

Princess Anne praised for 'significant contribution' to UK-Ireland relations

Irish President Michael D Higgins praised the "significant contribution" the Princess Royal has made

to the relationship between the UK and Ireland, during a meeting at his official residence in Dublin.

Princess Anne visited Aras an Uachtarain yesterday in what was described as "a courtesy call".

She met President Higgins and his wife, Sabina, ahead of attending the official opening day of the 150th Dublin Horse Show at the Royal Dublin Society (RDS).

The Princess Royal, wearing a mint-green coat and navy pencil skirt and sporting a horse badge on her lapel, said the weather was warmer than she had expected.

She told Mr Higgins it was "very kind" of him to invite her to sign the visitors' book. After asking where on the page she should place her signature, she said she did not want to "waste an entire page". But Sabina told the princess: "You deserve a whole page."

The royal joked with President Higgins saying that he had been in the official residence "a long time", to which he responded: "Indeed, it has been 14 years."

"You spend all your time here?" she asked.

Sabina responded: "All our time."

This is expected to be President Higgins' final engagement with the royal family before he leaves office.

In a statement following their meeting, Mr Higgins said: "It was a pleasure to renew my conversations with Her Royal

Highness Princess Anne, the Princess Royal, and to recognise the significant contribution which she has made over so many years to the relationship between our two countries.

"I was also pleased to recognise the contribution which the Princess Royal has made to equestrian sports over the years as well as to related learning and therapy services.

Pope Leo's unannounced visit to Children's Hospital in Rome

On Monday evening, Pope Leo XIV made an unannounced visit to Bambino Gesù Children's Hospital in Rome to comfort the family of Ignacio, a 15-year-old boy from Spain who remains in critical condition due to complications from lymphoma.

Ignacio had traveled to Rome for the Jubilee with the Neocatechumenal Way but was rushed to intensive care shortly after his arrival. His parents, Pedro Pablo and Carmen Gloria, along with his siblings, told the Pope that they have been praying day and night for a miracle.

The Pope stayed with them for half an hour, prayed the Our Father, the Hail Mary, and the Glory Be, and reminded them that "we are made for Heaven," urging them to trust in God's will. The family, overwhelmed, said his presence brought unexpected peace.

Before leaving, Pope Leo visited other children in the Oncology ward and greeted the hospital staff, offering them a quiet moment of encouragement in the face of suffering.

VJ Day commemoration at National Memorial Arboretum to be broadcast live on BBC One

On 15 August, the Royal British Legion will host a National Commemorative Event with the UK Government at the National Memorial Arboretum to mark the 80th anniversary of VJ Day.

It will feature 400 Armed Forces personnel, military bands, a Red Arrows flypast, and historic aircraft.

The event will be broadcast live on BBC One from 11:30am to 1pm, and will also be available to view on a large screen within the grounds of the Arboretum for members of the public.

At midday, you can also pause with the nation for a twominute silence to honour the end of the Second World War.

Westport praying for their missionary kidnapped in Haiti

The parish priest of a Catholic missionary who has been kidnapped in Haiti has confirmed that efforts are underway to secure her release.

Gena Heraty was among nine people abducted from the orphanage where she was working near Port-au-Prince on Sunday.

Fr. John Kenny from Westport Parish in County Mayo told Premier News that "negotiations are in a very delicate

situation and we're all conscious that whatever efforts are being made are intense."

He added: "I know through the European diplomats out there, that the state of government in the local area is in disarray, and there's so much vying for leadership and authority in the community there, it's difficult to know how they're managing and who they're negotiating with. But I know that the orphanage she works with in the charity she works with, have been contacted."

Ms. Heraty, who has worked in Haiti for decades, was kidnapped after the Sainte-Hélène orphanage was stormed by gang members. Fr. Kenny said she had fallen in love with Haiti and stayed there after going out on a short-term project in 1993.

After that, she had "found her other family in the community there, with the children," he added.

"She's not one to seek the spotlight for herself. Any visits home have always been in connection with promoting her work and generating support and fundraising for the orphanage. The circumstances are very poverty stricken and there's children abandoned, not because parents don't want to keep their children, but because they just cannot. So people like Gena and others have been a God-send in that area to support those who are in such dire need."

Since they heard the news on Monday, Fr. Kenny said the community in Westport Parish has gathered together to pray: "We're very conscious at the moment that with

negotiations ongoing, it's difficult for any of us to intervene in any other way except through prayer.

"Yesterday at Mass I mentioned how one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit is courage, and certainly, courage is one of the things she needs and the people with her at this time, and courage leading to hope. And our hope is that this will be resolved and what we can do as a community, her family, her friends, and all the people back home is to pray that this will be resolved, and that this will come to a positive outcome.

"It's incomprehensible why this goes on, that there's so much evil in people, the evil of just not loving our neighbour and respecting life."



Remembering John Mason Neale

John Mason Neale (24 January 1818 – 6 August 1866) was an English Anglican priest, scholar and hymnwriter. He worked and wrote on a wide range of holy Christian texts, including obscure medieval hymns, both Western and Eastern. Among his most famous hymns is the 1853 Good King Wenceslas, set on Boxing Day.



Neale was strongly high church in his sympathies, and had to endure a good deal of opposition, including a fourteen years' inhibition by his bishop. Neale translated the Eastern liturgies into English, and wrote a mystical and devotional commentary on the Psalms. However, he is

best known as a hymnwriter and, especially, translator, having enriched English hymnody with many ancient and mediaeval hymns translated from Latin and Greek. More than anyone else, he made English-speaking congregations aware of the centuries-old tradition of Latin, Greek, Russian, and Syrian hymns.

The 1875 edition of the Hymns Ancient and Modern contains 58 of his translated hymns; The English Hymnal

(1906) contains 63 of his translated hymns and six original hymns by Neale.

His translations include:

- "All Glory, Laud and Honour"
- "A Great and Mighty Wonder"
- "O Blest Creator of the Light"
- "O come, O come, Emmanuel"
- "Of the Father's Heart Begotten"
- "Sing, My Tongue, the Glorious Battle"
- "To Thee Before the Close of Day"
- "Ye Sons and Daughters of the King"

Since Neale died on 6 August 1866, the Feast of the Transfiguration, he is commemorated by the Anglican churches on the following day, 7 August. Neale is honored in the Church of England and in the Episcopal Church that day.
