Vicar-turned-DJ lied to quit 'exploitative' Gogglebox TV show

A Vicar has admitted lying to escape the "exploitative" television show Gogglebox.

The **Rev Kate Bottley**, who is now a BBC Radio 2 DJ, said she and her husband Graham told Channel 4 bosses in 2016 they wanted a temporary break while their daughter took her GCSEs.

But the couple failed to mention they had no plans to return and did not appear on the show again.

The 50-year-old said she chose to leave the programme because it "took over our life" and she was contractually barred from appearing on other TV shows. "There was stuff coming in that I wanted to have a go at that I just wasn't able contractually to do," she said.



"It so happened that it came around the time Ruby was doing her GCSEs so the excuse we gave was 'We're going to take some time away while she does her exams'."

Bottley has since become a familiar face on radio and television, which funds her ministry in the Church of England. "I wish I'd known how much it took over our life for two-and-a-half years," she told the Walking the Dog podcast. "It's reality TV, it's by its nature consensual exploitation.

"So they come into your home. They're filming in your home – it was quite intrusive really. But we consented to that intrusion, but I didn't fully know just how."

She revealed her children sat in their bedrooms every Tuesday and Thursday night during filming.

"My kids didn't have friends round for a lot [of the time], didn't have help with their homework. Things like that. And we got paid very little. So all the money we got from it went on the electricity, the internet connection that they were using, and the food to be hospitable to six [crew] people in my home two nights a week.

'It was a good two-and-half years but it got to the point where we were overwhelmed'

"It was a good two-and-a-half years but we couldn't have done any more. It got to the point where we were just a bit overwhelmed."

The Rev Bottley was vicar of Blyth, Scrooby and Ranskill in Nottinghamshire when she first appeared on Gogglebox in 2014.

Ecumenical Decade of Climate Justice Action launched

The World Council of Churches has launched a ten-year Ecumenical Decade of Climate Justice Action, bringing together voices from across six continents.

The Anglican Communion was represented at the event, with Archbishop Julio Murray, Chair of the Anglican Communion Environmental Network, presiding over the plenary session. The Revd Dr Rachel Mash also spoke powerfully on the urgent need for Christian climate action, calling climate change "the human rights issue of our time."

The session concluded with a strong call for churches to move from charity to justice, and from words to action.

Bishop of Blackburn calls out Church's silence on grooming gangs



The bishop of Blackburn has said Church of England leaders have been "collectively silent" on the issue of grooming gangs, despite having local knowledge and hearing "rumours, stories and concerns".

Writing in The Church of England Newspaper, Bishop Rt Rev Philip North, reflected on Baroness Louise Casey's recent report, which found: authorities had "shied away from" addressing ethnicity in grooming gang investigations.

He admitted that, like many others, he had "said nothing", and asked: "Why did I so readily believe the voices that claimed that calling for an inquiry was a collusion with the far right?"

He acknowledged the tension Church leaders feel between addressing difficult issues and preserving important interfaith relationships.

Bishop North also addressed a perceived disconnect between the Church and working-class communities, warning, ignoring their concerns on topics like grooming, immigration and energy costs risks creating a political vacuum, saying: "We are either silent or actively at odds with the issues that most trouble working-class neighbourhoods."

He concluded by encouraging other church leaders to examine their own "fear-driven silence" and consider the Church's responsibility to listen and respond more courageously.

NI Education Minister explores system in Orange county...



The release of newly recovered census transcripts is allowing

people with an interest in family history to delve even further into their past!



The Virtual Record Treasury of Ireland (VRTI) has just released 175,000 new historical records, including 60,000 pre-and-post famine names for citizen researchers to explore online.

Led by Trinity College Dublin and supported by the Department of Culture, Communications and Sport, the VRTI brings together historians, computer scientists, archivists, and librarians, who are working to digitally recreate Ireland's public record office and its collections, which were destroyed by a fire in 1922.

Pictured above inspecting transcriptions of the destroyed 19th-century census are Zoë Reid, Keeper of Manuscripts, National Archives, Ireland and Brian Gurrin, Population and Census Specialist, Virtual Record Treasury of Ireland. Uncovered amongst the records are notebooks containing names of two households, transcribed from the 1841 census for Headford, County Galway (image 2), and transcriptions made by genealogists and historians of the 19th-century census, as well as one of only four surviving volumes of 1821 census returns (both image 3) To read more and to search the digital records for yourself, visit the link in our bio!





Mel Gibson walks Mount Athos, the Holy Mountain in Greece

A devout Christian's pilgrimage to Orthodoxy's stronghold. "I have never felt a connection to God anywhere like I did here."

