Anger as historic Apprentice Boys flag 'was burned' on Bogside bonfire

A last-minute attempt to stop an historic flag from being burnt on the Bogside bonfire failed.

Independent republican councillor Gary Donnelly said he was unable to save the Apprentice Boys flag from the flames.

The replica crimson banner was stolen from St Columb's Cathedral.

Mr Donnelly said: "I believe that the flag was burnt on the bonfire.

"I think it's sad to hear because any historic flag, no matter what community it belongs to, it has that connection to the city."

Mr Donnelly said negotiations with young people who organised the pyre broke down.

He added: "They were returning items and then they felt like they were being met with a brick wall, so the communication deteriorated."

The Bishop of Derry was among those who had called for the centuries-old flag to be given back to the cathedral.

Apprentice Boys governor William Walker said he was "saddened" by the theft.

He said: "It's hard to believe that anyone would enter the grounds of a church to steal anything."

Foyle DUP **MLA Gary Middleton** said the incident was "deeply upsetting" for many.

Mr Middleton added: "The crimson flag is an important part of our history.

"To go into a church premises and steal... that is completely unacceptable.

"To hear that it has been burnt is deeply upsetting for many people across our communities."

A US flag flown in Derry on the day **President John F Kennedy** was assassinated, and stolen from Foyle College, was also feared to have been torched, after it was seen flying from the top of the bonfire.

However, Mr Donnelly said it had been handed back, along with a number of other items that had been placed on the pyre.

Foyle College was built on the site of a former US naval base, where the banner had been flown in November 1963.

The councillor said it had been secured and was in a safe place.

He added: A process is under way for the flag to be handed back."

In Londonderry last night, items of deep historical and cultural value were deliberately destroyed.

The Crimson Flag, the US Flag, and poppy wreaths in memory of the fallen were all destroyed. Even the names of both serving & retired police officers, politicians, and a deceased young person were used.

This causes real hurt to families, retraumatises the bereaved, and disrespects our shared history. It is wrong and shameful.

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Church of Scotland showcases 'close knit' community with blanket care for the vulnerable

Hundreds of colourful handknitted and crocheted blankets made by members of the Church of Scotland are being exhibited in venues in Glasgow.

Described as 'symbols of love' the pieces are an expression of concern and compassion for some of the most vulnerable people in the city.

The Glasgow Close Knit Project was launched by Church of Scotland's Presbytery of Glasgow and homelessness charity the Lodging House Mission last year. The blankets will be given out to people most in need in the winter.

The 430 blankets, described as "beautiful pieces of art", have been made by members of the Church and other community groups.

They'll be given to the Lodging House Mission in December, which will distribute them to people in temporary accommodation who are struggling to pay their heating bills and keep warm.

The idea for the project came from Rev Jan Mathieson, the immediate past Moderator of the Presbytery of Glasgow.

"We were delighted that the Lord Provost and some of the folks from the City Chambers came to the exhibition and donated blankets," said the minister.

"We've been equally delighted by all the blankets that have been donated by church, community and craft groups through the city and beyond.

"We think it is a good and fitting way of... building on the values of care and concern and love that Glasgow has always been known for.

"These blankets are beautiful pieces of art are also going to be symbols of that love, given out to people most in need in the winter time.

"And because they will be given out as symbols of compassion and love to people most in need, some of whom sadly think they don't matter, makes it even more special."

The blankets have so far been displayed at a former fish market, the Briggate in the Merchant City. They'll be exhibited in Kelvin West Church on University Avenue in the west-end of Glasgow from 13 September.

The Baptismal Font - Saint Mary's Cathedral, Limerick

Tucked within the ancient walls of Saint Mary's Cathedral is one of its most quietly powerful features, the baptismal font.

Used for centuries of baptisms, this font marks the beginning of the Christian journey for generations of Limerick's people. In Christian tradition, baptism is a sacrament of welcome, a symbolic washing away of the old life and entry into a new life of faith.

