New papal nuncio appointed to Ireland

Archbishop Luis Mariano Montemayor has been appointed as the new papal nuncio for Ireland.

The appointment, confirmed by the Vatican on Saturday morning, was welcomed by the Primate of All Ireland, Archbishop Eamon Martin, who said he would look forward to meeting the new envoy for Pope Francis when he relocates to Ireland.

Argentinian-born Archbishop Montemayor is currently serving as the papal nuncio in Colombia.

He replaces Archbishop Jude Thaddeus Okolo, who left Ireland for Prague last year after serving a five year term in this country during which he appointed 12 bishops, or almost half the current membership of the Irish Episcopal Conference.

"I very much welcome today's news that Pope Francis has appointed Archbishop Luis Mariano Montemayor as

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Apostolic Nuncio to Ireland," Archbishop Martin said.

"I pray God's blessings on Archbishop Mariano and look forward to meeting with him when he takes up his appointment in Ireland in the near future."

Archbishop Montemayor was born in 1956 in Buenos Aires, and was ordained to the priesthood in 1985.



He has served roles within the Catholic Church's diplomatic corps in in Ethiopia and Brazil before being appointed papal nuncio for Senegal, Guinea-Bissau e Capo Verde in 2008.

He also served as the papal nuncio in the Democratic Republic of Congo. He speaks fluent Spanish, Italian, French, English, and Portuguese. Course The. Irish Times. Report by Connor Pope

Archbishop of Canterbury pays tribute to aid workers killed rescuing elderly woman in Ukraine

The Archbishop of Canterbury has paid tribute to aid workers killed in Ukraine.

British and New Zealand aid workers Christopher Parry and Andrew Bagshaw were killed as they tried to rescue an elderly woman from an area of intense military action.

Their car was hit by an artillery shell.

Truro-raised Chris Parry had been raising money via a GoFundMe page in order to support his aid work. He had amassed more than £23,000 at the time of his death.

The 28-year old had been detailing his experiences online in order to raise funds. He used some of the funds to buy a 7-seater Toyota that allowed him to rescue trapped families and transport them to safety.

In collaboration with the the Primates of the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia, Archbishop Justin said he had "deep respect for their sacrifice."

The 24th February 2022 saw Russian tanks roll across the border after weeks of threats. Within days, aid workers landed on Ukrainian soil to help provide relief to those that had already sustained serious injuries from missile attacks, or helping refugees now fleeing their homes.

The tribute from the Anglican clergy said there was "no moral justification for Russia's illegal invasion of Ukraine" and applauded Christopher and Andrew for not "standing by" in the "face of such immoral aggression".

The group "demand Russia's immediate withdrawal and ceasefire," and called on all nations to contribute to "the subsequent healing and rebuilding of the sovereign nation of Ukraine."

The statement was signed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Most Rev Philip Richardson; Bishop of Waikato and Taranaki, Most Revd Don Tamihere and Revd Sione Ulu'ilakepa, Bishop-elect of Polynesia.

Primus thanks departing First Minister for pandemic commitment

Commenting on the First Minister's decision to step down from her position, the Most Rev Mark Strange, Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, said: "Nicola Sturgeon has dedicated much of her life to public service as a local politician, a national political leader and on international political platforms.

"As Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, I was acutely aware of the pressure that the Covid pandemic placed upon us all and I was thankful that throughout that time the First Minister enabled regular and at times difficult conversations to take place between Government and church leaders and leaders across faith groups. "May we all wish her a more restful time in the months to come."

Scottish Catholic Church warns against anti-Christian bias in public life

Scotland runs the risk of denying public service to people with "talent and ability" if people with strong Christian convictions are kept from public office, according to the spokesperson for the country's Catholic Church, Charles Collins writes in Crux.

Scottish Finance Secretary Kate Forbes is running to replace Scotland's First Minister Nicola Sturgeon, who announced she was resigning on Feb. 15.

However, Forbes – a member of the Free Church of Scotland – has come under fire for her personal belief in traditional marriage norms, including saying having children outside of marriage "would be wrong according to my faith."

She addressed the concerns in a post she published Thursday on her social media platforms.

"I feel greatly burdened that some of my responses to questions in the media have caused hurt, which was never my intention as I sought to answer questions clearly. I will defend to the hilt the right of everybody in Scotland, particularly minorities, to live and to live without fear or

harassment in a pluralistic and tolerant society," Forbes wrote.

"I will uphold the laws that have been won, as a servant of democracy, and seek to enhance the rights of everybody to live in a way which enables them to flourish. I firmly believe in the inherent dignity of each human being - that underpins all ethical and political decisions I make," she said.

In an interview with The Herald, Catholic Church spokesperson Peter Kearney claimed that in Scotland's "pursuit of diversity we have embraced conformity."

"There is absolutely an intolerance of certain types of difference. We are less tolerant of people's religious orientations. Some of the things that have been said about religious opinions leave a lot of Catholics and a lot of Christians feeling marginalized," he told the Scottish daily publication.

"Human rights law describes certain 'protected characteristics', among them: Race, gender and sexual orientation, which cannot be used as a basis for discrimination. It is important that we remember religion is also a protected characteristic, deserving of respect," Kearney said.

"If someone was deemed unsuited to office on the basis of any other protected characteristic there would, quite rightly, be outraged and indignant reactions. As a society we will be guilty of hypocrisy if we don't defend everyone's right to freely hold, manifest and express their religious beliefs," he told the newspaper. **Church News Ireland**

He brought up the recent Gender Recognition Reform Bill, which would have made it easier to obtain a Gender Recognition Certificate, which is legal recognition of a change in birth gender, including lowering the age to receive such a certificate to 16.

Most of the major parties in Scotland – including the ruling Scottish National Party (SNP), Labour, Greens and Liberal Democrats – refused to allow members to vote their conscience on the bill. The legislation passed, but was later blocked by the national government in London.

"The political parties should have allowed a free vote on the Gender Recognition Reform Bill. It is a very obvious example of a contentious moral issue," Kearney told The Herald.

"The danger here of not allowing individuals to vote according to their conscience is that it will dramatically reduce the pool of people who want to go into parliament. People will believe their views won't be respected. We run the risk of denying ourselves people with talent and ability," he told the newspaper.

"We do have evidence that this debate is leaving people feeling very, very uncomfortable," he continued, citing a poll by a Catholic group on the issue.

"It's difficult to imagine anyone entering elected politics who didn't have 'deeply held views', whether they are economic, social, environmental or religious views shouldn't matter.

What matters is that they don't impose those views on others, but instead respect differences," he told The Herald.

"Previously this was possible by political parties allowing certain moral matters such as: Abortion, same sex marriage and assisted suicide, to be treated as matters of conscience, where parliamentarians were permitted to vote freely in accordance with their conscience. This was an example of tolerance, sadly it has given way to conformity in politics," he said.

Despite the controversy in the media over Forbes's religious beliefs, she has the most support in the first poll of SNP voters. She is the preferred choice of 28 percent of party members. Scottish Health Secretary Humza Yousaf has 20 percent, and former Minister for Community Safety Ash Regan has 7 percent.
