Accord marriage preparation attendance equals pre-pandemic figure


Accord has released its latest attendance figures for couples undertaking Sacramental marriage preparation courses throughout Ireland.

The 2022 figure of 4,610 couples hosted through 297 marriage preparation programmes is equal to 2019's prepandemic figure of 4610 couples hosted at 285 programmes.

Speaking at St Valentine's shrine on Whitefriar Street Monday, Director of Accord CLG, Mr Tony Shanahan said

that "it is reassuring to see that the figures are back up to their pre-Covid levels".

Women's Aid support from parish 'Extra Mile' initiative

All Saints' Parish Church, Antrim, presented a cheque for £4,200 to Women's Aid at a service on Sunday February 12, with the funds raised through the parish 'Extra Mile' initiative.

This originated a number of year ago, when the 'Extra Mile' bucket was placed on the Churchwardens' Table to collect parishioners' loose change.

The monies raised have been used to fund a variety of projects including five extendable wheelchairs for Mozambique through the Girassol charity, and the provision of water filters for Tanzania, with £2,100 donated, enabling the parish to purchase 70 filters.

In February 2022, the focus of the 'Extra Mile' was the provision of fuel vouchers for families suffering hardship and fuel stress in the local community and this was run in conjunction with Women's Aid.

As a result of the generosity of parishioners, the Extra Mile appeal raised £4,200 for fuel vouchers, and on February 12, Arlene Creighton, Communication and Engagement



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Manager Women's Aid ABCLN, attended All Saints' to receive cheques for £4,200 and a donation of £500 from Antrim Rotary Club.

Over the next four weeks, parishioners in Antrim are being encouraged to donate to the Bishops' Appeal in response to the earthquake in Syria and Turkey. Following that, the next 'Extra Mile' project will support the Shelter Box charity which supplies emergency accommodation and tools to areas hit by disaster.



St Mary's Crumlin new art project to capture memories and stories

St Mary's Crumlin, Dublin is to launch new art project to tell the stories of the parish All are welcome to attend the launch on March 9.

St Mary's Parish Crumlin has announced the launch of a new art project set to capture the memories and stories of St Mary's parishioners in clay. The project is being supported by a grant from Dublin City Council's Neighbourhood/ Voluntary Arts Scheme and by Ulster University.

Dublin City Council Historian in Residence, Cathy Scuffil will launch the new art project for the parish on Thursday March 9 at 8pm in the church. As part of the launch, Cathy will give a talk on one of her great passions: Dolphin's Barn bricks. St Mary's Parish Church is the last building to have been constructed with these local bricks. As such, the talk in the church is a 'dream come true' for Cathy.

The aim of St Mary's new art project is to create panels reflecting life in the parish over the years.

Starting this month, ceramicist and Ulster University lecturer, Michael Moore will work with parishioners old and young, of long-standing and new to the parish, to gather information and memories and support the creation of works in clay that tell those stories. This approach mirrors one taken at the time of the building of St Mary's. The pulpit is decorated with small carvings which reflect life in the parish at that time. There will be an exhibition of the finished ceramic panels created by the parishioners and Michael at the end of the year.

Rector of St Mary's Crumlin, the Revd Ruth Noble stated: 'We are delighted that Michael approached St Mary's after attending a talk by Cathy about Dolphin Barn Bricks. Now, everything has come together and we look forward to an invigorating project that captures and celebrates the life of Church News Ireland Page 8

A large congregation from across the community joined parishioners and colleagues for the Institution of Rev Craig McCauley to Naas Union of Parishes, at 8pm on 15 February 2023.

The congregation included members of Craig and Vida's family, members of his former parish in Co Cavan, as well as new clergy colleagues from across Meath and Kildare. Local political and civic representatives were also in attendance.

The Institution took place in St David's Church in Naas and was conducted by Bishop Pat Storey. The preacher was Archdeacon Ian Horner, a colleague from Craig's time in Kilmore.

Ordained in 1999 he served in Banbridge, Co. Down, Kill O The Grange in Dublin and for the last 18 years as Rector of the Virginia Group of Parishes in Co. Cavan, where he was also an Archdeacon.

