Indonesian Partner Church Leaders Visit to Presbyterian Church

The Irish Presbyterian Church's exploration of a relationship with churches in Indonesia began in

1969, becoming a partner with Gereja Kristen Sumba (GKS) in the 1990s. The last visit by a delegation from Sumba was at the 2005 General Assembly.

Sumba, an island a little smaller than Northern Ireland, has a population of 650,000, 80 per cent of whom are Christian. GKS has been growing steadily since the 1980s, more recently at the rate of 15 congregations per year and has a membership today of 425,000. With 166 congregations and 32 presbyteries, they have 194 full-time ministers, of which the majority are women. Its General Assembly meets every four years.

Having arrived on Sunday, 12th April for a twoweek visit, GKS General Chairman, Rev. Alfred Samani hoped that the visit would further develop the already strong links that exist between the two churches and provide opportunities to discuss the next steps in that relationship.

Rev. Samani said, "We have come together to develop a new form of partnership, one that is appropriate to meet the complex challenges both churches face, seeking ways to strengthen the mission and ministry of our churches for the glory of God and the extension of Christ's Kingdom."

During their Northern Ireland visit the delegation, which also includes Rev. Marlin Lomi, GKS General Secretary and Rev. Charles Detha, Secretary of its Department of Guidance and Training, will meet members of the Council for Global Mission and visit various congregations and PCI projects, along with a visit to Christian Aid. For GKS, the church is very much a manifestation of God in the community, church being integral to the daily life of its members, and with this in mind they will meet with PCI's Council for Social Witness

The Moderator, Rt. Rev. Dr. Michael Barry said, "We are delighted to welcome our visitors to Belfast and Assembly Buildings. Each year we welcome many delegations from overseas and we hope that this visit will help to develop the partnership and provide opportunities to learn from one another; meeting face-to-face enables us to do this most effectively."

Mervyn McCullagh, who served as a missionary of the Board of Mission Overseas (now Council for Global Mission) in Indonesia from 1998 to 2010 and interpreted for the visitors said, "It is wonderful to see the relationship between PCI and GKS develop and blossom as we welcome our friends from Sumba to Northern Ireland at this time."

Philip McKinley is a Theology Graduate from Trinity College and has worked previously for the Hard Gospel Project, Irish Council of Churches and Blanchardstown Methodist Church. He is also co-founder and singer with the multi-ethnic Discovery Gospel Choir, which is based in St George and St Thomas' Church, Cathal Brugha Street.

Philip is currently working for ACET Ireland and is also a short–term Youth Worker in Whitechurch Parish. Speaking in advance of the Diocesan Kid's Camp, Philip said, 'I have very fond memories of the Camp down in Gurteen College, Co Tipperary, when I was invited as a speaker some years ago. The camp has also been of great benefit and support to members of the Discovery Gospel Choir down through the

years, so it is a pleasure for me to be able to assist lead the Camp this year, especially as it's located in my old alma mater St Columba's College'.

Union College Professor training Church members and leaders in France

Rev. Gordon Campbell has been Professor of New Testament Studies at Union Theological College since 2007. From 1998 to 2005 he taught New Testament at Faculté Jean Calvin (FJC) in Aix-en-Provence, which trains men and women for ministry in various Reformed or Evangelical denominations in France, Belgium, Switzerland and French-speaking Africa.

As part of PCI's on-going partnership with FJC, Gordon (a member of PCI's Leadership Development Committee) has returned to Aix every year since to help in delivering the New Testament curriculum.

In a **new venture**, Gordon is due to visit Brittany to deliver a day's intensive teaching to Church members and leaders drawn from Evangelical Churches across Northwest France and to preach at worship locally the following day.

On Saturday 11th April, as part of an initiative called *Focus Brittany*, 23 students will converge on a small Church near Dinard, on Brittany's north coast, for a day's teaching from Gordon on the Book of Revelation.

One third will follow up the intensive day with some guided reading and a written assignment for Gordon to mark.

The remaining two thirds will take away what they have learnt and apply it in their Bible reading, preaching (in some cases) and daily living.

Justin Welby becomes first patron of debt counselling charity CAP

The Archbishop of Canterbury is to become the first patron of debt counselling charity Christians Against Poverty, signalling once again his determination to put the issue of poverty on the front line.

His new patronage also shows however that his key objective is not so much engaging with political debate but actually taking steps to address issues such as debt and poverty at a practical, grass roots level.

"Most of us know people who've been in debt," he says in a video to launch the charity

"Many of us, probably most of us, have had moments when either we've been in debt or we've begun to wonder how on earth we're ever going to make ends meet. CAP deals in helping people to get free of the prison of debt and it's something I feel passionately about. And having seen them at work and having seen how effective they are, I wanted to be a patron and to support them in any way I could."

The charity has grown in nearly 20 years to a network of hundreds of churches across the UK. Archbishop Welby got to know its work during a visit to the Bristol diocese last year.

Archbishop Welby said: "First of all they tackle the issues where they really exist, they go to people's homes, they treat people as human beings, they keep them with their dignity, they're not trying to make money out of them, they're there to love them and to enable them to find their own way forward. It's not just about telling them what to do, it's about a sense of ownership and liberation for them.

"Secondly, they are linked to local churches. Over 20 per cent of CAP branches link in in some way to a Church of England church but all of them link in to Christian churches. That's really exciting because it means there's a community for those who want it. CAP don't force them into the church or anything like that but they offer them scope to find the support and love of a Christian community. That's wonderful."

The charity is also working in areas such as addiction that can lead people into a spiral of debt.

Founder and international director John Kirkby said: "We're delighted and grateful to have the Archbishop as our first ever patron. This is not something I would ever have imagined when I started all this in my spare bedroom in 1996.

"The Church of England is a major player in fighting poverty. Around 20 per cent of CAP services only happen on the ground, in communities, because of committed Anglicans who want to see a change. About 60 of their churches are running debt centres with us, for example."

Since his appointment as Archbishop of Canterbury in March 2013, Archbishop Welby has been outspoken about poverty and, in particular, the availability of easy credit from payday lenders. Last year he launched the To Your Credit initiative to promote responsible lending and financial advice.

Of the charity's 280 debt centres, 60 are based at Church of England churches with more expected to open next month.



Archbishop Tutu to co-author book on happiness with Dalai Lama

The Dalai Lama is collaborating with Archbishop Desmond Tutu for a new book that explores the

topic of joy, publishers Penguin Random House said on Thursday.

The two spiritual leaders are set to meet in Dharamshala later this month for the Buddhist leader's 80th birthday celebrations where they will work together to create "The Book of Joy," themed on "finding enduring happiness in an uncertain world."

The meeting allows for the two Nobel Peace Laureates to spend a week together in "deep dialogue and playful laughter as they share their experience of how to find joy in the face of life's challenges."

Irish Examiner Inter - faith call for conscience clause in referendum

Muslim, Quaker, and Christian groups have called for a "conscience clause" to be included in the marriage equality referendum which would allow people to ignore gay marriage rights in certain circumstances.

The Irish Council of Imams, Islamic Cultural Centre of Ireland, and individual members of the Reformed Presbyterian and Quaker churches made the call in a petition sent to Justice Minister Frances Fitzgerald in recent days. The document states that the religious bodies disagree strongly with the proposed "aggressive secularism" constitutional changes. It was written after a number of recent controversial cases of businesses refusing gay couples as customers.
