New Area Dean for Loughview

Bishop David McClay of Down & Dromore has appointed the rector of St Mark's Dundela, Canon Helene Steed, as Area Dean for Loughview in Down Diocese.

Helene is Swedish by birth and trained and began her ministry there. She arrived in the Diocese of Cork in 2004 and later became a rector and Archdeacon in Clogher Diocese. She was instituted as rector of St Mark's in September 2016 and was installed as a Canon in Down Cathedral in July 2020.

Helene said of her appointment:

Deanery meetings, for me, have always been beneficial and encouraging as it is an opportunity to learn from colleagues, develop friendship and find prayerful support. 110th commemoration of Titanic tragedy

The Rev. Canon Paul Arbuthnot, and Fr Paul Bennett (Cobh Cathedral) who led the act of worship at the annual Titanic commemoration.

On 10th April, the Rector of Cobh & Glanmire Union of Parishes, the Rev. Canon Paul Arbuthnot, attended the



annual commemoration for those who perished on the RMS Titanic. The Titanic's last port of call was Queenstown / Cobh 110 years ago.

The commemoration took place in Cobh town centre and began with an act of worship and remembrance at the Titanic memorial in Pearse Square. The Rector led the prayers alongside the Roman Catholic clergy from Cobh Cathedral. After this, there was a wreath laying ceremony at the town's Promenade for those who died in the tragedy.

The Revd Canon Paul Arbuthnot commented: This tragedy is woven into the consciousness of Cobh and the commemoration of it is an important event in the town's civic calendar. It is a day when we remember before God not only those who died on that terrible day, but all who risk their lives in their work on the sea.

Wicklow Male Voice Choir to hold concert for Ukraine in St Patrick's Church

Wicklow Male Voice Choir aim to help local Wicklow town efforts to assist the people of Ukraine by holding a concert in St Patrick's Church near the end of May.

The choir is back rehearsing in preparation for the Ukraine concert, while they will also be singing in St Patrick's Church for Easter Sunday mass.

Choir member Eamonn Sheridan said: "We haven't been able to sing together for close to two and a half years now, and we had a concert planned for May 29. Once the war

broke out in Ukraine, we decided that the concert should be in aid of Ukraine.

"We want to ensure that any funds raised are kept local as there is a fair bit of work taking place in Wicklow town in preparation for the arrival of refugees from Ukraine. I know the old library in Wicklow town is going to become a Ukraine hub and we just want to be able to help out in any way we can. It's a worthy cause that we want to support."

Tickets will be on sale shortly and can be purchased for €15, with the performance taking place on Sunday, May 29. The choir will also gather for their first live performance in over two years at St Patrick's Church on Easter Sunday.

"It will be our first time singing live in a long time so everyone is looking forward to it. Now that the choir are back in regular training we would always welcome new members and anybody interested should get in touch with any member who will make them most welcome," added Eamonn. Irish monsignor appointed to high level Vatican role

Pope Francis has named a priest from the Archdiocese of Dublin as one of the Congregation for the Doctrine of Faith's two secretaries.

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The body is divided into doctrinal and disciplinary sections, each overseen by a Secretary who assists the Prefect in his area of expertise.

Monsignor John Kennedy has been named Secretary in charge of discipline.

The appointment comes after the Vatican issued Praedicate Evangelium, a document on the Roman Curia and its service to the Church and the World.

The Dicastery for the Doctrine of Faith's mission, according to the document, is to assist the Roman Pontiff and bishops in proclaiming the gospel throughout the world.

It also aims to promote and defend "the integrity of Catholic doctrine on faith and morals, drawing on the deposit of faith while also seeking a deeper understanding of it in light of new questions."

In 1993, Msgr Kennedy received his ordination as a priest of the Archdiocese of Dublin.

Cardinal Desmond Connell invited him to study Canon Law at the Gregorian University in Rome in 1998.

In January 2003, he started working at the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, and in 2008, he was appointed as a Chaplain of Honour to the Pope, with the title of Monsignor.

Msgr Kennedy was congratulated on his new position by the Archdiocese of Dublin, who wished him "every blessing in Church News Ireland Page 9

this important leadership role in the Church, contributing significantly to the proclamation of the gospel throughout the world."

