Volunteers needed for Friendship House

Presbyterian Women are looking for volunteers for Friendship House, their community project in Sandy Row, Belfast

Volunteers are needed to help run and develop their



programmes for next year, starting in September. South Belfast Friendship House is situated in Blythe Street and is committed to providing a Christian witness in the Sandy Row community.

It is ideally situated on a residential street adjacent to shops, factories and other community facilities. It is a place in which fellowship and support are available. The work undertaken in the House continues to grow and develop The After School Club, the Young Mums' Group and the Older People's Work all aim to improve the quality of life for the people in this area of South Belfast. The staff of the House also reach out into the community by offering friendship to the residents of a neighbouring Men's Hostel.

In the early days of South Belfast Friendship House, the PWA was responsible for its management and funding. In 2004 the Board of Social Witness also became involved in the management of the House.

South Belfast Friendship House is now funded and managed by PW, in partnership with the Board of Social Witness. It continues to have a crucial role in working with families in this area of South Belfast. It has been renovated and extended to include a new multipurpose room and was

reopened in March 2010 was by The Rt Hon The Lord Mayor, Councillor Naomi Long. The act of worship and Rededication was conducted The Rt Rev Dr Stafford Carson, Moderator of the General Assembly.

The House is managed by Deaconess <u>Jenny Robinson</u> with Eunice Moore, Senior Project Worker, and Natalie Johnston, Youth and Children's Worker. A team of volunteers also help with the day-to-day activities.

It follows on form the 615pm Mass. The holy hour is to pray for the intentions of those affected by suicide, car crime and other social issues affecting the people of Belfast.


PCI link with Malawi hospital strong

The David Gordon Memorial Hospital (DGMH) in Livingstonia, Malawi has published its its first Newsletter of 2014, giving up-to-date information on the hospital's work.

It includes short reports on 'Christmas at the Hospital', 'Coping with Malaria Peak Season' and 'Shallow Wells Protection', as well as prayer requests.

PCI's <u>Dr Lyn Dowds</u> continues to serve as the main doctor at the hospital.

DGMH – one of five hospitals run by the



<u>Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP)</u> – is a 130 bed mission hospital, situated on top of the <u>Livingstonia Plateau</u>, in Northern Malawi not far from the western shores of <u>Lake Malawi</u>. There is no public transport add no paved road to the hospital, so getting supplies to DGMH is often difficult.

DGMH, like the CCAP's other mission hospitals, struggles to find the funding to meet its running costs. Over the years a number of PCI congregations, as well as individuals, have given generous support, which has been greatly appreciated by staff and patients alike. In the current difficult economic climate, the need for support is even more acute.

Myanmar became a member in 1914 and a 3-day Centennial celebration was launched in Yangon recently with the attendance of about 15,000 members across the country.

Mothers' Union is an international Christian Charity, founded in 1876 in the Church of England by Mary Sumner, to support families worldwide. It has more than 4 million members in 83 countries
