Eyes up at Ely and other cathedrals

Visitor numbers are on the rise in England's cathedrals

Visitor numbers at England's cathedrals are showing a strong return towards pre-pandemic days with many recording more than a 100 per cent increase on 2021 figures.

Figures collected by the Association of English Cathedrals (AEC) from 24 Church of England cathedrals and Westminster Abbey paint a picture of cautious optimism with an increase in visitor numbers across cathedrals rising from



2.9m in 2021 to 5.7m in 2022 - a growth of 197%. Westminster Abbey alone welcomed 3m total visitors in 2021 and 6.8m visitors in 2022.

"We celebrate the significant increase in visitor numbers to our English Cathedrals and these statistics confirm what our cathedrals' staff and volunteers have been observing on a daily basis over the last year", commented the Very Revd Jo Kelly-Moore, Dean of St Albans and chair of the AEC.

Past Chorister running Belfast Marathon to Help Youth Brass 2000

Stephen Bell, formerly from Drumbeg where his late father Canon John Bell was rector, is running the Belfast Marathon on the week he turns 60, to raise funds to enable a group of young brass players to take part in the European Championships in May.

Stephen is the Resident Conductor with the top Youth Brass Band in the UK. Working with their artistic director Chris Jeans they aim to travel to Malmo in May 2023 to represent GB at the European Championships.

Commenting on his coming effort on Sunday, April 30th., Stephen said, "This marks a return to the Belfast Marathon which I first did some 42 years ago (the very first Belfast Marathon) when I was 19 in a time of 4 Hours 17 Minutes and 24 Seconds.

"Crazy as it may seem I'm trying to beat that 1982 time at the age of 60. It'll be a very (*very*) tough ask but this year I've trained more than ever - with some 60 runs this year and clocking over 415 miles this year alone. I can't say I've not put in the work: because I have and I don't mind telling you it's been tough at times.

"I'm raising money to help fund the Youth Brass 2000 trip to the European Championships in May 2023. We've won the UK I National Title for the last 10 years in a row and we now want to win a European Title. It's costing £12500 and each player is contributing financially of course but to get us over the line we need another £2500.

"If you feel you can support us I'd be very grateful. It'll help me get round the 26.2 miles on April 30th. If you're happy to use the link below that helps enormously (or if not the traditional sponsorship method works too. Just let me know).



Retrofitting historic buildings

Patsy McGarry writes - It has already been visited by two popes, two saints and, soon, a US president.

The White House confirmed late on Monday that President Joseph Biden would visit the Sanctuary of Our Lady of Knock, better known as the Knock Shrine, during his trip to Co Mayo later this week.

Pope St John Paul II was there in 1979 to mark the centenary of the Virgin Mary's appearance in 1879. Mother Teresa, now also a saint, was there in 1993. Pope Francis visited in August 2018.

On Friday, the shrine will have another high-profile visitor in Biden, just the second Catholic to be elected US president. The first was John F Kennedy, elected in 1960, who visited Ireland 60 years ago.

Lebanon: Church head calls for Syrian refugees' deportation

Christian Aid and Churches Together in Britain and Ireland launch Stephen Lawrence legacy conversations videos

Christian Aid and Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI) have brought together over a dozen leading Christian thinkers and theologians to discuss the legacy of Stephen Lawrence's racist killing, and the current state of race-relations in church and society in Britain and Ireland. The results of these conversations are available in a stunning series of videos that can be found on the CTBI and Christian Aid websites.

The 22 April 2023 marks the 30th anniversary of Stephen Lawrence's murder in Eltham, southeast London, which remains a watershed moment for race equality in Britain, and it can be argued, helped to set the tone for what was to follow over the following decades. (As a result of the Metropolitan Police's flawed investigation into Stephen's killing it was subsequently labelled as 'Institutionally racist' by the 1999 McPherson Report. Indeed, the recent Baroness Casey Report into the same organisation still asserts that it is institutionally racist, as well as misogynist and homophobic.)

