# L'Étape du Deanery d'antrim sponsored cycle

David Holmes, a parish reader in Kilbride Parish, Diocese of Connor, is planning L'Étape du Deanery – a sponsored cycle in aid of Northern Ireland Chest, Heart and Stroke. Taking place on Saturday September 4, the route will take in all 14 parish churches in the deanery and cover a total distance of 75 miles in one day.

He is appealing to cyclists who are members of any of the 14 churches in the deanery to join him – if not for the entire circuit, then for sections between churches.



Outlining the proposed route, David said: "It will start and finish at Christ Church, Ballynure, going on a circular route around all 14 churches in the rural deanery. Furthest churches are Gartree near Crumlin, Ballyscullion near Randalstown and Kells. There is an option to only do a section of the route for those who don't want to try the full distance."

David is a keen cyclist and a former rugby player. He had hoped to organise something like this last year, but had to defer due to the pandemic. "With so many people taking to bikes since Covid–19 started, it is growing in popularity as a sport," he said.

He emphasised that although the full 75—mile route was 'not for the faint—hearted' he would very much like to involve all parishes in the rural deanery. "People are welcome to sign up for just one leg," he stressed.

## **Choir camp for Cork cathedral choristers**

This year and for the first time, seventeen choristers of St Fin Barre's Cathedral, Cork joined a five-day summer camp during the first week of August. The camp was the idea of the Director of Music, Peter Stobart:

I was aware that the children had missed out on so much during the last eighteen months. In addition, the holiday period can be a long time with very little to keep them occupied. A summer camp seemed like the right thing for us to be offering. The camp was held outdoors in the grounds of the cathedral and in line with current regulations. A tent covering meant that the summer showers did not dampen enthusiasm.

In addition to plenty of singing, the choristers took part in a treasure hunt, following clues which were based around the architecture of the building and the many distinctive features of the grounds. They also attempted to recreate some of the decorative floor mosaics by painting pebbles and embedding them into a clay base.

We were on site for almost five hours every day and a varied programme of activities was always going to be required. During the many sessions which we held on Zoom during the lockdown, I began to develop their interest and knowledge of the cathedral building by showing them pictures of the artwork and architecture. The treasure hunt and mosaic making were an extension of this learning and gave their regular singing environment a wider context.

The choristers also furthered their understanding of psalm singing by writing their own psalm words describing the ten plagues of Egypt. They also composed and sang their own psalm chants and worked out how to put the words and music together.

# Controversial preacher Leslie Hale dies in US

A controversial pastor who left Northern Ireland after he was investigated by the RUC Fraud Squad has died in the US, Steven Alexander reports in the Belfast Telegraph

Pastor Leslie Hale, beset by financial troubles, moved to the US and became a TV evangelist after plans for the Faith Cathedral at Ballyearl near Glengormley — what was supposed to have been the UK's biggest church since the Second World War — ended in failure.

It would have featured a luxury 2,000-seater auditorium, Bible college, motel, offices, youth centre and restaurant.

Mr Hale's Faith Cathedral fundraising activities were at one stage probed by Fraud Squad detectives.

The inquiries concluded in 1984 with the DPP recommending that no action be taken.

The preacher made a brief return from the States at the end of that year to proclaim a "complete, total 100% vindication" from the police investigation.

He also alleged that his ministry had been subjected to "vicious propaganda" and "journalistic villainy".

Belfast-born Mr Hale was still pledging at that time that the Glengormley cathedral project would be completed.

He later headed a church in Tarpon Springs, Florida, where he described himself as "the Irish preacher".

His grandson Ryan took to YouTube yesterday to deliver the news of the pastor's death.

He said his grandfather "went home to be with the Lord" the day before.

"His body had been through so much in the last few months since the passing of my grandmother and now we just have to rejoice that they're together again in the Kingdom of God."

He said Pastor Hale had been "very specific" about the future of the ministry, and that it should continue with the laying on of hands and "the casting out of demons".

He continued: "Leslie used to say that the Word of God is not just a bed of flowers to be admired, but it's a weapon to be fired."

He said he had "an entire arsenal of his teachings and his preachings that are going to get out there and going to be a blessing to you".

