"Not everyone who volunteered is pictured, but we are nonetheless grateful to each person and the way in which they gave something back to our community and to our church."




Carols with style and silver in Kilmore

Bray organist (15) raises almost €3,000 for UNICEF after solo recital

15-year-old organist, from Bray, has almost doubled his fundraising target of €1,500 for UNICEF, after his solo concert brought in €2,836 . . . and counting.

Edward Harte began playing the organ when he was aged 10, in St Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, following his years as a chorister from the age of just seven.

He quickly progressed through the ranks, being the first boy in his year to become a Junior Cassock Boy, before becoming a chorister in December 2017, aged nine.

During his time as a chorister, he has performed to President Michael D Higgins and performed the War Requiem with the National Symphony Orchestra. He also went on tour to Sweden and performed in Lund Cathedral. This year, Edward became the organist at Dun Laoghaire Presbyterian Church.

In 2023, Edward became aware of the current situation in South Sudan and began to study South Sudanese culture and the ways of life of the many different tribes. He decided that he should try and help.

He has spread awareness about the problems in the region, such as famines, violence and drought by giving talks to



over 400 people in his school and in churches around Dublin. In October 2024, he launched a critically acclaimed fundraising organ recital series called Organ for Africa, which took him to his home parish and to the wonderful Christ Church, in Bray for a solo recital, on Saturday, November 16.

Welcome for Military Chaplain as Trump's head of the Department of Veterans Affairs

The selection of a military chaplain as Donald Trump's head of the Department of Veterans Affairs is being welcomed by US military personnel and veterans.

President-elect Trump has nominated Doug Collins, a former Southern Baptist pastor to take the role when he takes office in January.

Congressman Doug Collins has been serving as a Southern Baptist Chaplain in the Air Forces Reserves since 2002 and he was deployed to Iraq between 2008 and 2009.

Before joining the Air Force Reserves he served as a Navy chaplain for two years.

Alongside his military service, Collins was senior pastor of Chicopee Baptist Church from 1994 until 2005 and he also served as chaplain for Chattahoochee Baptist Association.

He was elected as a state representative in Georgia in 2006 and ran for - but lost - the US Senate in 2020.

Donald Trump said in a statement that Collins "will be a great advocate for our active duty Service members,

veterans, and military families to ensure they have the support they need."

His appointment is being welcomed by military personnel and veterans. The coalition Mission Roll Call said in a statement:

"We look forward to the opportunity to collaborate with him, should his nomination be confirmed, to amplify the voices of



veterans and their families as he takes on this critical responsibility.

"The Secretary of Veterans Affairs leads the VA in its mission to serve those who have served our country.

"Doug Collins brings a wealth of experience to this position...with his ongoing service as a U.S. Air Force Reserve chaplain, his understanding of veterans' needs and the challenges they face. We believe his background could be instrumental in driving positive change for the veteran community, pending his confirmation.

"We're eager to see how his potential leadership could advance initiatives that make a real impact."

Doug Collins is the holder of a Master of Divinity degree from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and he and his wife Lisa are members of Lakewood Baptist Church in Gainesville.

Cathedral Calls

C of I is not about to disappear - Dean of Limerick

In a recent feature on the Church of Ireland in the Irish Times from Patsy McGarry, The Dean of Limerick Niall Sloane says the Church of Ireland is not about to disappear.

"My own experience is one of growth. I cover the whole of the city of Limerick which includes the cathedral, an urban church and one rural church out in Murroe." Since 2013,


parishes, by Advent Sunday, will be filled."

The diocese is the largest geographically in Ireland, taking in most of the Wild Atlantic Way from Sligo to Cork. "People are drawn to the west." During Covid, people "decided they don't want to be in the rat race of living in a city, with all the expense and all that, so people are going west", Sloane says.

In the summer numbers "significantly grow, places like Spanish Point in Co Clare would have significant numbers,

Roundstone in Galway, people holidaying, vacationing, with summer homes, et cetera". Helping growth in Limerick, he felt, was a liturgy which "is carefully constructed, worship is at the heart of it all but it's thoughtful, preaching is meaningful, pastoral care is careful".

