


Image of the day - At the ould Lammas Fair

At the ould Lammas Fair in Ballycastle, Oh!

Steve McDonagh riffs on memories of the Corrymeela Community and Ballycastle

For our family, the North Coast town of Ballycastle will always hold a special place in our hearts, nestled as it is near the Corrymeela community. And this weekend brings its famous event: the Ould Lammas Fair. This is no modern invention; it's one of Ireland's oldest fairs, dating back hundreds of years. In fact, its roots run even deeper. The castle that once stood on the headland was marked on old maps as Dún an Aonaigh—"The Fort of the Fair." Also the August timing pairs with the ancient festival of Lughnasadh, the traditional start of the harvest.

It also shares the season with another legendary fair: The Puck Fair in Killorglin County Kerry where a wild goat is crowned king. And that reminds me of a glorious piece of chaos from 1966! That year, King Puck himself was brought up to Ballycastle to lead a parade. The plan was to relocate him to the herd of wild Irish goats in Murlough. But on a stop for a restorative pint at Hunter's Bar in Ballyvoy, the king made his escape! He roamed the farmlands for years, living a long and eventful life of glorious freedom, never to be captured again.

But for us McDonaghs, the fair was personal. Our parents would man the Corrymeela stand—a vital piece of outreach to maintain links with the Ballycastle community. We were all drafted in to help. Now, in the scheme of things, my sisters Janet and Ruth were the truly useful ones, their inner organisers fully embraced. Me? Let's just say I have always had a more... philosophical approach to chaos. I prefer to sayour it.

And the Lammas Fair is organised chaos at its absolute best. Thousands of people descend upon the town. Farmers buying and selling livestock, stalls lining the streets, the funfair lights, and traditional music spilling from every pub door. My role was often to be happily swept away by it all, sucking on a piece of Yella Man (that unique honeycomb toffee), taking a tentative nibble of dulse proof of the axiom "Everything is Edible, somethings only once", and just letting the crowd flow around me as I watched the world go by from my perch on the war memorial in The Diamond.

Mum and Dad would be on the stand with other Corrymeela Members and Volunteers, "pressing the flesh" and spreading the word about what the community was doing and why. There would be hot soup in flasks and homemade wheaten bread with lashings of butter made by the quiet force of nature Anna and her team of Kitchen Wizards and when the fair gave itself over to the night, we would pack up into the blue Corrymeela van and wander around the sea front to watch the twinkling lights of the fun-fair rides and the sparking of bumper cars and screams of delight from the fair-goers, before walking along the beach and up the road to the centre, the sounds of celebration drifting over the water to Pan's rocks.

It's a whirlwind of sight, sound, and taste a living, breathing piece of history that we were lucky to be a small part of in days gone by.


The hymns so familiar in my youth - days singing in church choir,- made the event particularly nostalgic!

Outstanding GCSE results for Dalriada pupils

The Principal, Mrs Louise Aitcheson added,



Tributes to the Reverend Martin Smyth

Unionist leaders past and present have led tributes after the death of former UUP MP, Rev Martin Smyth.

Rev Smyth (94) served as MP for South Belfast from 1982 until 2005.

He took the seat in a by-election after the sitting MP, Rev Robert Bradford, was murdered by the IRA in November 1981.


Rev Smyth also served as Grand Master of the Orange Order for 26 years.

Ulster Unionist leader Mike Nesbitt led tributes, saying: "I am terribly sorry to hear of the passing of Martin Smyth.

"From my days as a broadcast journalist, he was an everpresent heavyweight in local politics, whose views were always important.

He may not have been as prominent as others in the public sphere, but hugely influential behind the scenes.

"He was another of that fateful generation of what we so euphemistically call 'The Troubles' whose imprint will last forever."



He will be remembered for his quiet confidence but also his power.

Former UUP leader Lord Empey recalled Rev Smyth leading the way in Parliament in his pursuit of legislation to assist the disabled.

"It was a consistent theme of his representation of the people of Northern Ireland," he said.

"While well known and respected for his defence of unionism, his compassion for those less fortunate shone through".

Jim Nicholson, a former UUP MEP, said his late colleague was "a titan" of unionism.

"He will be remembered for his quiet confidence but also his power as an orator and champion of Ulster Unionism," he added.

Former UUP MLA Danny Kennedy said: "Deeply sorry to learn of the passing of Rev W Martin Smyth. He was a committed Christian and a dedicated Unionist. He gave leadership in difficult and different times and he showed considerable personal courage in his long public service as MP for South Belfast and Sovereign Grand Master of the GOLI. I didn't always agree with him on Party matters, but found him honourable and deeply courteous. Whatever differences Martin had, he remained loyal to the Ulster Unionist Party and I admired him for that. He and his wife Kathleen were a devoted couple and showed much kindness to many people over the years. I offer my sincere and profound sympathy to his family and friends at this sad time. May they all know God's comfort and blessing. 2nd Timothy Chapter 4 verse 7".

DUP leader Gavin Robinson also offered his condolences to Rev Smyth's family.

The East Belfast MP said: "A stalwart of unionism, he stepped forward in South Belfast at a most volatile time.

Firm and faithful, he represented his constituents and NI with a strong sincere strength and unswerving belief in the Union."

TUV leader Jim Allister said Rev Smyth "served Protestantism and unionism for many years through some of the worst of the terrorist campaign".

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The Grand Orange Lodge of Ireland described Rev Smyth as "a leader of unwavering principle and determination through often difficult times and a stalwart of the Orange cause".

Former First Minister Arlene Foster reminisced on the "happy memories" she shared with Rev Smyth.

Lord Peter Weir, a former Education Minister, said he was "a staunch unionist and Orangeman, dedicated public servant and man of conviction".

"He was prepared to be a political representative at a time when it literally risked his life," he added.

Rev Smyth's views were conservative and often hardline.

He resigned his ministry and was elected to Parliament in the 1982 by-election following the murder of Rev Bradford.

Rev Bradford (40) and a 29-year-old caretaker, Ken Campbell, were shot dead during a constituency clinic at Finaghy Community Centre.

In a lengthy political career, Rev Smyth was an unsuccessful candidate for the UUP leadership in 1995 after the resignation of Lord Molyneaux, finishing fourth to the winner, David Trimble.

In 2000, Rev Smyth unsuccessfully attempted to oust Mr Trimble as leader on an anti-agreement platform.

In January 2005, he announced he would be stepping down from Westminster at the next election to spend more time with his wife.

Alasdair McDonnell took the South Belfast seat for the SDLP in the 2005 election.
