The charity in Kigali has taken in a small number of elderly Rwandans who, as a result of losing their families in the genocide, have been left homeless. In a country where there is no social security, Bird of Paradise Ministries provides a vital service and has pioneered this kind of care for the elderly who are often overlooked in favour of the young.

Council of Europe hours Irish missionary nun

An Irish member of the Medical Missionaries of Mary has been awarded the prestigious Council of Europe's North-South Prize.

Sr Dr Maura Lynch MMM, a doctor-surgeon and obstetrician, was chosen in recognition of her



ground-breaking work with women whose lives have been devastated by obstetric fistula in Sub-Saharan Africa.

She was nominated for the award by Irish Ambassador Anne Webster and it was presented to her by the President of the Portuguese Republic, Professor Cavaco Silva, in the Portuguese Parliament at the end of June.

While in Portugal the 77 year old missionary gave a seminar entitled 'A life dedicated to medical care in Africa' which was organised by the North-South Centre of the Council of Europe at the Universidade Católica in Lisbon. The North-South Prize of the Council of Europe is awarded every year to two personalities, one from the North and the other from the South.

The prize rewards their commitment to the defence and promotion of human rights, democracy and the rule of law as well as to the development of intercultural dialogue and the reinforcement of the North-South partnership and solidarity.

Born in 1938, Sr Maura was the fourth of nine children and joined the Medical Missionaries of Mary after school.

In 1964, she qualified as medical doctor and did her internship in medicine and surgery.

She then went on to obtain a Diploma in Obstetrics and Gynaecology at the Royal College of Obstetrics and Gynaecology in London in 1966. This was followed by a Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Public Health in Lisbon in 1967.

That same year she was assigned to the 200bed Chiulo Mission Hospital in Angola where she acted as medical director while sharing all the clinical work in medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynaecology, paediatrics, TB and leprosy with another Sister Doctor for 20 years.

She also worked as a lecturer and examiner in the Nurses Training School during that time.

From 1983 to 1985, she studied for a post graduate fellowship in surgery in Ireland becoming an FRCSI from the Royal College of Surgeons of Ireland, England and Scotland. After her studies she returned to Angola.

In 1987, she was assigned to Kitovu Mission Hospital in Uganda as a consultant surgeon/ obstetrician/gynaecologist with responsibility for training of medical officers in surgical and obstetrics and gynaecology skills.

That year she also spent a month in Nigeria training in obstetric fistula repair.

In the early 1990s, she was a co-founder member of the Association of Surgeons of East Africa (A.S.E.A) and in 1993 she initiated the Obstetric Fistula Repair programme inviting specialists from the UK to Kitovu three times a year to carry out 885 fistula repairs.

During this time she also encouraged visiting surgeons and other consultants to come to Kitovu under the sponsorship of rotary Doctors Bank of Great Britain and Ireland. This provided consultant services as well as teaching and the passing on of skills to indigenous personnel.

Between 1999 and 2004, as interest and gradual awareness and appreciation of the dignity and needs of women in the developing world increased, there was greater recognition of the need for improved maternity services for the reduction and prevention of birth injuries.

Between 2004 and 2005, Sr Dr Maura Lynch fundraised and supervised the building of a Fistula Unit in Kitovu with 28 beds. In 2007, she was awarded an honorary Fellowship of Medicine and Medical Sciences from University College Dublin in recognition of her 43 years of medical care in Africa. In 2009, she was nominated by UNFPA (Uganda) as 'Leader in fight against Fistula' and this was followed in 2013 with an honorary Fellowship in Obstetric and Gynaecology from London College of Obstetric Gynaecologist (FR.C.O.G).

Catholic Women of the Year 2015 announced

The four people chosen as this year's Catholic Women of the Year have been announced. The quartet are Mary-Jane Butler, who found the charity WORK, (Widows and Orphans in Rural Kenya); Dr Margaret Ann Burgess, who founded the charity Promise Nepal; Monica Cleaver, who organises and leads youth work in London; and Yolanda Fletcher, sacristan, Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist, and all-round helper in her local parish in Wales. The annual event dates back 40 years and this year's celebratory luncheon will be held on October 10 at the Thistle Hotel in Marble Arch, central London.

Fr Alexander Sherbrook of St Patrick's Soho will be the speaker..

The first committee meeting took place in January 1969 and the first luncheon was held in May that year, where 100 women attended. Last year there were more 300 guests. The event has raised more than £52,000 for charitable donations through the years.

