### Nobel Peace laureate criticises the Easter Rising as "ethically and morally wrong"

In a statement assessing the Rising, Ms Maguire, who won the 1976 Nobel Peace Prize with Betty Williams for founding the Peace People, said she

believed the 1916 leaders "had a democratic right to their dreams of Irish self-determination" but should not have used violence.

Irish News - The peace campaigner called on religious leaders to "theologically assess blood sacrifice in Irish history."

Ms Maguire said: "Whilst we can feel a deep sadness for the suffering the men of 1916 (and Irish people) endured at the cruelty and violent military/political occupation of their country by the British, and understand their wish for justice and Irish freedom, their blood sacrifice was not the way of love, which is the only power to transform the forces of domination and control.

"I believe it is important to say this very clearly and affirm that religious leaders need to theologically assess blood sacrifice in Irish history."

She added: "Tragically, we Irish are trapped on a wheel of violence, as is indeed the human family."

Arguing against hardline nationalist positions, Ms Maguire said that if "elevated above human life...we are in danger of losing sight of the sanctity and dignity of human life and each other."

"Patrick Pearse, I believe, regarded his cause of Irish freedom as a holy cause, and put it above the life of both himself and others....(continuing) to feed the myth of redemptive violence in Irish history," she said.

"Therefore, I believe violence is always wrong and there are always nonviolent alternatives to bring about justice and build peace.

# Over 300 'Street Pastors' take to the streets on weekend nights in Ireland

Over 300 'Street Pastors' take to the streets on weekend nights in Ireland to "care, listen and help" people who are our and about, coming from pubs, restaurants and night clubs.

The volunteers come from many churches and see their work as "the Church in action" in Belfast, Ards, North Down and Cork.

On 2 May, two Street Pastors information meetings will be held in Dublin (10am at The Exchange, 50 Gardiner Street and 7.30pm at the Dublin Central Mission, 9c Lower Abbey Street), with a view to beginning the service in Dublin.



In Belfast, Street Pastors gather every Friday and Saturday evenings at 10:45pm to pray and prepare their equipment (flip flops, first aid kits, water, gloves for picking up bottles).

After a cup of tea, they head out into the streets in teams of 3 or 4 and spend the night picking up bottles and broken glass, giving out flip flops, calming anti-social behaviour and staying with vulnerable people until they have a safe way home.

In the Republic, the Street Pastors have been operating in Cork since July 2012 with between 20 and 25 volunteers.

A group of three to five people patrols the centre of Cork on Saturday nights and special occasions like St Patrick's night, Leaving Cert results night and Rag week, staying in touch with



a base team who offer advice and "take up things in prayer", coordinator David Hoey from Cork's Street Pastors told CatholicIreland.net.

"Every Saturday night there are incidents. We ring the team. They go and pray and it usually happens straightaway that we get a resolution of the situation."

The team of volunteers includes Quakers, members of the Independent Churches, Presbyterians, Methodists and Catholics.

Their thirty hours of training covers safety awareness, non confrontational intervention, drug and suicide awareness, First Aid and a session with the Gardaí on the protocols of working in the same space as the police.

When the Pastors were starting in Cork, according to Mr Hoey, the Gardaí were a bit uncertain about having a group of "uniformed do-gooders" on the city streets, but they assuaged their concerns.

"They nominated us for a Community Award last year and we won it," said Mr Hoey.

The volunteers pick up thousands of bottles and have given out 2,000 pairs of flip flops since July 2012, but Mr Hoey insists that it about people not bottles.

"If we only deal with one person and stay with him till 4.30am, that is fine. We want to bring Jesus' attitude to the city."

Having said that, picking up the bottles is important. "People come out of night clubs and cut their feet on broken glass. Also the bottles can be used as weapons."

While the Pastors in Cork have no statistics to prove it, Mr Hoey believes they have contributed to making the streets a little safer. "We are bringing respect where it might not have been previously."

Drink is at the root of the vast majority of incidents, he says. "We are not anti-drink but we do think there is an issue that needs to be addressed and that encompasses the entertainment and hospitality industries, people like ourselves, the Samaritans and others on the street who are helping out."

He would like to see the stakeholders getting together without any preconditions.

"To ask [questions like] 'What is happening? Exactly how do you monitor people inside your hotels, bars and nightclubs when they drink too much? If you put them out on the street, do you make sure that they are alright?'"

Mr Hoey said that some bars call the Street Pastors, explaining they have someone 'in a bad state' and ask for their help. "I'd like to see more of that, that these groups link up a little better."

Stories from Belfast Street Pastors annual report vividly illustrate their work: "'M' was hunched in a doorway. His dad had been diagnosed with cancer the previous day. His mates didn't care. He later said, 'I can't believe you even noticed me here'."

"We found a young girl very drunk with a man twice her age trying to pick her up. We helped her away and after police intervention got her to safety."

Street Pastors was started in Brixton, London in 2003 and there are now over 250 schemes and over 9,000 volunteers in the UK and other countries.

### Calls for Dáil prayer to be scrapped

There are calls to scrap the prayer currently recited by the Ceann Comhairle at the start of every Dáil sitting.

It comes amid efforts at introducing and agreeing Dáil reform ahead of the formation of a new government.

The Anti Austerity Alliance / People Before Profit TD Paul Murphy and Green Party leader Eamon Ryan are among those calling for the prayer to be scrapped.

It has been suggested that the prayer could be replaced by a minute's silence.

Katherine Zappone told *The Irish Times* that the Seanad has already introduced a minute's silence alongside the prayer.

Speaking to Newstalk Breakfast, Deputy Murphy said that while this was last item on their list for the Dáil reform agenda, "we do think it's an important issue to be discussed. In some ways it's symbolic of items that are very important - which is that we don't have a separation of church and state in this country".

Deputy Murphy suggested that "we should have a secular society... with everybody free to practice whatever religion they want, without the state promoting or endorsing any one particular religion".

He acknowledged that the upcoming census will likely reveal a majority of the population identify as Christians. However, he said, "a democracy is not a dictatorship of the majority.

"We are about tolerance. I think tolerance would mean we don't have an explicitly religious moment of reflection at the start of the day," he added.

## New C of I Chief Officer begins work

where he will succeed Adrian Clements as Secretary General and Chief Officer following Mr Clements' retirement in June.

Mr David Ritchie is a civil engineering graduate of Trinity College Dublin and a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants. He holds a Masters in Business Administration from University College Dublin and served as Executive Director of De Lage Landen Ireland (DLL Ireland) where he was responsible for developing new markets and finance product development.

He has a keen interest in overseas development and is a non–executive Director of Concern Worldwide. He previously worked as an engineer for Concern in Cambodia and Rwanda, where he helped to manage the construction of refugee reception centres. Mr Ritchie has a qualification in applied theology and is an active member of St Catherine's church, Dublin, where he assists as a Sunday School teacher.

Highly respected as a choral, orchestral and operatic conductor, Philip is currently the organist in residence at Cranleigh School in England and assistant conductor and accompanist of the world-renowned Bach Choir.

Combining these posts with a freelance recital career has taken the musical master right across the globe. As an organist, Philip has held positions in Westminster Abbey and St George's Chapel in Windsor Castle.

Next month's concert is set to be a wonderful evening of musical masterpieces, including several pieces by Mendelssohn and the young Northern Irish baritone, Brian McAlea, as the soloist. Tickets are available from the Armagh Visitor Information Centre or at the Cathedral on the night.
