It's time to rediscover God's mercy, Pope says at Jubilee launch

Pope Francis has officially commenced the Jubilee of Mercy, calling those who pass through the newly-opened Holy Door to

rediscover God's mercy and experience the mystery of his love.

"This Extraordinary Holy Year is itself a gift of grace," Pope Francis said in his homily for Mass, just before opening the Holy Door in St. Peter's Basilica.

"To pass through the Holy Door means to rediscover the infinite mercy of the Father who welcomes everyone and goes out personally to encounter each of them. This will be a year in which we grow ever more convinced of God's mercy."

Mercy, he said, must be placed before judgement, though "God's judgement will always be in the light of his mercy."

"In passing through the Holy Door, then, may we feel that we ourselves are part of this mystery of love," he said.

"Let us set aside all fear and dread, for these do not befit men and women who are loved. Instead, let us experience the joy of encountering that grace which transforms all things." The Dec. 8 opening of the the Jubilee of Mercy, an Extraordinary Holy Year, coincided with the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. The Holy Year will close Nov. 20, 2016 with the Solemnity of Christ the King.

The Jubilee was officially inaugurated by the opening of the Holy Door in St. Peter's Basilica. Pilgrims who pass through the door -- which is only opened during Jubilee years -- can receive a plenary indulgence under the usual conditions.

Pope Francis presided over the rite of the Holy Door's opening before passing through himself. He was followed by <u>retired pontiff Benedict XVI</u>, <u>who attended the rite in one of his rare public</u> <u>appearances</u>.

The opening of the door is meant to symbolically illustrate the idea that the Church's faithful are offered an "extraordinary path" toward salvation during the time of jubilee.

Pope Francis in his homily spoke of the Holy Door in connection to the day's Gospel, which recounts the angel Gabriel announcing to Mary she would be the mother of God. "We carry out this act, so simple yet so highly symbolic, in the light of the word of God which we have just heard," Pope Francis said.

Pope Francis concluded his homily recalling the 50th anniversary of the Second Vatican Council's closing, which is also commemorated Dec. 8. He stressed that the Jubilee of Mercy is a challenge for us to the "openness" inspired by the Council.

The Council was "a genuine encounter between the Church and the men and women of our time," in which the Holy Spirit "impelled the Church to emerge from the shoals which for years had kept her self-enclosed so as to set out once again, with enthusiasm, on her missionary journey."

"Wherever there are people, the Church is called to reach out to them and to bring the joy of the Gospel," the Pope said.

"The Jubilee challenges us to this openness, and demands that we not neglect the spirit which emerged from Vatican II, the spirit of the Samaritan, as Blessed Paul VI expressed it at the conclusion of the Council."

Millisle's Holocaust link

Before and during the Second World War the village of Millisle in County Down welcomed a number of the children from the Kindertransport, which rescued over 10,000 from certain death in the concentration camps. A 70-acre farm was set up on the edge of Millisle and it became a type of self-sufficient kibbutz. A memorial to the events of the Holocaust is in the grounds of Millisle Primary School .

Israel and Ireland : Bishop Trevor Williams shares reflections on reconciliation

Bishop Trevor Williams, former leader of the Corrymeela community, will reflect on a visit to Israel, the occupied Palestinian Territory and Gaza at Belfast's Cathedral's final Autumn Talk, today Wednesday December 9.

Bishop Williams, who is chair of Christian Aid Ireland and former Bishop of Limerick and Killaloe, will be talking about what has been learned about reconciliation in Northern Ireland and comparing the situation here with these places where they also have 'peace walls.'

Bishop Williams will show videos from his 2013 trip with Christian Aid and describe some of the work that is being done in Israel, the occupied Palestinian Territory and Gaza.

He said many stories had touched him during this visit. "One of the most difficult was meeting a chicken farmer whose farm had been hit by a churchnewsireland@gmail.com Page 6

bomb and completely destroyed," Bishop Williams said.

"His brother's attitude was 'what can we do now, the funders have not come forward yet?' They were totally dependent on outside funding. This is a real strike on human dignity. The whole situation had eroded their normal human existence and they were totally dependent on others to survive."

The Bishop will recount stories of Jews and Palestinians working together for human rights for all.

"Israel and Palestine is a much more exaggerated problem than here in Northern Ireland, but the dynamics are similar," he said.

"Once we become an 'us and them' society we are in trouble. Reconciliation is about how you live with difference and how you live well with each other. When one group is over another you destroy the basis of a harmonious community."

Bishop Williams' talk begins at 12.45pm in the Cathedral Halls, and will last 45 minutes. Refreshments served at 12.15pm. A suggested donation is £5.

streets in Kampala, Uganda, and now lives in Abaana's Children's Home.

The young people baked and baked and baked on Saturday evening and Sunday morning and then served buns and cakes to the church family after the morning services.

The money raised will be used to help Abaana to rescue more children in Africa from the streets, fund the provision of fresh water supplies to communities and help with the charity's education programme.

Moderator urges Scots to join him in helping feed Syrian refugee families

The Moderator of the Church of Scotland is asking Scots to join him in helping feed Syrian refugee families this Christmas season through the 'A Place at the Table' campaign.

"Syrian families who have been forced to flee their homes because of armed conflict need all the support we can give them," said Rt Rev Dr Angus Morrison. "And this is something just about every one of us can do to help."

"Join me in contributing to 'A Place at the Table,' and you can help support this crucial work."

To take part in 'A Place at the Table,' simply set an empty place at your dinner table or your work celebration and donate the money which would have been spent on the meal. Even a small donation can make a big difference. A donation of just £20 can feed a Syrian refugee family for a month.

'A Place at the Table' was started in 2013 to support the National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon, a Church of Scotland partner church that is feeding, sheltering and supporting refugees and internally displaced people. Since then it has raised more than £80,000, helping feed, shelter and support more than 24,000 families every year.

As well as turning its churches and schools into refugee centres, the Synod is reaching out to those families with food and other necessities, such as rent, fuel and hygiene products. As more and more families flee the conflict, however, the need is overwhelming their local resources.

Since the conflict started in 2011, more than 11.6 million Syrians have had to flee their homes with

7.6 million of them becoming refugees in their own country and 4 million fleeing to Lebanon and other neighbouring countries.

Only 1 in 10 Advent calendars have Christian theme

Just 11% of Advent calendars being opened have a Christian theme, a survey has found.

Research says only one in ten of the treats used to countdown to Christmas day will feature the true meaning of the season.

A huge 89% of calendars will instead feature TV shows, high street bands, pop stars and films.

The study by online home handyman provider Fantastic Services found 38% of people bought their own Advent calendar while 42% got one from their parents.

In November a maker of Christian advent calendars challenged the big UK supermarkets to <u>churchnewsireland@gmail.com</u> Page 16 sell more Advent calendars that are centred around Christmas.

The Meaningful Chocolate company estimates that there are more than one million advent calendars designed with animals on the front for pet lovers, with no reference to Christmas.

It believes the number of advent calendars based on the Christmas story is around 400,000.

David Marshall, the company's founder, commented "Dog lovers are fine as a group of people who love their dogs. I'm a dog lover myself. But Christians really care about children.

"Supermarkets should offer a quality product that reflects some of the meaning of the season, and that will sell.

"There is one UK supermarket that I won't mention that is quite happy to offer pet owners an advent calendar that caters for them but will not offer Christians an Advent calendar that connects with Christmas. That is a real shame."