Church of Ireland prepares for its annual general synod

A service of holy communion in St Anne's Cathedral, Belfast on Wednesday May 4 will precede the annual general synod of the Church of Ireland, Billy Kennedy writes in the News Letter.

The service will be conducted by the Dean of Belfast the Rev Stephen Forde and the presidential address will be given by the church primate Archbishop John McDowell.

Amongst the congregation, with representatives of other Christian churches and civic leaders, will be 649 synod delegates from the 11 dioceses in Ireland - 216 clerical and 432 lay members.

Following the service, the synod delegates will then move to the nearby Presbyterian Assembly Buildings in Belfast city centre, where the three-day business of the church will be administered.

An Anglican synod conducting its business in the spacious Presbyterian Assembly buildings is unprecedented in Irish church history.

This will be the first in-person general synod since May, 2019 when the church met in Londonderry. The covid

pandemic in 2020 and 2021 prevented the general synod meeting in full session.

The general synod first met in 1871 in Dublin following the disestablishment of the Church of Ireland. Over recent years, the synod has located in different cities around Ireland.

The primary purpose of the synod is to enact legislation for the whole Church of Ireland. Bills, which are proposals for legislation, are considered and become acts or statutes if approved.

Less formal proposals are submitted as motions which, if approved, become resolutions.

The synod also receives reports from various committees and boards, which are debated by its members. Synod committees are normally elected for a three-year term of office.

The Church of Ireland operates in two constitutional jurisdictions - Northern Ireland and the Irish Republic, with church headquarters and administration based in Dublin.

Over the three days, the general synod will consider faith, education, health and social matters directly affecting its membership at diocese and parish levels.

The Church of Ireland is estimated to have a total membership of 375,000, with 249,000 in Northern Ireland parishes, and 126,000 in the Irish Republic. There are 1,100 Col places of worship in 450 parishes.

For the last 15 years she has been running an educational charity in rural Paraguay, which she founded: the Santa Maria Education Fund.

Margaret Hebblethwaite was educated at Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford, and the Gregorian University in Rome, and has written many books of theology for a general readership. From 1991 to 2000 she was Assistant Editor at The Tablet, until she gave up her job in 2000 to go and live in Santa María de Fe, Paraguay, as a sort of freelance missionary. She is still there today. For many years she wrote a monthly column, "From the South" in The Tablet about the life of the poor in Santa María (2000-2010), extracts from which were subsequently published as a book. In Paraguay she organises a programme of English teaching to the rural poor, and teaches Bible studies, at the Institute in Santa María, where students from poor families receive a free tertiary-level education.

Her principal areas of writing are Ignatian spirituality, feminist theology, biblical theology, liberation theology and travel-guide writing.

She has contributed to many programmes on radio and television (including a BBC Radio 4 programme for Good Friday 2003 from Santa María, called "Room of the Passion"; a BBC television documentary about the 2005 conclave "White Smoke"; BBC Radio 4 "Excess Baggage" 18 September 2010; "Heart and Soul" BBC World Service

radio 16 March 2013; a BBC Radio 3 programme "The Baroque and Beyond" 17 March 2013).

Easter is the celebration of the victory of God

Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop and Primate Michael B. Curry

"The earth, like an egg, has been cracked open, and Jesus has been raised alive and new, and love is victorious."

The following is the text of the Presiding Bishop's Easter 2022 Message:

In Matthew's gospel, the resurrection of Jesus is introduced this way: "After the Sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake, for an angel of the Lord had descended from heaven, came and rolled back the stone before the tomb until it was open."

A number of years ago, when I was serving as the bishop of North Carolina, one of our clergy, the Rev. James Melnyk, offered a workshop on the Saturday before Palm Sunday on how to design, and color, and make Easter eggs.

I attended the workshop with a number of other people from around the Raleigh area and did my best to make an Easter egg. But Jim was a master at doing so. You see, Jim's family hailed from Ukraine, and he had been making those Easter eggs from childhood, and spoke of his grandmother and the family tradition that hailed from Ukraine, the making of those Easter eggs. I knew the significance of the Easter egg and Easter. I knew the stories and the truth and the teachings about the coming of new life into the world, and the connection of life emerging from an egg, and Jesus rising from the dead, bringing new life and hope into our world.