During the speeches Craig, Vida and their family were welcomed to their new parish and home. Appreciation was also expressed to Canon Alastair Graham, Rev Carol Hennessy, Rev James Reid and Rev Alan Melbourne who had pastoral oversight for Naas Union during the vacancy.

Methodist President appreciates his roots and teachers


The President, the Rev David Nixon, writing in the March issue of the Methodist Newsletter says, "I had a blast from the past on 8 January.

Liverpool Lay Canon elected unopposed as Chair of global Anglican Consultative Council

A lay canon from Liverpool in England, Canon Maggie Swinson, has been has been acclaimed as the new Chair of the Anglican Consultative Council (ACC).

The Acc is one of four "Instruments of Communion" or "Instruments of Unity" of the global Anglican Communion of 42 independent-yet-interdependent national, and regional Churches. The Council meets in plenary every three-or-so years, and is currently gathered in Accra, Ghana, for its 18th plenary meeting.

As chair of the Anglican Consultative Council, Maggie Swinson will also chair the Standing Committee of the Anglican Communion. This comprises the Archbishop of Canterbury, as president, five primates elected to represent the regions of the Anglican Communion., a vice chair, and seven members elected by members of the Council.

Maggie Swinson is a lay canon of England's Liverpool Cathedral, a charted accountant and company secretary in private practice. She has served as vice-chair of the ACC since her election in Lusaka, Zambia, at the 16th meeting of the council (ACC-16) in 2016.



In that time, Maggie has chaired the Inter Anglican Finance and Administration Committee, led the group which implemented the Anglican Communion Office structure review, chaired the panel for the appointment of Bishop Anthony Poggo as the new Secretary General and attended the Lambeth Conference as an observer.

"I believe the key challenges for the ACC are in taking forward the mission of the Communion to serve the Kingdom", she said. "Developing a governance structure which better reflect the instruments whilst maintaining the key voices of laity and non-episcopal clergy. Developing a financial model which reduces reliance on member contributions and increases sustainability and enabling all Provinces to continue to find a place within the Communion in spite of their differences." Commenting on Canon Swinson's unopposed election as the new Chair of the ACC, Archbishop Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury said: "I have worked with Canon Maggie for many years and she has faithfully served the Church – both the Church of England and the Anglican Communion in many ways. I am delighted that her gifts will continue to be shared with the Communion as the new Chair of the Anglican Consultative Council and the Standing Committee."

The Secretary General of the Anglican Communion, Bishop Anthony Poggo, said: "I am delighted that Canon Maggie Swinson has been elected, unopposed, by the ACC as Chair. This is in recognition of and a vote of thanks for her work in her previous role as Vice-Chair of the ACC, a role she has been in since her election in Zambia in 2016.

"In her role as Vice Chair of the ACC and Chair of the Inter-Anglican Finance and Administration Committee (IAFAC), she has worked superbly and has been an asset to each of the Committees. As Secretary General, I look forward to working with her as she takes on this new role as Chair.

"I know she will continue to guide the Standing Committee and the ACC as we journey together into the next phase and season. We assure her of our prayers as she takes this on role."

News of her election has been welcomed in her home diocese of Liverpool, England. The Bishop of Warrington, Beverley Mason, said: "I am so delighted to hear of this appointment. Maggie brings years of experience of serving Church News Ireland Page 16

the Church of England nationally and locally as provides a vital lay perspective.

"She brings immense experience, wisdom and insight to the Anglican Communion, and is so well-placed to take on this extra responsibility. In these challenging days, Maggie will play a vital role in listening to and ensuring voices are heard across the communion.

"In Liverpool, we are very proud and give the assurance of our prayers for Maggie and the work of the ACC."

Canon Swinson assumes the chair at the end of the ACC-18 meeting and serves for the next two meetings of the Anglican Consultative Council. She succeeds Archbishop Paul Kwong, the former Archbishop of Hong Kong, whose term of office has come to an end. Elections for vice chair and five other members of the Standing Committee will take place later this week.




St Patrick's High Crosses for sale
