King Charles to address nation on anniversary of VJ Day

The King will commemorate the 80th anniversary of VJ Day with an address to the nation, Buckingham Palace has announced.

Charles' pre-recorded audio message will be broadcast on VJ Day ahead of a service of remembrance attended by the King and Queen, Second World War veterans and Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire.

VJ Day on August 15 marks the anniversary of Japan's surrender to the Allies following the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945, effectively bringing to an end the Second World War.

The service, broadcast live by the BBC, will pay tribute to all those who served in the Asia-Pacific theatre, including Burma Star recipients, British Indian Army veterans, former prisoners of war, and those who fought in pivotal battles including Kohima and Imphal in India.

The event, hosted by the Royal British Legion in partnership with the Government, will see the King and his wife leave floral tributes, as will other senior figures.

A national two-minutes silence will conclude with an aerial display by the Red Arrows.

The service will draw to a close with a flypast by the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight, before the King and Queen attend a reception with Second World War veterans.

While Charles and Camilla are at the National Memorial Arboretum event, the Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh will attend a service at the Scottish National War Memorial at Edinburgh Castle, organised by the Royal British Legion Scotland.

Elsewhere, the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester will join the congregation at the Far East Prisoners of War VJ Day 80th Anniversary Service at Norwich Cathedral, before attending a second commemorative service dedicated to the Children and Families of the Far East Prisoners of War in Suffolk.

Ahead of VJ Day, Sophie will meet Second World War veteran Jim Wren, who was serving on HMS Repulse when he was captured and held on the Indonesian island of Sumatra until the end of the war.

Events to commemorate the 80th anniversary of VJ Day will conclude with a reception for veterans at Windsor Castle later in the year.

Tearfund names Silas Balraj as new CEO

Christian international development charity Tearfund has appointed Silas Balraj as its new chief executive, bringing decades of global leadership experience to the role.

Balraj, who spent more than 20 years at Compassion International, will begin his new role in September. His previous leadership positions included Country Director for India, Vice President for Asia, and most recently, Senior Principal in Compassion's global program team.

Balraj said, "I am honored to join Tearfund at such a pivotal time. Around the world, millions still face the harsh realities of extreme poverty and injustice, and I'm deeply inspired by Tearfund's commitment to working through the local church to bring lasting change. I'm passionate about the role of the church to transform communities facing crisis, and I look forward to being part of that mission."

Balraj also brings private sector experience, having worked in India's IT industry prior to his time with Compassion,

leading startups while building HR and operations infrastructure.

Anna Laszlo, Chair of Trustees at Tearfund, said, "Silas brings a wealth of leadership, experience, and vision to Tearfund. His deep commitment to seeing the church act as a catalyst for community transformation will be foundational as we continue to respond to the growing and complex challenges of extreme poverty. He is a visionary leader, and we are incredibly excited about everything Silas will bring to the role."

In the past year, Tearfund's work has directly reached 2.9 million people, with another 6.1 million impacted through its church-led community programs.

Tearfund's Chief Operating Officer, Tim Pilkington, will serve as interim CEO until Balraj takes up the post.

Bishop slams security forces after 37 children killed in church IS attack

A Catholic bishop in eastern Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) has criticised the country's security forces after Islamist militants brutally murdered 37 children during a church vigil.

The attack took place in the early hours of 27th July at the Blessed Marie-Clémentine Anuarite Nengapeta Catholic Church in Komanda, Ituri province. Armed extremists from the Allied Democratic Forces (ADF), a jihadist group aligned

with ISIS, stormed the parish hall where children were gathered to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Eucharistic Crusade movement.

The young victims were shot and hacked to death with machetes. Six others were seriously wounded, and four managed to escape.

Bishop Dieudonné Uringi of Bunia, speaking to Catholic charity Aid to the Church in Need (ACN), condemned what he described as a delayed and inadequate response by local authorities. He said: "The police and the military were not far away, but they did not act in time. They should have intervened more quickly to protect the population."

He added that the atrocity has left deep scars on the local community, saying: "Many people have been traumatised. When the adults found out, they came immediately to see what had happened."

Despite the violence, Bishop Dieudonné said there are no tensions between Christian and Muslim communities locally. He attributed the violence to longstanding rebel activity in the region, particularly by foreign fighters from Uganda.

The bishop, known for his commitment to pastoral ministry, continues to travel into dangerous areas for missions. He revealed that many young priests have been forced to flee their parishes and seek shelter in Bunia, a city in DRC.