One online tribute from Eileen Bryson read: "I was saved through Leslie Hale ministry 50 years ago, in faith Tabernacle Belfast, saw some wonderful things, enjoyed the teaching, still friends with people I knew from away back then.

"Love and prayers to the family, and the church family at this very sad time. As Leslie always said, God's way is the best way. Maranatha." Courtesy the Belfast Telegraph12.08.2021

# CAFOD tells PM: Time to throw kitchen sink at climate change

CAFOD is urging Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, to take radical action to fight climate change both at home and abroad and keep "1.5 alive" in the face of this latest devastating research from the IPCCC.

Ahead of the 9 August launch of the AR6 WGI report from the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, Neil Thorns, Director of Advocacy for the charity, says: "No ifs, no buts, this report is clear it's an urgent fight to keep below 1.5 degree warming and avoid the destruction that entails, especially for those living in poverty. Prime Minister we need you to throw everything at this with less than 100 days to COP26 - we are at crisis point.

"We cannot preach to countries with fragile economies and crippling global debt to divest from fossil fuels if we are still investing in oil fields, such as Cambo Sands in the Shetlands, behind closed doors. Or funding gas powerplants overseas in the name of sustainable development. Such hypocrisy makes a mockery of Britain on the global stage, and we must reject it if we are to have any semblance of credibility amongst the international community."

As hosts of the UN's Climate Conference, COP26, the UK must lead by example in committing to radical actions to fight climate change, both at home and abroad. That includes rejecting controversial proposals for new coal mines and oil fields on UK shores, as well as divesting from fossil fuels abroad.

Thorns continued: "The communities CAFOD works with overseas have been dealing with the horrific effects of the climate crisis for decades. The weight of our collective responsibility ahead of COP26 is unbearable, there can be no excuses.

"To take that chance, we must act now by decarbonising our economies and prioritising investment in adaptation, particularly in low-income countries already straddled with global debt."

Across the world, Indigenous communities are facing down governments in desperate attempts to defend protected lands from mining and farming. One such activist, Sineia do Vale, Environmental Manager of the Indigenous Council of Roraima, explained that after years of battling with President

Bolsonaro to try and save the Amazon, it is clear international action is already overdue. The AR6 report, she said: "sadly tells us nothing that we are not already all too aware of".

"We are steering the planet on a crash course to disaster. Indigenous peoples around the world have felt this environmental crisis but we are resilient because we have strategies - what we need is firm commitments from global leaders to support us so we can continue the fight for our land and lives.

Whether it is forests, ploughed land, or savannahs; in the various biomes where we live, indigenous people manage nature, become the guardians of the forest, and act as the barrier to contain damaging events like deforestation and fires. The world cannot give up now. The AR6 WG1 report may paint a bleak picture, but it is vital that we commit to the 1.5 warming target of the Paris Agreement, for not just the future of the Amazon, but for all countries and communities. Now is the time for urgent, radical action - not more empty promises."

Thousands of Catholics have signed a petition urging the Prime Minister to show the leadership needed to keep temperature rises below 1.5 degrees and put communities hardest hit by the crisis at the heart of COP26. We know that the UK must take radical and concrete action to fight climate change, but does Boris Johnson?

"The grim and disturbing findings of the AR6 report only reinforce the message of Pope Francis' Laudato Si - we must do everything we can, and now, to protect and defend

Our Common Home." warned Chair of CAFOD, Bishop John Arnold, "World leaders must come together with urgency for the common good and commit to making real progress, on a global level, not just pay lip service to the facts and figures of which we are all too aware. This is a time to be acting for the common good, not self-interest or self-serving politics.

# Christian ethicist Donald W. Shriver Jr., who called America to repent of racism, dies

The former president of Union Theological Seminary in New York, Shriver believed public repentance was the only hope for 'a future less evil than our pasts.'

The Rev. Donald W. Shriver Jr., an acclaimed Christian ethicist and Presbyterian minister who wrote widely about the need for white Americans to face and repent of their racist past, died July 28 at 93.

Shriver served as president of Union Theological Seminary in New York from 1975 to 1991 and is credited with having hired leading Black scholars and clergy including James Forbes, James Washington and Cornel West. West once called Shriver "the most prophetic seminary president in the late 20th century."



