

The remainder of the film shows footage of various events in the centenary anniversary year during 1970, including the special centenary service held on St Patrick's Day in

Armagh Cathedral; interviews with Archbishops George Otto Simms and Alan Buchanan; and the launch of the book Irish Anglicanism – a collection of essays edited by Fr Michael Hurley (Jesuit priest and founder of the Irish School of Ecumenics).

At a service in the chapel at Gonzaga



College Dublin, in April 1970, Fr Hurley gifted the first copy to Archbishop Simms 'as a tribute of recognition and gratitude' from non-Anglican scholars for the Church of Ireland's role in Irish life since Disestablishment in 1869. The film also includes footage of the opening of the new RCB Library in Braemor Park in October 1969 – considered a gift to ecumenical scholarship – and finally a think-tank for young people held in a hotel in Co. Wicklow to discuss where the Church was heading in the future.

The film is remarkable for many reasons, not least because it was independently written and produced by Fr Des Forristel (1930-2012), a priest of Dublin Archdiocese and writer, who along with another Dublin priest, Fr Joe Dunn, founded Radharc which was involved in the production of programmes on topics relating to religious, historical and social issues (in anticipation of the founding of RTÉ). At this Church News Ireland



difficult time for inter-church relations on the island, the film reveals deep respect for the contribution of the Church of Ireland and captures sound and images of significant ecumenical relationship-building encounters that were ahead of its time.

The commentary provides a balanced and largely positive reflection about the impact of Disestablishment which, it suggests, effectively saved the unity of the Church of Ireland as an all-island Church from subsequent political divisions.

The RCB Library has collaborated with The Radharc Trust and the Irish Film Institute to bring this unique film which captures important moments in time back into the public domain. The Library is grateful for the assistance of Peter Kelly of The Radharc Trust, and Neil Moxham of the Irish Film Institute.

A copy of Irish Anglicanism, as presented by the editor to the RCB Library in 1970, including the text of the speeches

of both Fr Michael Hurley and Archbishop Simms, will also be on display at General Synod.

Cathedral Calls

Christian Aid hails unearthed Belfast Cathedral archive document of its earliest years

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Christian Aid has hailed the unearthing of a document from 1945 showing that **Belfast was** already raising funds for World War **Two refugees** at the time peace was declared, Adam Kula writes. In the **Belfast** Newsletter.

The

programme for the VE Day service of thanksgiving on May 13, 1945, was found among the archives of St Anne's Church of Ireland Cathedral in Belfast.

It details a collection for "Christian Reconstruction in Europe", a group which was formed in the latter part of the war.

"Christian Reconstruction in Europe" was founded by British Council of Churches. It changed its name to Christian Aid soon afterwards.

The charity says the programme is among the first historic mentions of the group.

In a fundraising push across Britain and Ireland, the nascent charity raised more than £80,000 (equivalent to more than £3 million in today's money) to assist the refugees, often to pay for food parcels sent to those living in DP (displaced persons) camps.

Across the whole continent, it has been estimated that as many as 65 million people were forced from their homes by the war. Millions more fled the Japanese aggression in Asia.

Cathedral dean Stephen Forde said: "This document proves that within days of VE Day in 1945, the citizens of Belfast were raising funds for refugees in Europe.

"It's touching to think, amid all the joy and relief, and despite the rationing and hardships here at home, that Belfast remembered the millions in desperate need across Europe."

Rosamond Bennett, chief executive of Christian Aid Ireland, thanked cathedral staff for sharing the document, saying: "It's wonderful to see our 'birth certificate' – our genesis story – right here in black and white, on this meticulously preserved programme.

"In the 80 years since this first collection was taken up, our work to support people fleeing war and disaster around the world has only been possible because of the generous support of people here in Belfast and across Northern Ireland."

A service will be held at St Anne's on Friday June 20 (World Refugee Day) to mark Christian Aid's 80th anniversary. For more, visit <u>caid.ie/80</u> th



Derry Cathedral focus of VE-80 remembrance

Leaders from the city's four main churches led the congregation in prayers remembering those who gave their lives in World War II and those who serve today; and prayers for peace among nations and in our hearts.

Prayers were said, too, for King Charles III, and the congregation pledged themselves to "support those working for the relief of the needy and for the peace and welfare of the nations".



In a poignant address, the Bishop of Derry and Raphoe, Rt Rev Andrew Forster, recalled the **historic visit by King George VI, his wife, Queen Elizabeth, and their two daughters, Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret**, on their victory tour after V.E. Day, during which – on 18th July 1945 – they attended a Service of Thanksgiving in the Cathedral. "A few short months earlier," Bishop Forster said, "in his speech on V.E. Day, the King began by thanking Almighty God for such a great deliverance."

Londonderry played a key and vital role in the great deliverance that the King spoke of, Bishop Andrew said. "Here was the fulcrum of the longest continuous military campaign of World War II - the Battle of the Atlantic." At one point, the Bishop said, 140 Allied escort ships were based on the Foyle and without the protection of the supply routes, the outcome of the war could have been very different. "So, it is hugely appropriate that 80 years after [V.E. Day], we Church News Ireland



gather in this place with hearts filled with gratitude, and hearts filled also with poignant thankfulness that such a terrible conflict ended and the evil of war was swept away in a renewed love of peace."

Bishop Andrew shared a moving account of a conversation he had with his late father who was nearing the end of his life in which he recalled being driven into Belfast to join the V.E. Day celebrations. "What he remembered most of that night, as a 15-year-old boy, was that all the lights were on. For six years there'd been a total blackout. Air raid wardens patrolled the streets making sure no light spilled from any window. The street lights had had their bulbs removed. Even the traffic lights were switched off. But that night, the lights came on again."

The Bishop said there was light and there was darkness in every human heart, and often there was internal conflict Church News Ireland Page 21



between those two things. "The lessons of human history show us that a root of bitterness can grow into a weed of hatred that becomes a swamp of destruction. In some way, that was the perverted outworking of Nazism - the darkness won in people's hearts. Do we let the darkness win in our own context? Is a root of bitterness growing into a weed of hatred? History shows us that that will lead us into a swamp of destruction. Search our own hearts, find the light, celebrate the light and ask that the light of Christ will become so evident in your heart that it will drive out the darkness."

This evening's service was led by the Dean of Derry, Very Rev Raymond Stewart, who was assisted by the Bishop of Derry, Dr Donal McKeown; the Minister of Glendermott Presbyterian Church, Rev Stephen Hibbert; the Minister of Carlisle Road Methodist Church and Clooney Hall Methodist Church, Rev Peter Morris; members of the Cathedral

Chapter of St Columb; and Bishop Forster. In attendance were prominent members of civic society in Derry-Londonderry, including The Lord Lieutenant for the County Borough of Londonderry, Ian Crowe, Deputy Mayor, Alderman Darren Guy, senior police officers and local politicians.

Music was provided by the Cathedral Choir of Girl Choristers and Lay Clerks, directed by Louis Fields and accompanied by organist Nicky Morton.