But it became clear to me, in the last month or so, in this time when the people of the Ukraine are struggling for their freedom, struggling to be what God intends for all people to be, free people, that, that egg, which is deeply embedded in the life and the consciousness of the people of Ukraine, that those Easter eggs are not just mere symbols, but reminders of the reality of the resurrection of Jesus. Think back. On Palm Sunday, Jesus entered Jerusalem, as we know, riding on a donkey. That was a deliberate act on his part.

He entered Jerusalem at about same time that Pontius Pilate, the governor of Rome, would've been entering the city from the other side, from the other gate. Pilate would've been riding a war horse, accompanied by a cavalry and infantry. He would've been riding in the streets of Jerusalem at this, the dawn of the Passover, which was a celebration of Jewish freedom. Harking back to the days of Moses and the Exodus, Pilate knew that the people would remember that God decreed freedom for all people, and that the Roman empire, which held Judea as a colony, would need to put Church News Ireland

down, by brute force, any attempt to strike a blow for their freedom.

So, Pilate entered Jerusalem on a war horse, and Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey. The way of humility, the way of the love that we know from the God who is love, the way of truth, the way of compassion, the way of justice, the way of God, the way of love. That way faced the way of the world, brute force, totalitarian power, injustice, bigotry, violence, embodied in Pontius Pilate, governor of Rome. And the rest of the week was a conflict between the way of the empire and the way of the kingdom or the reign of God's love.

On Friday, the empire struck. Jesus was executed on the orders of the governor of Rome. He was killed, and hope seemed to die with him. His followers fled, save those few women who stood by the cross, and save old Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus, who provided a tomb for the body of Jesus. The Scripture says they placed his body in the tomb and rolled the stone in front of the tomb. And there he lay dead, lifeless. There their hopes dashed on the altars of reality, their truth was crushed to earth. Their love itself seemed to die.

Then early Sunday morning, Mary Magdalene, and at least one other, and maybe a few other women, went to the tomb to anoint his body, to do the rites of burial that were customary. But when they got there, they realized that there had been an earthquake, that the earth, if you will, had been cracked open, and that the tomb was empty. The tomb was open and empty. The earth had been cracked open, and they would soon discover that Jesus had been raised from Church News Ireland Page 18

the dead. The earth cracking open, the tomb opening like an egg cracked open, and new life emerging from it.

That is the victory of life. That is the victory of love. That is the victory of God. The resurrection of Jesus is the victory that we can believe in and live by.

Many years before South Africa ever saw its new day of freedom, I heard Desmond Tutu in Columbus, Ohio. This was in the mid-1980s. This was while Nelson Mandela was still in prison, while there was no hope of deliverance. I heard him say in his speech that I believe that one day my beloved South Africa will be free for all of her children, Black, white, colored, Asian, Indian, all of her children.

I believe it, because I believe that God has a dream for South Africa, and nothing can stop God's dream. And I believe that because I believe that God raised Jesus from the dead, and nothing can stop God. Easter is the celebration of the victory of God. The earth, like an egg, has been cracked open, and Jesus has been raised alive and new, and love is victorious.

In the year 2020, in that first Easter during the pandemic, when our church buildings were closed, we broadcast an Easter service from the National Cathedral, and members of our communication team organized for, what may have been the first time in our church's history, organized an online choir.

And they sang an ancient Easter hymn. And they will sing it for you now. It sings of this victory, this victory of love of God. The strife is o'er, the battle done. The victory of life is Church News Ireland Page 19

won. The sound of triumph has begun. Alleluia, alleluia. The victory is won. Our task is to live in that victory, to live out that love until the prayer that Jesus taught us, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. And so this Easter, behold, the Ukrainian Easter egg, for the victory of love and life is one.

Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

The strife is o'er, the battle done, the victory of life is won; the song of triumph has begun. Alleluia!

The powers of death have done their worst, but Christ their legions has dispersed: let shout of holy joy outburst. Alleluia!

The three sad days are quickly sped, he rises glorious from the dead: all glory to our risen Head! Alleluia!

He closed the yawning gates of hell, the bars from heaven's high portals fell; let hymns of praise his triumph tell! Alleluia!

Lord! by the stripes which wounded thee, from death's dread sting thy servants free, that we may live and sing to thee. Alleluia! Church News Ireland
