

Archbishops of Dublin to lead Good Friday Walk of Witness this evening

The Church of Ireland and Catholic Archbishops of Dublin, Archbishop Michael Jackson and Archbishop Dermot Farrell, will lead the Ecumenical Walk of Witness through the streets of Dublin this Good Friday Evening.

The walk will begin with prayer in St Mary's Pro—Cathedral at 7.15pm. The Archbishops will then carry the cross through the city centre to finish at Christ Church Cathedral where there will be a short service concluding with prayers led by the Archbishops.

Clergy renew ordination vows

The wind and the rain did not dampen the joy and celebration of this years Mass of Chrism in Down & Connor Diocese

Bishop Donal McKeown, Apostolic Administrator for Down & Connor, joined with the priests and religious of the diocese



to lead the celebration. The diocese was well represented as parishioners from across the diocese joined with schools, representatives of diocesan organisations and diocesan staff in a time of prayer and thanksgiving.

From Bishop Donal's homily - "Over the last decades, in our traditional parish structures, we have been failing to bring our young people to Jesus. Today Jesus asks us, as a diocesan family, whether we're ready to examine with our parishes how we all minister in Jesus' service. The age of the lone ranger is over."

Bishop Donal blessed and consecrated the holy oils. The priests present renewed their ordination promises. The liturgy was sewn together with beautiful music and chant. Musical Director James McConnell led the St Peter's Cathedral Choir and the Down and Connor Schola Cantorum. A special word of thanks was expressed to Fr

Cashel, Ferns and Ossory

On Maundy Thursday, April 6, the clergy from across the Diocese of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory came together at the invitation of the Bishop for the Chrism Eucharist during which they renewed their commitment to ministry and received the oils which were blessed to be used in the pastoral and sacramental aspects of their ministry in the coming year.

The Chrism Eucharist was held in The Cathedral Church of St Canice, Kilkenny and was led by the Right Reverend Adrian Wilkinson the Bishop of Cashel, Ferns and Ossory.

Reflecting on some words in John Chapter 15, in his sermon the Bishop reminded the



congregation that Jesus says to his disciples, 'I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father.'

Deep human friendship is a wonderful gift, enriching our lives, a relationship in which there is trust, affection, mutuality, and permission to be vulnerable and honest. This is the relationship Jesus offers us when he says, 'You are my friends.'

Readings were from 1 Samuel 3:1-10, Revelation 1:5-8 and the Gospel reading was taken from Luke 7: 36-50.

Following the celebration of the Eucharist the clergy were invited by Bishop Adrian and Jacqui Wilkinson to enjoy lunch together at the Bishop's House, before heading back

to their own parishes to begin the most solemn three days – known as the Triduum – in the Church's calendar.

Easter: A challenging & comforting truth - Moderator Presbyterian Church in Ireland

The Easter story is almost unbelievable - Jesus rising from the dead, affirming all the things that He said and promised. But I want to look briefly at this from outside the Christian world. Consider the Roman historian Tacitus, Right Reverend Dr John Kirkpatrick writes.

In The Annals, finished around the year 117 AD, Tacitus writes, "Nero fastened the guilt on a class hated for their abominations, called Christians by the populace. Christus, from whom the name had its origin, suffered the extreme

penalty during the reign of Tiberius at the hands of ... Pontius Pilatus, and a most mischievous superstition, thus checked for the moment, again broke out not only in Judaea, the first source of the evil, but even in Rome..."

Claiming both the existence of Christ, and the means of his death, calling it the "extreme penalty" referring to the crucifixion, Tacitus further dates Christ's death to the time of Pontius Pilate - as the gospel records also state.

The First Century Jewish historian, Josephus, in his Antiquities of the Jews, written around 20 years before Tacitus, also writes about Jesus saying that He "...wrought surprising feats...He was the Christ. When Pilate...condemned him to be crucified, those who had... come to love him did not give up their affection for him. On the third day he appeared... restored to life..."

Once again we have events affirmed, as recorded in the gospels, including the claim that Jesus was clearly resurrected. Admittedly these are but two examples from contemporary historians, yet we have no reason to doubt them, as they have no reason to write in support of the Christian faith. What they do is help to confirm the very extensive record we have in the gospels and the gospels give us a picture of the facts.

Let's consider just four of them (1) That Jesus was truly dead (2) the tomb was truly empty (3) Jesus was truly resurrected and (4) the disciples were truly changed as a result.



From John 19:28-42, we know that the mission of the religious leaders and the professional execution team was to achieve Jesus' death. The gospel record affirms that He was dead, as they did not break his legs to speed up the process. They also thrust a spear up into his heart causing "blood and water" to come out - a medical sign of death.

We also know that the tomb was empty, a cause of grief for the women, and deep concern for the authorities (Matthew 27:62-66 and 28:11-15.) We can also read the record in 1 Corinthians 15:3-8 of the 550 people on 11 different occasions, over 6 weeks, who testify to having seen and encountered the risen Lord Jesus, which can be established to 35 AD.

Finally the 11 disciples, and many others, each were changed people, pointing later to the resurrection as a key cause to this change. This answers their willingness to embrace martyrdom in all but one of them, as John lived to be an old man, still proclaiming this message.

And the point of it all, you say? The point is that there is sufficient reason for us to examine closely for ourselves and enjoy the amazing promises that we can have about our own eternal future.

Apart from this wonderful truth claim by Jesus, I believe that there is no other genuine reason to have hope. Yet believing and embracing this hope is what makes Easter so amazing, for it declares that Grace Works, even in the extremity of death. It is my prayer that you may believe this wonderful, yet challenging, but comforting truth, and come to share in the hope that Jesus offers us all.