From a church perspective, that tragedy kick-started a great deal of the racial justice work that still takes place today. With that in mind, CTBI's Richard Reddie and Christian Aid's Dr Lisa Adjei assembled an ethnically mixed, age-diverse, panel of Christians to explore the impact of this death on British and Irish Churches and society, and what, if anything, has been the legacy of that event.

CTBI's Richard Reddie says: It's hard to believe that Stephen's death was 30 years ago, but its impact still looms large over the body-politic of British society in particular. One only has to look at the police and its struggle to address racism within its structures, and difficulties with engaging with Black communities. We thought that this anniversary was an important moment to discuss how the churches on these shores engaged with Stephen's killing at the time, and whether this has informed any of the racial justice work that has taken place since.

Those who took part in the filmed session, which took the format of a roundtable discussion that saw participants discuss everything from Stephen's death to racial justice and the Bible, were from a range of Christian denominations and groupings. Some of the participants were involved in racial justice work at the time of Stephen's passing, while others were either not born or too young to remember that event. According to Dr Lisa Adjei, it was important to get a range of perspectives on this issue. She states, 'Akin to me, several of our participants were very young at the time of Stephen's killing. However, as time passed and our interest grew regarding justice matters, we became aware of the significance of that event and how it has informed many prevailing attitudes and behaviours. What was great about our filmed session was that we had people who were around at that time who spoke about their experiences, alongside those who could talk about what it is like to be a younger Christian who is committed to ending the work they started all those years ago.'

SEFF remembers Ian Sproule who was murdered by Provisional IRA terrorists -13th April 1991

Ian was a 24-year-old Protestant civilian, who was from Lisleen Road, Killen near Castlederg.

Ian was shot by the Provisional IRA as he was parking his car outside his house. It later emerged that his photograph was among a list of loyalist suspects in Garda files.

The Provisional IRA's possession of the Gardai documents caused a major security row.

The Sproule family, UVF and Police have consistently dismissed claims of Ian's involvement in loyalist terror activities.

Ian was one of a number of members of Castlederg First Presbyterian Church who were murdered by The Provisional IRA. The Minister said that Ian Sproule's funeral was the 23rd Provisional IRA victim to pass along Main Street in the

town. He said he had buried nine of those dead and that 'no one has been charged for any.'

In 2019 Ian's brother, John, took part in an historic meeting with a Cabinet Minister in the Republic of Ireland - Simon Coveney. He has subsequently met with senior members of An Garda Síochána and the former Taoiseach Micheal Martin.

Speaking after the meeting with Mr Coveney John advised the News Letter that Mr Coveney told him that after the Church News Ireland Page 19

murder, Chief Supt - later Garda Commissioner - Noel Conroy interviewed over 100 Gardai about apparent collusion in the shooting.

But Mr Coveney told John that none of the Gardai were put under caution before being interviewed. This, John believes, shows that it was not a serious investigation.

John said: "We heard from Mr Coveney that over 100 statements were taken. But as none of the officers were put under caution, I feel this was more of a box-ticking exercise than a serious investigation into how the Provisional IRA came to have a Garda file accusing my brother of being in the UVF.

"Mr Coveney also said this report has never been released and made no suggestion that he would let us see it. But if there is nothing to hide then why not give it to us?"

The existence of the report on lan's murder first came to light in 2012 under questioning of Mr Conroy at the Smithwick Inquiry into Garda-IRA collusion in Dublin.

Counsel for the inquiry, Mary Laverty, sharply criticised Mr Conroy for not volunteering the existence of his "major" collusion report when he had first appeared before the inquiry six months previously.

SEFF continues to support the Sproule family as they pursue justice and accountability, to have lan's name cleared as being associated with the UVF and also secure accountability from the Irish State concerning related matters which culminated in lan's brutal murder. Church News Ireland Page 20 Alike so many other families they have received no justice for the sectarian and ethnic fueled terror campaign of The Provisional IRA within that area.

SEFF's thoughts and prayers are with all innocents impacted by the brutal murder of lan.
