



15,000 victims of rape and sexual assault receiving support in NI

It is estimated that one in four people suffer sexual abuse in their lifetime. We know this includes men and women across Northern Ireland, ranging in age from babies to people in their 90s.

the grounds of Antrim Hospital to speak to staff helping victims on a daily basis.

We have mapped the home postcode district of almost 14,000 people supported by Nexus over the last six years. Our map illustrates the scale of abuse inflicted on people living in towns and cities across Northern Ireland.

Some sought help shortly after being raped or assaulted but for many it was years or even decades before they spoke out about what had happened to them.

High profile cases like the serial abuse carried out by TV presenter Jimmy Savile have brought the issue into sharp public focus.

But, despite more open public debate, we know that our map gives only a snapshot of the true impact of sexual abuse here. For many victims, their abuse will remain a secret known only to them and their perpetrator.

More than 1,100 people have been supported by Northern Ireland's sexual assault referral centre since it opened its doors in May 2013.

The Rowan, based in the grounds of Antrim Hospital, is jointly funded by the Department of Health and the PSNI.

NUI Galway Study on violence against women world-wide

Some 4,500 women in conflict zones and poor communities are to be asked to detail their life experiences as part of an international project to count the cost of violence against them.

Belfast Telegraph - In-depth interviews are planned with survivors of rape, torture and abuse in Ghana, Pakistan and South Sudan to calculate personal losses and the price family households, local communities and countries ultimately pay.

Dr Nata Duvvury, lead researcher and co-director of Centre for Global Women's Studies at the National University of Ireland Galway (NUI Galway), said the study could drive ideas on preventing abuse.

"Violence against women and girls is a global issue. We need an immediate, pragmatic,

informed and coherent response across nations," she said.

"We understand today, more than ever before, the debilitating impact it has on individuals, families and communities.

"What we now need to understand are the myriad impacts of violence on the economy and society, we can then identify which interventions need to be prioritised for the benefit of individuals and society as a whole."

The £1.5 million, three-year project, funded by the UK's Department for International Development, aims to shift the focus of violence against women away from domestic abuse to an assessment of the economic and social cost.

Ghana, Pakistan and South Sudan were chosen to represent fragile, conflict-hit or low-middle income states.

Archbishop Diarmuid Martin'appalled' by religious order delays

RTE.ie - Archbishop of Dublin Dr Diarmuid Martin has said he was appalled to hear of delays by some orders in fully implementing standards and guidelines of child protection.

The National Board for the Safeguarding of Children said seven of the nine orders it has just completed inspections on have a poor record of management, making any assessment of their current practice difficult.

The Catholic Church's child protection watchdog says opportunities to safeguard children were missed and known abusers allowed to remain in ministry in 1990s.

In a statement, Dr Martin said: "The failure of any single Church organisation to implement the common norms casts a shadow over the credibility of the entire Safeguarding efforts of the Catholic Church.

"Survivors trying to regain their confidence in the Church will be disillusioned once again.

"The many lay men and women who work voluntarily in Church safeguarding structures in our parishes must feel disheartened.

"Failure of any Church organisation to implement fully and robustly the agreed clear norms is a direct affront to the desire of Pope Francis, repeated only one week ago, when he wrote that."

In an Overview of its latest tranche of reviews, the Chief Executive of the National Board for the Safeguarding of Children in the Catholic Church, Teresa Devlin, says she's disappointed that most of the Orders have only been "bedding down" the whole area of safeguarding in the last couple of years.

Her spokesman said the following seven had significant problems: the Augustinians; The Passionists: The Discalced Carmelites; The

Franciscan Friars and Brothers; The Servites; and the Marist Fathers.

The Sacred Heart Fathers of Jesus and Mary and the Dominican Sisters complied well with child protection standards and have demonstrated their commitment to responding promptly to allegations of abuse.

Church body 'disappointed' at tardy compliance by orders

Irish Times - The failure by some male religious congregations to comply with the Catholic Church's own child protection guidelines has been criticised by the Church's own child protection agency in its latest review.

Teresa Devlin, chief executive of the Maynooth-based National Board for Safeguarding Children (NBSC) said: "I'm disappointed that, for the majority of Orders, the whole area of safeguarding is only being bedded down in the last couple of years."

She was referring to the Augustinians, Passionists, Franciscan Friars, Franciscan Brothers, the Servites, Discalced Carmelites, and Marist Fathers. She also found that where some congregations were concerned known abusers were allowed to remain in ministry in the 1990s while, when it came to delays in reporting abuse to civil authorities "for some practice did not improve until 2013."

Plan to draw up sanctions for bishops in abuse cases

Irish Times - The Holy See's Commission for the Protection of Minors officially acknowledged yesterday that one of the first issues it intends to address is "bishop accountability". Essentially, this entails the implementation of disciplinary sanctions against those bishops who cover up for abuser priests and who fail to impose zero-tolerance policies in their dioceses.

