Reformation focus of C of I Annual Theological Lectures at Queen's 2017

2017 marks the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation - a seismic and defining moment in the history of the Christian church.

The C of I chaplaincy will host Professor Mark Noll (University of Notre Dame) to Queen's for two nights. In 2005, Mark Noll was named as one of the 25 most influential evangelicals in America by *Time* magazine. As Francis A. McAnaney Professor of History at Notre Dame, he is recognised as a leading authority on the history of Christianity in North America, and received the National Academy of Humanities medal from the White House in 2006.

On Monday 6th February, Prof. Noll will speak on *Sola Scriptura*, its influence, and its critics.

On Tuesday 7th February, Prof. Noll will be joined by former Principal of Maynooth College, and current Catholic Bishop of Limerick, Brendan Leahy, for further discussion and debate.

Both events will take place in the stunning surrounds of the Isdell Courtyard at QUB's Riddel Hall. Car parking is available on site.

Cathedral concert in Banbridge NS Presbyterian Church

The choir of St Anne's Cathedral Belfast Girls' Choir and Lay Clerks, conducted by Master of the Choristers Mr David Stevens, will sing in a free concert in Banbridge Non–Subscribing Presbyterian Church on Wednesday December 14 in celebration of the 300th anniversary of the founding of the church.

A warm welcome is extended to anyone who would like to join the Minister, the Rev Norman Hutton, the session, committee and congregation for this evening of Christmas music.

While the First Presbyterian Church was founded 300 years ago, 2016 also marks the 170th anniversary of the opening of the present church building in Downshire Road. The original church was in Lurgan Road, in what is now known as Old Meeting House Green. The congregation worshipped there until 1846, when they moved to the impressive new church. A special 300th anniversary service was held in the church in September.

The concert begins at 7.30pm on December 14. Admission is free and there will be an opportunity to make a voluntary donation to the St Anne's Cathedral Cross—Community Choir Schools Project which offers free choral singing to schoolchildren from north Belfast, and to the Dean of Belfast's Black Santa Appeal, now in its 40th year.

Bishop of Dromore launches report on religious persecution

The Bishop of Dromore, Bishop John McAreavey, recently hosted the launch of a report highlighting global religious persecution.

The launch of the report, entitled 'Religious Freedom in the World Report 2016', was held in the Newry Conference and Banqueting Centre in Newry, County Down.

The report, compiled by Aid to the Church in Need (ACN), covers 196 countries and highlights 38 states where there is evidence of 'significant' violations of religious freedom.

Speaking at the launch, Bishop McAreavey said the document was "imbued with a love and concern for the entire human family."

He said "I would like to begin with the words of Father Jacques Mourad, a Syriac-Catholic priest who was held by ISIS for five months. Father Mourad states in the foreword to this report that if religion teaches us anything it is the value of the human person, the need to respect each other as a gift from God. So surely it must be possible both to have a passionate faith in one's religious beliefs as well as to respect the right of others to follow their conscience, to live out their own response to the love of God who made us all."

Bishop McAreavey added that Father Mourad's words and the report as a whole encapsulated "a foundational aspect of Christian teaching, namely a deep and deliberate love for all human beings regardless of differences in social position, racial background or religious faith."

He added that "this impressive report, far from being a selective piece of research concerned only with our own Christian family, is imbued with a concern and love for the entire human family." He continued: "It provides a rounded overview of religious freedom around the world by assessing the situation of many faith communities who are under attack, including Yazidis, Jews, Ahmadiyya Muslims and of course Christians ... [T]his report serves a very simple but powerful role: it is a plaintive statement of wrongdoing. It is a raising of our voices for those who have no voice. It seems to me that without first identifying exactly the nature and the extent of wrongdoing, one can never fully address the wrongdoing."

He said that "Strangely, this report gives us hope by allowing us to examine the extent and full horror of those who suffer for their faith across the world. Our work now – thanks to the efforts of ACN – must surely be to challenge religious intolerance and persecution as a fundamental breach of human rights."

Irish Inter-Church Meeting focus on suffering of the churches in the Middle East

The 27th Irish Inter-Church Meeting (IICM) took place on 24–25 November at Mount Saint Anne's Retreat Centre, Portarlington Co Laois.



The IICM is the formal meeting between the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference and the Irish Council of Churches which allows for Christian churches in Ireland to pray and reflect together on issues of shared concern.

It includes senior church leaders and lay representatives from across 15 denominations in Ireland, ranging from Roman Catholic to Reformed, migrant-led, independent and Orthodox traditions. The theme chosen for the 2016 meeting was: 'Forsaken? The suffering of the churches in the Middle East'.

This meeting had as its backdrop increasing fragmentation and hostility in international relations. Christians of the Middle East region

and experts in international relations, development and humanitarian aid, spoke at the meeting to help delegates to discern what should be the appropriate responses of the Irish churches to this crisis.

The delegates stated: "As is reflected in the title 'Forsaken?' we approached this meeting with an uneasy conscience, concerned that we are not doing enough to demonstrate to our fellow Christians that they are not forgotten."

They felt challenged by the scale of the suffering and the urgent need for a response from the international community, but recognised that the complexity of the problems mean there are few obvious, externally imposed solutions.

They were encouraged to hear that their spiritual solidarity in prayer and pilgrimage means a great deal to those who are experiencing persecution.

The work of Christian development organisations helps displaced people to rebuild their lives, in the hope of one day being able to return home.

Delegates were inspired and humbled by the courage of those who have risked everything to remain true to their faith.

Archbishop of Canterbury visits centre for refugees



Meeting with the staff and clients of Coventry Refugee and Migrant Centre, Archbishop Justin spoke of the joy of seeing such practical work of reconciliation in action.

A huge banner proclaims 'Refugees welcome here', and every individual who arrives fleeing war, persecution and conflict can find peace and

sanctuary, receive help with housing, employment, education, and finding their way through the process involved in becoming part of the community.

People from many parts of the world including Sudan, Congo, and Eritrea as well as Syria use the centre, and Coventry has welcomed more Syrians than any other city. The Director of the centre, Sabir Zazai, is himself a former refugee.

The Archbishop was moved by the work of the staff in enabling those who have suffered to find healing and a sense of belonging.

He said: "It's been an inspiring day seeing how generously Coventry is welcoming Syrian refugees. These are people who are coming from some of the worst suffering anywhere in the world at the moment. Coventry has a tradition of doing this – it's a city of peace and reconciliation. Having lived and served here I know Coventry is a city that will welcome them, and will also find they contribute hugely to its future."