Hollywood icon, devout Christian, and filmmaker Mel Gibson has arrived at the revered **Hilandar Monastery on Mount Athos, Greece**—the heart of Orthodox spirituality. According to Sputnik, Gibson will spend several days immersed in the sacred life of the Holy Serbian Imperial Lavra, one of the most profound spiritual strongholds of the Orthodox world.

This is not just a visit—it is a pilgrimage.

Welcomed warmly by the brotherhood of monks, Gibson described his journey to the "Holy Mountain" as life-changing.

"I have never felt a deeper connection to God than I do here," he humbly shared.

For Orthodox Christians worldwide, Gibson's journey is a powerful reminder of the timeless call to return to the roots of faith, silence, and prayer. In a world of noise, Mount Athos remains a beacon for the soul—a place where heaven and earth meet.

Gibson's reverence for Orthodoxy and his search for truth bring global attention to the sacred treasures of our faith.

China's Iran Strategy - Bloomberg

With the US-brokered ceasefire between Israel and Iran holding, attention has shifted to what the conflict

means for China and the balance of power between Washington and Beijing, Edward Johnson writes in Bloomberg Weekend.

President Xi Jinping has strengthened ties with Tehran in recent years, welcoming it into the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) in 2023 and then BRICS — bolstering both groups' ability to challenge US power on the world stage. And as a net importer of crude oil with growing economic ties in the Middle East, China has a lot at stake in the region.

The conflict presents Xi with an opportunity to style himself as more of a stabilizing force than the Trump administration. China will "primarily use the situation as a way of painting the United States as the unreliable global partner," John Liu, who oversees Bloomberg's China coverage from Beijing, told the [Big Take Asia podcast]

The risk to China's energy security also appears to be contained, with Donald Trump giving Beijing the green light to continue buying oil from Iran, despite US sanctions. China gets about 14% of its crude from Iran, and about 45% of its oil imports pass through the Strait of Hormuz – which remains open despite Tehran's threat of a blockade.

All of that is positive for China. But its decision to stay on the sidelines, other than [condemning] the US and Israeli strikes, risks undermining the appeal of aligning with Beijing. Meanwhile, the B2 bomber strikes showed the US remains the "only global power with reach anywhere in the world," Liu said.

Last week, China hosted a meeting of SCO defense ministers that included Iran's Aziz Nasirzadeh. Xi will miss the July 6-7 BRICS summit in Rio de Janeiro, however, an absence that will do little to help him expand China's global influence via the bloc.

While some commentators suggest the conflict has another potential silver lining for China – distracting Washington from strategic competition with Beijing in the Asia-Pacific – it's unlikely to impact China's long-term calculations on Taiwan and the South China Sea. The Trump administration has signaled quite clearly it's not going to take its eye off the region, according to Jenni Marsh, who leads Bloomberg's economic and government

"For Xi Jinping, the calculation of his ambitions around Taiwan probably are much more long-term," she told a panel discussion at a Bloomberg event last week in Hong Kong. The Iran conflict "does not mean that China would invade Taiwan because Trump is caught up somewhere else."

Heritage

Margaret Teresa Pender

Poet and Author. - Margaret Pender was born Margaret Teresa Doherty in 1848 in Ballytweedy, County Antrim.

Her parents were farmer, Daniel, and Margaret Doherty (née White). Her father was from a poor Catholic background, and her mother was from a wealthier Presbyterian family.

Margaret was the youngest daughter of the couple's 7 children.

There was a literary and nationalist tradition in the family, her maternal grandfather, William White, and her mother were poets. Margaret started to write verse from a young age. She was educated at home, as well as



attending Ballyrobin National School and Convent of Mercy, Belfast. She trained to be a teacher, and taught for a short time in Aghagallon.

She married Hugh Owen Pender, a printer, in 1869 and moved to Belfast. She was published in the Shamrock, the Belfast Morning News and The Nation, winning a number of poetry competitions. She wrote under the pseudonyms "Marguerite", "Colleen", and "M.T.P.". She also wrote serialised novels and short stories.

In 1916, her novel O'Neill of the Glen was the source material for the first indigenous Irish film, O'Neil of the Glen (1916). The film was the first work of the Film Company of

Ireland, and was adapted for the screen by W. T. Lysaght. Margaret Pender died at her home 7 Newington Street, Belfast, on 17th, March 1920. She had three daughters and two sons. Photo courtesy Northern Ireland Historical Photographical Society EPC.