A son of the South, born in Norfolk, Virginia, Shriver took to heart the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s "Letter from Birmingham Jail" and its call to white clergy. Shriver's most celebrated book, "Honest Patriots: Loving a Country Enough to Remember its Misdeeds," published in 2005, compared the work of public repentance in Germany and in South Africa with that of the United States.

In it, he suggested those two countries could teach the U.S. how to publicly acknowledge and repent for past evils. Shriver believed repentance was the only hope for "a future less evil than our pasts."

American culture, Shriver wrote, will never be truly reformed, "unless the past we ought to mourn is mourned, in fact, in public, and in the context of concrete gestures and <a href="mailto:churchnewsireland@gmail.org">churchnewsireland@gmail.org</a>

measures that put the past behind us in our very act of confronting it."

The book won the Grawemeyer Award in Religion in 2009.

"He was a profoundly Christian man," said philosopher and social activist Cornel West. "He was someone fundamentally committed to the Christian gospel and making the connection between love, power and justice. There was nobody like him."

Shriver hired West as a 23-year-old Princeton University graduate student before he had completed his doctorate. He also raised money for the prestigious Dietrich Bonhoeffer chair at Union that West will fill once again in the 2021-22 academic year. They remained friends till the end, West said, breaking bread once a month.

Shriver was born in 1927 to a family that supported segregation. His parents hired a Black domestic worker to care for him and a sibling, but she was never allowed to sit with the family at the dinner table. At 21, while still a student at Davidson College, he attended an ecumenical youth conference where for the first time he took Communion and sat as an equal with Black representatives to the conference who shared their terrors of living in a segregated South. It was a watershed "occasion for racial repentance," he recalled.

Years later, in 1965, he marched in Selma, Alabama, for voting rights alongside King and others. Afterward, church elders tried to have him fired from North Carolina State University's Presbyterian campus ministry, which he served

at the time. That year he also published his first book: "The Unsilent South: Prophetic Preaching in Racial Crisis," a collection of 19 sermons from Presbyterian pastors in the South who spoke out against white supremacy.

While Shriver served as a pastor earlier in his life — mostly in North Carolina — he spent the better part of his career in higher education. He earned a doctorate from Harvard, writing his dissertation on the theology of forgiveness, and later taught at North Carolina State University in Raleigh.

But he spent most of his career at Union Theological Seminary. He is credited with pulling the seminary back from the financial brink in the late 1970s and early 1980s. In addition to hiring up-and-coming Black scholars, he also hired feminist theologians such as Beverly Wildung Harrison and Phyllis Trible — leading the institution on a justice-oriented trajectory.

Shriver and his wife, Peggy, a poet, were members of Riverside Church, the towering Baptist and Congregationalist church in the Morningside Heights neighbourhood of Manhattan. The couple had three children. His daughter, Lionel, is a fiction writer and a journalist who lives in London.

## **Speaking to the Soul**

Dear brothers and sisters, pattern your lives after mine, and learn from those who follow our example. For I have told you often before, and I say it again with tears in my eyes, that there are many whose conduct shows they are really enemies of the cross of Christ.

Philippians 3:17-18 NLT

Paul doesn't pull his punches does he? He tells it like it is! He declares that some people are enemies of Christ. This is very harsh language but he knows that it is essential for the Philippian Christians to know the difference between those



who were true followers of Christ and those who were fighting against Him. What they needed was a clear example of what it meant to be a follower of Jesus, and Paul says that he himself was the person they should be following. I don't interpret this as arrogance but as a matter of necessity. The Christians, most of whom would have been very young in their faith, needed to have a clear example of what it meant to live for Christ in everyday life. As Paul wrote this, he was in prison so he invited them to pattern their lives on those who had followed his example. This all begs the question of where Paul got his example from and in 1 Corinthians 11.1 he explains that his life was based on following Christ.

It's good to follow the example of other Christians. I know that my Christian life has been massively affected by the example that has been set for me by Christians that I have known. I was given the example of carefulness from Peter, gentleness from Frank, graciousness from Victor, faithfulness from David, cheerfulness from Fred, courage from Tim and so on. I wonder who has inspired you, and I encourage you to keep actively remembering and thanking

God for their example. But this works in the other direction as well. People are looking at you and me, whether we like it or not. We too are setting an example of what it means to follow Jesus and we need to make sure that it's a good one.
