



Apostolic Nuncio visits St Killian's College, Garron Tower

The Apostolic Nuncio to Ireland, Archbishop Charles Brown, paid his first visit to Co Antrim on Wednesday 11th when he accepted an invitation to visit St Killian's College Garron Tower.

The New York native met pupils and staff on his arrival before concelebrating Mass for the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes in the school chapel. He then addressed the student body in the Gym, before joining staff and invited guests for lunch.

Archbishop Brown was joined on altar by Bishop Noel Treanor, Fr Tim Bartlett (chairman of the Board of Governors) and a number of former students of Garron Tower including Frs David Delargy, Martin and Eugene O'Hagan (aka The Priests) and Fr Dermot McKay and Fr Darren Brennan from the Parish of Ballymena.

Archbishop Brown in his homily spoke of the young age of both Mary and of Bernadette in Lourdes when they were called to God's ministry, not much different from the ages of the students in front of him. He made reference to the former students of Garron Tower who were now ministering in the Church, including the priests concelebrating the Mass and Bishop Donal McKeown of Derry and Fr Paddy Delargy both of whom attended later in the afternoon. They all most likely got their calling to God's ministry at a young age as well.

He noted the College motto "Caritas et Veritas" – Nurturing and Truth – and asked the students to

be mindful of this motto in their lives both at present and in the future.

During the celebration of Mass, Archbishop Brown commissioned the new St Killian's College prayer which had been composed by Junior students of the College earlier this year. He expressed his pleasure that young people were taking ownership of the spiritual direction they were receiving in St Killian's.

Mr Jonny Brady, Principal of St Killian's College said...

"This is an historic day in the life of the young St Killian's College (founded 2010) and we are honoured to have Archbishop Brown among us to officially commission our new school prayer. We as a staff and a student body have been impressed by his interest in us and I am sure that this day will live long in the hearts and memories of those who were present."

Fr Tim Bartlett, Chairman of the Board of Governors, said ...

"To have the representative of Pope Francis visit St Killian's is a tremendous honour but also a comment on the very high regard in which this outstanding educational community, led by the Principal Mr Brady, is held. "The Nuncio was clearly moved by the prayerfulness of the pupils, by the outstanding music of the choir and the beautiful surroundings. It was a truly great day for the whole school and for the Church on the Antrim Coast. I warmly congratulate all those involved, especially the young women and men of St Killian's who did themselves very proud today."

The Nuncio was presented with College cuff links and a specially commissioned wooden ciborium, carved by past pupil Robert O'Connell from a branch that had fallen during a storm from a 160 year old Eucalyptus tree in the College grounds, the oldest of the species in Europe.

Irish Language Bill is 'lifted from PIRA aims' - C of I cleric

A Church of Ireland clergyman has voiced concerns that Sinn Fein's use of Irish through the departments of education and culture are a continuation of the Provisional 1996 constitution.

News Letter - Rev Alan Irwin from Co Fermanagh said: "Even my friends and family who are fluent Irish/Gaelic speakers are concerned by SF's Irish Language Act proposals."

He said the proposals are "a political tool" in SF's hands. "We already live in a multilingual society where many languages are spoken, taught and learnt. Why can Irish not be taught in schools like every other language?



"But SF want to elevate Irish above all other languages – as demonstrated by its efforts to create an Irish language medium secondary

school in Limavady for 14 pupils against the advice of all educational bodies.

"The IRA constitution has as one of its objectives: 'To promote the revival of the Irish language as the everyday language of the people'. This has never been revoked and was updated in only 1996."

His concern is that if the act is introduced that it will be used "to erode other languages and elevate Irish as a political tool – the continuation of the IRA's objective".

"My concern is that the IRA's objective is still the driving force behind Sinn Fein."

Has Martin McGuinness blocked John O'Dowd's proposed abolition of the Catholic certificate?

Mick Fealty on Slugger OToole - The Catholic Certificate in Religious Education also just happens to represent a key argument in the continued independence of St Mary's College, where almost all new teachers for the Catholic maintained schools system are trained.

At the same time, the Sinn Fein TD MP for West Belfast Paul Maskey, where St Mary's College is situated, has challenged the Catholic educated Minister for Higher Education Stephen Farry in his determination to close St Mary's on the grounds of cuts imposed on his department by Mr Maskey's own political colleague Mr McGuinness.

Mr Farry is not a political relative of either Mr McGuinness or Mr O'Dowd, but he does want to amalgamate the college with its apparently estranged half sister college Stranmillis. Mr Maskey (who has no direct influence at either Stormont or Westminster) is currently

challenging Minister Farry's mandate with <u>a very</u> guite large petition.

Church of Scotland 'challenge poverty Sunday'

Congregations of the Church of Scotland are being asked to think, pray and act to challenge poverty this Sunday, February 15th.

The call to members of the Church to focus on issues of poverty, inequality, justice and hope follows a report made to the 2014 General Assembly on the impact of welfare reforms on poorer people, and what measures local churches are taking to respond to social need.

The Church of Scotland has for many years identified a Gospel bias to the poor and has directed work and resources to be focused on working alongside the most deprived parishes in Scotland. Along with ecumenical, interfaith and civic partners, the Church of Scotland has

supported the work of Scotland's Poverty Truth Commission, which helps bring together political decision makers with people who have direct experience of living in poverty.



This coming Sunday 15 February churches across the country are encouraged to include prayers and information about action to challenge poverty. It's about justice, as well as charity.

Every day this week people living in some of Scotland's poorest neighbourhoods are sharing their stories of hope and love on the Priority Areas blog on the Church of Scotland website.

Worship, prayer, advocacy and further resources have been published by Church Action on Poverty.

Pilgrim Course addressing "urgent task" for the church – Archbishop of Canterbury

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby has spoken about the *Pilgrim Course*'s growing role in bringing people to faith ahead of the formal launch of the final two new books of the Church of England's national discipleship series, which have been published this week.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, said:

"The Pilgrim Course has been used wonderfully by God both to bring people to faith in Jesus Christ and to enable them to grow as his disciples. It is my prayer that the complete course will continue to be an effective tool for the Church as it seeks to fulfil, in God's grace, the urgent task of making disciples - so that the light of Christ may shine in every corner of this land through all who follow him."

The books were launched by Archbishop Justin during the Church's General Synod, on a day which saw debate about the increasing role that discipleship can play in the future growth of the Church.

The Archbishop also appears in new online videos published to complement each session, featuring in sessions talking about the Bible and the impact that it has had on his life.

The new materials, which look at *The Bible* and the *Church and Kingdom*, complete the course which has been published over the course of 18 months for use with enquirers and new Christians.

The final books see a wide range of contributions from writers including the Very Revd Vivienne Faull, Dean of York; the Bishop of Manchester, David Walker; and John Preston, the Church of England's National Stewardship Officer.
