IFA & Methodist Mission's NI Street League Football Relaunch

NI Ireland Street League has been relaunched as Street Soccer NI. The relaunch event took place at Skainos on the Newtownards Road and was attended by the Lord Mayor of Belfast Nichola Mallon who took time out to chat to the players about the project and their experiences. Nichola has been a consistent supporter of the project

and it meant a lot to the team that she attended and spoke so passionately about homelessness.

Street Soccer NI uses football to create change in some of the most marginalised communities, including the homeless. It runs football leagues, coaching sessions, education and training programmes, and provides volunteer opportunities. Participants include people who are homeless or have been homeless, people with mental health issues, addiction issues, refugees and asylum seekers, and other disadvantaged groups. The charity uses football as a hook to support positive change in players' lives, develop role models and leaders, and create better communities.

Each year Street Soccer NI selects the NI team for the Homeless World Cup, puts them through a training programme, and brings the team to compete in the event. The Homeless World Cup gives opportunities to people who have experienced homelessness a chance to use the power of football to re-energise their lives. Teams from over 65 countries compete in the international football event, which has been running now for the last 11 years.

In October 2014 Team NI competed in the Homeless World Cup in Santiago Chile. The

players trained hard for the event and it paid off when they won the Accion Totale Cup in an exciting final against Denmark! All players from the team are now living in their own homes and several have completed their coaching badges with the IFA and are now role models for others. Padraig McKissock was Northern Ireland's top scorer and he has now been signed by Bangor FC! This year the competition takes place in Amsterdam. With the help of supporters, volunteers, staff and players another team will travel to compete in the competition.

Last year's team Captain Brendan Kingsmore said: "Football brings me a different level of happiness. I care more about my life thanks to football. I literally owe my life to football".

Irish FA Director of Football Development, Michael Boyd, who is a Coach Mentor for Street League said: "The Homeless World Cup is a celebration of all our hard work with partners such as the East Belfast Mission over the last four years providing football, health and education opportunities for some of the most marginalised men in Northern Ireland. NI Street League is making history, with the participants acting as strong ambassadors for smashing the stigma of homelessness." Street Soccer NI is a project of the Irish Football Association and East Belfast Mission.

The Dining Room was officially one year old on February 24. The outreach project of Christ Church, Dun Laoghaire is celebrating its first

anniversary all this week with many visitors coming to the parish hall to see what developments have taken place over the past 12 months. The project is supported by teams of volunteers from all walks of life who provide a hot home cooked lunch to homeless people, the elderly and those experiencing food poverty and The Dining Room was the brainchild of the Vicar of Christ Church, Dun Laoghaire, the Revd Ása Bjork Ólafsdottir who is delighted with the way the first year has gone. "What a year it has been, lots of new friends, lots of interesting food, healthier patrons, and a true sense of the community working together," she commented.

She paid tribute to all the volunteers and all who donate food to the project. They have seen people blossom in the Dining Room and some people who had been patrons have become volunteers.

Yesterday, as the celebrations got underway, Archbishop Michael Jackson dropped in for lunch. Also present were local public representatives including Cllrs Patricia Stewart and Mary Fayne and Deputy Mary Mitchell O'Connor.

Cllr Stewart outlined plans for a new premises for a community café in Dun Laoghaire which would be open daily and for longer hours. The parish hall can only accommodate the Dining Room for three lunchtimes each week. The need for such a facility was identified by the local policing forumsome time ago, the councillor stated. Ása, who is now a member of the policing forum, also saw the need for somewhere for people to go and set about establishing the Dining Room. She plans to retain a presence with the new venture and ensure that the ethos that has been nutured at the Dining Room is maintained.

The Dining Room is open for lunch between 12.00 noon and 2.00 pm on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. All are welcome to drop in.

Portlaoise Solemn Novena marks parish church's 50 years

YouTube singing priest sensation, Fr Ray Kelly and the renowned composer and singer, Fr Liam

Lawton, will be among the guests participating at the Portlaoise Solemn Novena to Our Lady of Perpetual Help this year.

Bishop Denis Nulty of Kildare & Leighlin will celebrate the concluding Mass of the nine day novena.

Other speakers will relate their experiences dealing with addiction and battling with cancer.

There will be four Masses every day for nine days in the parish church and a school novena Mass at noon.

The Sacrament of Penance will be available on one particular day when priests will make themselves available from 6am to 12 midnight.

"The Novena is a traditional catholic format for praying. It lends itself very well into the season of Lent where we would notice a massive increase of people involved in certain practices to [help] grow [their] faith and renew their own faith commitment," Fr Paddy Byrne told Catholicireland.net.

"We are also focusing on the Lent penance exercises. We are very conscious of what the Holy Father is asking us to do in terms of providing opportunities for people to avail of this very important sacrament. We have invited priests to come on Friday 6 March," he said.

This year's novena is special because it coincides with the 50th anniversary of the parish church of Sts Peter and Paul, which according to Fr Byrne, is "iconic in the life of the people of Portlaoise".

It can facilitate large numbers for parish worship and there 'a great sense of ownership' by the people of Portlaoise.

On Monday 2 March, the Novena Mass at midnight will be a celebration for couples who were married in the church over the last 50 years and all are welcome.

Also this year the parish will see a change to the popular novena, with nine consecutive days this year instead of the nine weeks of previous years.

John Bruton, former Taoiseach is a speaker as is Brenda Drumm, who is well known for her work with in Catholic Communications, but who will speak about her own personal battle against cancer. Robert Parker will speak about his experience of recovery from addiction.

