


Nazareth to Nicaea: The Bible and the Nicene Creed – Ecumenical Bible Week 2025

This year marks 1,700 years since the first ecumenical council of the Christian church took place: The Council of Nicaea, held in 325 CE.

The meeting of this council was a significant moment in history as it gave rise to the Nicene Creed. This year's Ecumenical Bible Week, sees a number of events which will explore the connection between Scripture and the Nicene Creed, under the title

"Nazareth to Nicaea".

Ecumenical Bible Week runs from September 7 to 14. The week will begin with the Holden Evening Prayer by Marty Haugen in St Finian's Church, Adelaide Road, Dublin, on Sunday September 7 at 7pm.

Thinking Allowed takes place on Wednesday September 10 in the Church of the Sacred Heart in Donnybrook at 7.30pm. Six speakers representing different Christian denominations will offer personal reflections on what the Nicene Creed means to them

Each speaker will offer a five—minute personal reflection and there will be an opportunity for those in attendance to pose questions and take part in the discussion.

The speakers are: Fr Calin Florea of the Romanian Orthodox Church in Dublin, Gillian Kingston of the Methodist Church and President of the National Bible Society of Ireland, Dr Andrew Pierce of the Church of Ireland and lecturer in the Irish School of Ecumenics, the Revd Alan Boal of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, Archbishop Dermot Farrell, Catholic Archbishop of Dublin and the Revd Nick Park, Chair of the Evangelical Alliance, Ireland.

The Saturday Seminar will take place on September 13 in St Brigid's Church, Stillorgan, from 10.30am to 2pm. Three speakers will present on the biblical background to the Council of Nicaea touching on the theological questions which were central to the discussions of the council and their roots in Scripture. It will also explore how the council used Scripture in counteracting the Arian controversy, which called the divine nature of Jesus into question.


The speakers will be Sean Goan, biblical scholar and retreat leader; Fr Kieran O'Mahony OSA, a member of the Order of St Augustine and a biblical scholar; and Julie McKinley, CEO of the National Bible Society of Ireland.

Ecumenical Bible Week 2025 will conclude with Choral Evensong in Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, on Sunday September 14 at 3.30pm.







RTE to Broadcast Canonisation Ceremony of Blessed Carlo Acutis

The canonisation of the Blessed Carlo Acutis from St. Peter's Rome will be broadcast on RTE 1 television on the morning of Sunday, September 7th. Carlo was a remarkable young man who had a personal relationship with Jesus. Interestingly his parents were non-churchgoers but Carlo brought them back to belief.

Jeremy Taylor and John Wesley

Jeremy Taylor, an Anglican Divine was a controversial figure. He was a protégé of Archbishop William Laud,

hence a "high churchman" and a Royalist, who fell from favour during the Commonwealth period.

During that period he became the private chaplain of the Earl of Carbery, and it was at this time that he wrote his two most important works: **Holy Living and Holy Dying**. He then moved to Ireland, where he was eventually consecrated **Bishop of Down and Connor**, eventually upsetting both Presbyterians and Catholics in about equal measure.

His significance for Methodists is that his book On Holy Living much influenced **John Wesley** from about 1720 onwards and could be said to have put some of the "method" into Methodism. Wesley acknowledges this influence in his Plain Account of Christian Perfection.

Wesley's father was of a similar religious persuasion to Taylor, and John himself (initially at least) followed in his footsteps. And perhaps in writing about peacemaking and toleration while being very strident in personal relationships, it is possible Wesley followed Taylor's example more than he should have!