Carved from stone and rich in history, the font at Saint Mary's has stood witness to the hopes, prayers, and new beginnings of countless families since the cathedral's founding in 1168.

A simple vessel with a profound purpose, and a link to the lives of the saints who walked these aisles long before.

'Unbefitting': Poots hits out over Burke family's bid to 'doorstep' him at church

The DUP's Edwin Poots has accused the Burke family of "doorstepping" him after they turned up at his church on Sunday evening, Jessica Rice reports in the Belfast Telegraph 19/08/2025.

The Stormont Speaker said he had already left the premises.

Posting on social media, Mr Poots urged them to request a formal meeting in his office.

The family have been involved in protests and legal disputes in the Republic after the suspension of Enoch Burke from his teaching job at Wilson's Hospital School, Co Westmeath, in August 2022 following a dispute over his refusal to recognise a transgender student's identity.

Multiple breaches of court orders demanding Mr Burke stay away from the school resulted in him being jailed and more than €40,000 being seized from his bank account.

He was dismissed from his job in January 2023.

In a video Mr Poots posted on Facebook, he said: "Last night the Burke family came to my church, shortly after I had left, wishing to speak to myself. I would encourage the Burke family, if they wish to speak to me about political issues, to contact our office and make an arrangement and I'll happily meet them here, in my office.

"I would encourage the family to desist from going to church meetings and gospel services where the gospel has just been preached, to doorstep people.

"It is unbecoming, it is unbefitting and it is not the way things should be done in a church setting.

"If people want to talk politics they have got all week to do it. I am here and available to do that.

"I would encourage the Burke family to contact me directly and engage with me directly. They don't need to come and stand outside the church building to get me."

The Burkes previously confronted Mr Poots' DUP colleague Mervyn Storey outside Hebron Free Presbyterian Church in Ballymoney. Video footage from the incident showed Josiah and Martina Burke approaching the councillor and questioning him over a guidance document on transgender issues in schools.

The pair accused Mr Storey of "enforcing transgender ideology" through his role as chair of the Education Authority

(EA) board. The former MLA was appointed to the role by Education Minister Paul Givan last year.

The Burkes' claims related to the EA document Guidance for Schools on Supporting Transgender Young People, published in 2019.

Hebron Free Presbyterian Church branded the Burkes' behaviour "reprehensible".

It said: "They entered our church property not to worship, but create havoc, filmed without permission, and engaged in shouting and heckling, harassing those who had gathered to worship God.

"After a blessed day of Christian fellowship and Gospel preaching, such behaviour on the part of the Burkes was totally out of order.

"Their reprehensible conduct caused great annoyance to the entire congregation, especially to young children and some elderly who had to be evacuated through a side door to avoid their confrontational conduct."

Last month Enoch Burke was granted an injunction preventing a specific teachers' union representative from forming part of a panel to hear an appeal against his dismissal.

The Rose of Tralee

The Rose of Tralee International Festival is one of Ireland's most cherished cultural events, held annually in Tralee, County Kerry. Its origins are rooted in the mid-20th century, when in 1959, local organizers created the festival to boost tourism and celebrate Irish heritage. The inspiration came from the famous 19th-century ballad The Rose of Tralee, which tells the story of a Tralee woman, Mary O'Connor, whose beauty and kindness



made her the "Rose." The festival began modestly, choosing a young woman to embody the spirit of the song, and quickly grew into a beloved tradition that drew contestants and visitors from across Ireland and beyond.

Over the decades, the Rose of Tralee has transformed into a global celebration of the Irish diaspora. Young women of Irish descent from around the world compete, not in a beauty contest, but in a showcase of personality, heritage, and community spirit. Today, representatives arrive from the United States, Canada, Australia, Europe, and further afield, bringing their local Irish communities together under one banner. Alongside the selection of the Rose, the festival

features parades, concerts, street entertainment, and cultural events, making it both a homecoming for the Irish abroad and a vibrant celebration of identity at home.