An important local artefact, The Red Book holds the earliest recorded recipe for distilling Aqua Vitae, used for medicinal purposes as the Black Death ravaged Europe. The

'water of life' is known as whiskey, today.

A letter from King Edward III is preserved along with an early provision of the Magna Carta and records of church state and law, theology, taxes and rents. Poems and songs composed by the good Bishop to replace the 'vile' secular songs of the townspeople.

It also set out several crimes that could lead to excommunication including, violence to the bishop, slander, tax avoidance and farming on church land.



November 27, 2024

The exhibition space will take visitors on a journey through the pages of the red book and look back at life in Ireland in the 14th century.

The exhibition features, Medieval Kilkenny, creating the book - why it was written, witchcraft, democracy and rights, poems and songs, aqua vitea - the water of life, The Magna Carta, King Edward's concern that the English in Ireland had gone native!

A hugely significant document that has survived the centuries and connects us with the past.

Despite plagues, war, and the passing of time, The Red Book has survived the centuries.

Written in Latin, Old English and French, it was intended for well-educated church members. Today it is displayed for all to see.

"Any day we welcome the people through the door of the cathedral is a good day! The cathedral that gives Kilkenny its name - Church of Canice, Chill Chainnigh, Kilkenny.

The book is as true to Kilkenny as it gets. Ledrede is woven through all our stories. We look forward to welcoming visitors from every corner of the world to see this remarkable piece of living history," Dean Farrell.

As a result, we are able to open the box office again for anyone wishing to secure some of the limited additional tickets". Details are here:



Down and Dromore Church of Ireland diocese focused on rejuvenation - Billy Kennedy writes in the News Letter

Down and Dromore Church of Ireland diocese held a parish evening in Lisburn recently, focusing on the importance of church growth. This report by Billy Kennedy was published on 23rd November 2024.

Hundreds of worshippers from the 72 parishes which encompass Down and Dromore diocese – located in East Belfast, Co Down and Craigavon – packed the T3 conference centre on the old Maze site for the gathering, which was billed as "an opportunity to be encouraged by

what God is doing in parish life and to think strategically together".

Alongside its church planting initiative, Down and Dromore diocese, led by Bishop David McClay, is committed to seeing existing parishes thrive and enter a new season of "fruitfulness, especially where there has been stagnation or decline".

Archdeacon Mark Harvey, who has special responsibility in this spiritual field, hosted the evening. He said parish rejuvenation begins with recognising there is a problem and being intentional in addressing decline. The archdeacon said the next steps involved reviewing the effectiveness of the Christian ministry and outreach alongside resources and their use. "Finally, a parish should put key elements in place," he added.

The gathering heard from three church leaders who are going through this process in very different settings: Rev Andrew Frame, from Knocknagoney parish church at the edge of large social housing on the outskirts of Belfast; Denise Wilson, community pastor in Bangor Primacy, which is joined with the Methodist church; and Rev Karen Salmon, from Magherally and Annaclone, two small rural churches outside Banbridge.

All have faced challenges, but all have seen growth in their congregations over time and a younger overall age-profile.

Some common threads emerged, one of which was community engagement. Rev Andrew Frame, for example,

has connected extensively with the local primary school in Knocknagoney.

Another was accessible, context sensitive worship. Rev Karen Salmon shared how contemporary music is much less effective in her rural setting and so she has initiated a successful evening service with country gospel music. Each spoke of the importance of prayer which contends for revival and renewal.

Denise Wilson shared how she has gathered people together for early morning prayer zoom meetings. One of their prayers was for 40 new people in their 40th anniversary year, and she said God answered this call.

There are real challenges in church rejuvenation, including a lack of finances and personnel, and there was agreement that this was hard work.

When asked the most important priority for church growth, Bishop McClay said that as leaders they should "cry out to the Lord and get to the place where we do not settle for the way things are. We should also pray that this happens to our people".

The bishop added: "We need to ask the Lord to raise up leaders for whom evangelism is a real priority.

"Let us ask God to break our hearts for people who do not know Jesus.

"This is the key, and we will find that everything else will fall into place."