"He is giving a great testimony of hope," said Fr Paddy Byrne. "It is important to have speakers who will not just talk the talk but walk the walk as well."

TV and radio personality, Hector O'hEochagain returns this year and local rapper Wally O'Loughlin will also put in an appearance.

The parish has issued the invitation to for people to come and "give thanks for a faith community that is dynamic, alive and very active".

At the time of going to print and several days before the Novena began, some 5,000 petitions for prayers had already been handed in.

The Novena runs from Saturday 28 February to Sunday 8 March.

Fr Tony Flannery at the ACI Meeting in Belfast – Can the Catholic Church Survive in Ireland?

On Saturday 21 February Fr Tony Flannery spoke at a meeting of the <u>Association of Catholics in</u> <u>Ireland (ACI)</u> at the Duncairn Centre for Culture and Arts in Belfast.

Gladys Ganiel - Flannery's topics were "The urgent reforms needed in the Catholic Church,

and where Pope Francis stands on them" and "Reflections on the growth of the Catholic reform movement around the world; its strengths and weaknesses". (Audio from the event is on the ACI website.)

More than 60 people from Belfast, Bangor, Ballymoney, Ballymena, Larne, Coleraine, Armagh, Carrickfergus, Donegal, Mayo, New York and Cyprus attended the event.

Flannery, a Redemptorist, has been put out of ministry by the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith over articles he wrote for the Redemptorist magazine *Reality,* which dealt with women priests and teachings on contraception and homosexuality.

In an interview with William Scholes in the *Irish News* in advance of the event, Flannery said:

What they objected to in particular was that I suggested– and we have to remember that this was in the middle of the clerical sex abuse crisis – that the priesthood as we have it now is not as Jesus intended it to be."

In his interview with Scholes, Flannery had linked reforms to the very survival of the Catholic Church in Ireland: "In Ireland in 10 to 15 years' time there will be very few priests left. Without priests you won't have the Mass, and the Mass is central to the life of the Christian, so something has to be done about that. ... It is clear now that the notion of confining priesthood to male celibate people does not work anymore. That has to be changed. Priesthood has to be opened to married people – initially to married men, and then gradually also, women. That has to happen if the Church is to survive."

Freedom of the City to be given to two former church leaders

A proposal to confer the Freedom of Derry on two former church leaders has been passed by the outgoing members of Derry City Council. Derry Journal - The suggestion by the SDLP was passed at a meeting of the Council's elected representatives at the Guildhall.

A meeting to to formalise the conferral of the honour on both men will be held soon. Derry City Council will cease to exist at the beginning of April under the Review of Public Administration and will merge with neighbouring Strabane to become Derry City and Strabane District Council. The move was proposed by SDLP Councillor, John Boyle.

Mr Boyle said: "On behalf of the SDLP I asked that Derry City Council consider conferring the honour of Freedom of the City on the two former Bishops as soon as is practicably possible and that a Special Council meeting be arranged to consider the proposal. It is my understanding that the formalities of the process can be put in place relatively quickly and that Derry City Council can accord the distinction as one of the last official acts in its history. We believe that this would be a fitting tribute to both men, if that were to be the case."

"Given their undoubted commitment to religious and civic life in our city over the past decades the SDLP believe that two Bishops would be extremely worthy recipients of this honour. Bishop Daly and Mehaffey are admired throughout Derry. Their contribution to many aspects of life in our city and their unfailing belief in peace building and reconciliation over the years has been immense. It is both right and proper that they be recognised in this way."

Growing a Food Justice Movement in Scotland

Food justice and how to prevent people going hungry in Scotland will be discussed at a conference organised by the Church of Scotland and partner agencies on Saturday 28 February at the Pearce Institute, Govan Road, Glasgow.

The number of individuals and families relying on food banks and other forms of emergency food aid has increased, the impact of welfare reform is being strongly felt by those affected and food prices have risen with the most impact on the poorest in society.

The conference organised by the Church of Scotland's Church and Society Council, Faith in Community Scotland and the Centre for Human Ecology, seeks to explore food poverty and to create a movement eliminating it.

Rachel Gray, from the STOP movement in Canada, will speak about how Canadians have worked on alternatives, to resist food banks being accepted as a normal part of civilised society.

Key areas to be discussed include: Food banks are an important response to the crisis, and volunteers working in them are making an outstanding contribution to their <u>churchnewsireland@gmail.com</u> Page 19 communities. How did the need for food banks increase so dramatically and how can we avoid normalising emergency food aid as voluntary safety net?

Communities and individuals who are at risk of food poverty are well-placed to lead their own responses to it and are experts in their own experience. Could community-led responses be a key part of increasing food security:initiatives such as local food hubs, community shops, food co-operatives and community gardens and allotments?

How can we move from meeting immediate needs to campaigning to change the systems that create these needs, towards food justice, in which the human right to food and health is combined with sustainable food production, education and employment? Are there good examples of how to achieve this?

Our food system is not sustainable, with unhealthy food widely advertised and consumed leading to costly public health problems. How can we make the transition to an ecologically and socially just food system?

Self-harm brings 35 to casualty every day, says report

There were more than 12,000 attendances at hospital emergency departments in Northern Ireland in the past financial year for self-harm and suicidal thought. More than 35 people are attending Northern Ireland emergency departments every day because of self-harm or suicidal thoughts, new research has revealed. The influx is being fed by images of self-harm which are regularly being shared on social media in the belief that physical pain helps young people cope with emotional pain, campaigners warned.