Since the emergence of the clerical sex abuse phenomenon 20 years ago, the Catholic Church has, slowly and with much difficulty, developed tough accountability measures for priests found to be sex abusers. Speaking at a UN hearing in Geneva a year ago, the Vatican's UN ambassador, Silvano Tomasi, pointed out that in the course of just two years, 2011 and 2012, Pope Benedict had "defrocked" nearly 400 priests for offences relating to child abuse.

St Mary's Convent is set on a hillside overlooking Christ the King Spiritual Life Centre, a ministry of our link Diocese of Albany. The sisters' ongoing witness to a life of prayer make Christ the King unique among conference centres of its kind in the United States.

The Community of St. Mary was founded in 1865 in New York City and is the oldest indigenous Religious Order in the Episcopal Church. Contemplative and Benedictine in ethos, the sisters of the Eastern Province centre their life together in corporate worship, personal discipline and study, and simple work – with mission flowing outward from this stable anchor.

The first profession was 150 years ago on the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. GB Churches launch flagship credit union



Clergy from churches in GB join the Archbishop of Canterbury in launching new credit union

CMCU - a UK wide Churches Mutual Credit Union LTD - was launched by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, at Church House, London He was joined by the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, John Chalmers and the President of the Methodist Conference, Ken Howcroft to celebrate their respective churches' collaboration in forming the flagship credit union.

CMCU is a joint drive to promote access to responsible credit and savings.

At least 60,000 individuals, notably ordained ministers, licensed lay ministers, elders, employees and trustees of churches (e.g. Parochial Church Council members) and church charities are eligible to join, along with churches and Anglican and Church of Scotland charities as corporate members.

The CMCU will offer a range of savings and loan products and fairness will be at the heart of its values. Initially members will be able to invest in the 'Founder Member's Bond' with ordinary savers accounts and loans becoming available in March. In due course CMCU will offer ISA savings accounts.

The Archbishop of Wales, Dr Barry Morgan, said, "The Church in Wales has a long-standing interest in credit unions, including helping to establish many, so we are very pleased to churchnewsireland@gmail.com

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welcome this addition to the credit union family in Wales.

"We hope it will strengthen the movement and encourage more people to make use of this local, ethical source of savings and loans."

Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori Lent Message 2015

Lent is a season of Christian reflection that begins on Ash Wednesday (February 18) and concludes on Easter (April 5). The Presiding Bishop also noted Lent is "a journey that is about enlightenment if we're willing to think about it that way."

The following is the Presiding Bishop's Lent Message 2015 -

Lent is about to begin. That word in English comes from an Old English word that means "to lengthen," and it's a reminder of the days getting

longer as we move toward summer out of the dark of winter.

But in a number of other languages, particularly Spanish and French, the word for "Lent" reflects "forty days," "cuaresma." Forty days of wandering in the desert, forty days of Jesus out in the desert.

It's also about a journey. And it's a journey that is about enlightenment if we're willing to think about it that way.

Lent is an ancient tradition of solidarity and preparation for those who look forward to Baptism at the Easter Vigil. It has always been a time for prayer and study, fasting, self-denial, and alms-giving, sharing what we have with those who do not have. Prayer is an opportunity to reflect on who walks with us in the desert, who brings light into the world. Study is an opportunity to do the same kinds of things looking at the history of our tradition, where have human beings found light and direction in their journey through this world. Fasting and selfdenial are an inward-reflection on what it is that keeps us in the dark, or what it is that keeps us directionless, or that keeps us overly selffocused. And it becomes an invitation to turn outward and share what we have with those who have not. To build solidarity among God's people and the rest of the earth.

One of the most memorable Ash Wednesdays I ever spent was in San Jose, Costa Rica, in a school for children. I was asked to place ashes on the foreheads of toddlers. It was a provocative experience in the deepest sense, reminding very small children that they are mortal.

That cross that comes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday is a reminder of the cross that's put there at Baptism. You are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own forever. The cross that comes at Ash Wednesday is a reminder that you are dust and to dust we shall return, that we share that dust with every other human being who has ever walked this planet, that we share that dust with the stars and the planets, that we share that dust with all that has been created. We are made for relationship with creator and creation.

Lent and cuaresma is a journey to walk toward that light. May it be a blessed one this year.

Reports on General Synod debate say Samuel Margrave, a lay member of the synod and local Labour councillor, asked whether, "the expensive, lavish, opulent cost of bishops' housing is good value for money". They state

that the 42 houses used by diocesan bishops had an average value of £2.26m in December 2013 and that 11 bishops still have chauffeurs, four who double up as gardeners. Andreas Whittam Smith, First Church Estates commissioner, said: "Nowhere in the Church, and this includes bishops, is there any excessive spending. People do the best they can, I think." *Times* mentions properties could be hit by Labour's proposed mansion tax.