This year's recipients have all the served the poor and underprivileged down the years. Ms Butler has helped 500 widows and orphans, and run six schools and two rural health centres, while Dr Burgess's charity helps people suffering from leprosy in Nepal, treating 200 patients a day and running a 15-bed hospital.

Rural partnership begins innovative project tackling financial exclusion

A new initiative by The Arthur Rank Centre, The Plunkett Foundation and The Church of England's Mission and Public Affairs Division to extend access and use of rural credit unions is beng supported by Comic Relief.

This innovative project is backed by the Association of British Credit Unions, the Methodist and United Reformed Church, and is likely to see new credit union service points created in rural churches and community buildings nationwide.

Project Consultant Janet Wilkinson, will be taking the lead on the initiative and working directly with six credit unions across the UK. Janet is the Director of Bristol Credit Union and an experienced project manager with over 15 years' experience in the financial services sector. She will be helping the six credit unions increase their rural membership and develop products suitable for rural people. Her findings will then be shared to enable other groups to establish their own rural service points.

"I'm really excited to be part of this programme," said Janet Wilkinson. "It has the potential to extend the help Credit Unions give to communities and individuals throughout the UK through collaborative partnerships, spreading <u>churchnewsireland@gmail.com</u> Page 11 the word about local and community based finance".

Many imagine rural life to be idyllic, but over 1.3 million people live in poverty, often hidden within predominately wealthy areas, and financial exclusion is commonplace. The latest official research found that around 200,000 rural residents do not have access to a bank account and only one in eight banks or building societies are present in village communities.

The decline in mainstream banking facilities, and the low number of free cash points, has created 'financial service deserts' in many rural areas with residents often turning to payday loans and high-cost credit to fund everyday needs.

Christian Aid support for local partners in flood-hit areas of Pakistan and India

More than 16,000 of the most vulnerable people in flood-hit areas of India and Pakistan will get help such as food, water and shelter following a grant of £158,000 to Christian Aid from the UK's <u>Start Fund</u>.

"These new and additional funds will allow our Christian Aid and local partners in Pakistan and India to reach thousands of already poor women, men and children who have lost almost everything," said Ram Kishan, Christian Aid's Regional Emergency Manager for South Asia.

"They have fled their ruined homes for higher land and are stranded with little or no food, water, shelter or medical help. Some have had to drink contaminated water from flooded wells and tube-wells and many have lost their homes and crops - their source of income.

"This new funding means our partners can give them help to survive until the floods have receded and they can start to rebuild their lives." In India, more than 200 have died in the floods, while more than one million are in emergency shelters. Christian Aid's local partner organisation Indo-Global Social Service Society (IGSSS) is working in some of the worst affected parts of West Bengal in the east of India, where people are living in the open, without shelter or clean water.

The new Start money will enable IGSSS to provide tarpaulins, mosquito nets, hygiene kits and water purifying equipment to the most vulnerable families, such as dalits and those with disabled or older family members. In total, well over 10,500 people will benefit from the emergency aid.

In Pakistan, some 170 people are thought to have been killed in the floods while hundreds of thousands more have had their homes and crops ruined. This has left many destitute and further indebted to their landlords on whose land they grow their crops which they sell partly to pay rent to the landlords.

Christian Aid's partner organisation <u>Community</u> <u>World Service Asia (CWSA</u>) had already started distributing one month's food supply to <u>families</u> <u>stranded on river banks in the Ghotki area</u> of Sindh Province in the south of the country with support provided by Christian Aid.

The new Start money will fund food packages for a further 1,235 of the most vulnerable families - around 6,800 people. The packages include flour, cooking oil, lentils, sugar, tea and matches.

Neill Garvie, Pakistan Programme Manager, said: "We have supported CWSA over the last three years to help communities to <u>become more</u> <u>resilient to floods</u>, so they can save their own lives, assets and sources of income.

"However, the threat of increased flooding from further monsoon rain, rising flood levels and glacial melt from rising temperatures here is severe and people are in great need. Many still have not recovered from the catastrophic floods of 2010."

The Start Fund was launched in 2014 with contributions from the UK's Department for International Development, Irish Aid and latterly the Dutch government. It is administered by the Start Network, a consortium of 24 leading NGOs, including Christian Aid, which work together to strengthen the humanitarian aid system with rapid support where necessary.
