
Australian woman's pilgrimage to Connor Parish

He passed away six weeks before his only daughter and Sophie's grandmother, Alanee Gilbert Potter, was due to be delivered.

Sophie said it was a humbling and emotional day for her and her host, cousin Davide, who joined her on the trip.

"When I first arrived at Grandpa Potter's grave site I was overcome with so many emotions," she said.

"I didn't only mourn for me, I mourned for the rest of my family, especially for my Nan, who never had the opportunity to meet her own father."

Sophie said she had dreamt of visiting Ireland and "meeting" her grandfather since she was young.

"When I was about 12-years-old, my Nan one day explained to me what had happened to her Dad, and it was from her stories that I had the idea to do an exchange, ideally to Ireland," she said.

"As the years went on, I obviously kept that dream but instead have taken part in an Italian exchange.

"Although I love Italy passionately and it has become my second home, upon arriving in Ireland I felt like I had truly arrived home."

Sophie said visiting the cemetery and her great-grandfather was the "cherry on the cake" of her Irish visit, but leaving the cemetery she experienced the most touching moment.

The taxi driver who escorted the pair back to their tour group in Belfast was particularly interested in their Eglantine Church visit, and gave her an offer she couldn't refuse.

"After explaining the reason for our visit, he was so moved he asked permission to visit great-grandpa Potter's grave site on Remembrance Day and in future, on special occasions such as Anzac Day," she said.

Is Christ divided?

Theme for week of prayer for christian unity 2014

CTBI in its advance notice comments - Is Christian disunity a scandal before God? Or is it something we have grown accustomed to, as though it were a creaky door that we never seem to get around to fixing? St Paul's words challenge us as we reflect upon this question. To suggest that disunity is something acceptable is declaring that Christ himself is divided - and that really is a scandal!

2013 was the year in which churches from all inhabited continents of the world gathered in Korea for the 10th General Assembly of the World Council of Churches. We gathered for no other

reason than to declare to the world that our disunity is a scandal and that we will go on praying for and working for that unity which is God's gift to the church and to the world.

The Churches of French Canada have chosen for us a key biblical text of the ecumenical movement and have invited us to think about what our divisions say to the world and to each other about the Christian faith. They have also suggested that we use the Millennium Goals as a focus for our prayers for the world.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is traditionally observed from the 18th to the 25th January - the octave of St. Peter and St. Paul. However, some areas observe it at Pentecost or some other time. To allow for local decision making, the material has only the year on it and the days are denoted by the numbers one to eight, so you can use it at any time of year.

This year we are again continuing our partnership with Christian Aid which has provided *Go and Do* action points for each of the daily reflections - linking into the important work of Christian Aid in the relief of poverty and advocacy of justice.

Connor Children's Ministry development

Jill Hamilton has taken up the post of Children's Project Development Officer with Connor Diocese.

Jill grew up in Portadown, where she was a parishioner at St Mark's. She has a degree in Applied Economics from the University of Ulster, Jordanstown, and a PGCE in Secondary Education.



After graduating Jill volunteered with SAMS (South American Mission Society) in Paraguay, and it was in neighbouring Uruguay she met her husband Geoff, now Development Officer with SAMS.

"I had done some short term mission work with Operation Mobilisation in Europe and with Scripture Union in Zimbabwe. I really had a heart for going out and doing something overseas," Jill said.

Jill returned home after more than three years in Paraguay, and worked as a primary school teacher. She and Geoff lived in Co Londonderry for seven years and during this time Jill taught at Belmont House Special School where she specialised in working with children with autism.

When the couple moved back to Lurgan, Jill worked with the autism unit at the Southern Education and Library Board, and most recently has been working in administration with SAMS.

Looking forward to her new role with Connor Diocese, Jill said: "One of my

goals is to set up localised training for volunteers in children's ministry in our parishes. I also want to develop resources and ensure people can easily access these

"Initially I am hoping to make contact with clergy and with volunteers and youth leaders across the diocese. I want to establish what people's needs are and to tailor training and advise on resources to suit these needs.

"I also want to explore with parishes the development of different kinds of children's ministry such as homework clubs and breakfast clubs and other ways of doing children's ministry in a creative and fun way.

Jill said she considers children's ministry to be vital in the church. "It is a great way of linking to people in the community who

may not engage in church, and is an outreach opportunity to get parents and families into church in a non threatening way

"I hope to help parishes to provide a child centred approach, where children find learning

interesting and fun, and where they feel involved, important and valued."

The Bishop of Connor, the Rt Rev Alan Abernethy, said: "We are delighted to welcome Jill to facilitate children's ministry, something we have said for some time is a very high priority for the diocese. I am sure she will be a gift to us all."

RSCM course for churches with no choirs

The Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) has launched a new range of courses for church musicians and worship leaders to take place during 2014.

In addition to its already popular courses for organists and choristers, there will be new sessions for cathedral and collegiate organ scholars, worship leaders, and for churches with no choirs. A course for music group leaders is also being offered.

The new courses are taking place throughout the UK and are a response to changes in church worship. "Lift up your voice" - a day course for churches with no musical leadership - is taking place in Devon in March, and in Suffolk in April. These sessions are intended for those whether lay or ordained - who do not have the services of a regular organist or music director. "In many churches, responsibility for the music often falls to the minister or lay reader, and we know that a good number of them can feel out of their depth," says Rosemary Field, the RSCM's Head of Education. "This session will provide resources and creative ideas for celebrating the church seasons effectively." Booking for these closes in mid-January.

A new day course for instrumental group leaders is to be held in Coventry in June under the direction of Paul Leddington Wright, who is well known as a musical director for BBC TV's Songs of Praise, and as a composer and arranger. Intended for those leading groups of acoustic instruments, the session will explore

matters such as arranging, rehearsal techniques and the use of instrumental music in worship.

For the first time, the RSCM is offering a course for those taking up organ scholarships in cathedrals and collegiate churches. The session, based at Bristol Cathedral, will address practical skills such as accompaniment and managing a cathedral organ, administrative matters such as copyright, and the teaching of very young choristers.

This year's very concentrated short courses for organists will take place in Birmingham and Liverpool, led by Daniel Moult and Gerard Brooks respectively. The popular cathedral courses for boys, girls and young adults will be centred in 2014 at Lincoln Cathedral where participants

will sing a number of services, and receive vocal and musicianship tuition. As always, the Singing Course for Young People which takes place in Bath during August, continues to attract many choristers both from the UK andf urther afield. Alongside all these courses,training workshops and other courses are organised by the RSCM's area committees, as well as a new Residentiary Choir for adults, which will sing at a cathedral for a week each summer.
