The Charles Wood Singers return to Armagh for this year's Festival, bringing together a professional vocal ensemble made up of some of the finest singers from across these islands and beyond.



Under the direction of David Hill, the choir will feature in several of the week's major events.

Their appearances include Choral Evensong in St Patrick's Church of Ireland Cathedral on Tuesday 12th at 5.00pm, and a special BBC Radio 3 broadcast Evensong on Wednesday 13th at 4.00pm. They also feature in the Gala Concert on Friday 15th at 8.00pm, and the Festal Evensong





on Sunday 17th at 3.00pm, following Sung Mass that morning in St Patrick's Roman Catholic Cathedral.

Alongside public performances, the singers will take music into local care homes on Saturday 16th, and join forces with singers from all over Northern Ireland for our Community Prom on The Mall at 6.30pm.

Open rehearsals will take place in the Methodist Church Hall on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings at 10.00am, offering a behind-the-scenes look at the work of this outstanding ensemble.

We're also proud to share that two of their performances— Morning Worship for BBC Radio 4 and BBC Radio Ulster will be broadcast on Sunday 31st August.

Greatness often walks in quietly

One quiet morning in the late 1800s, a plainly dressed couple stepped off a train in Boston and made their way through Harvard's ivy-covered campus. They didn't arrive with fanfare or titles—just a sincere purpose and heavy hearts.

The woman wore a simple cotton dress, and her husband a modest suit. Without an appointment, they humbly asked to speak with the university's rector. The secretary, unimpressed by their rural appearance, let them wait for hours before finally—perhaps out of irritation—passing the request along.

Reluctantly, the rector agreed to see them for a few minutes, expecting little more than idle chatter. When the couple entered, he sized them up immediately: just another pair of country folk out of place among Harvard's refined halls. But then, the woman spoke with calm clarity. She explained they had lost their beloved son, who had studied at Harvard for a year and had cherished his time there. In his memory, they wanted to make a donation—perhaps even fund a building. The rector almost laughed. "A building?" he asked, masking his disbelief. "Do you have any idea how much a building costs? We've poured more than \$7 million into this place." He dismissed them with polite finality, certain they had no idea what they were talking about.

The woman turned to her husband with quiet resolve. "If that's all it takes to start a university," she said, "why don't we just build our own?" And that's exactly what they did. The couple—Leland and Jane Stanford—went on to establish Stanford University in 1891 in Palo Alto, California, naming it after their only son, Leland Stanford Jr. What Harvard overlooked became one of the world's greatest institutions. The story stands as a powerful reminder: greatness often walks in quietly, without titles or status, and the people most underestimated sometimes leave the most enduring legacies.

Bible of 'father of modern policing' set to go on show at new museum - Belfast Telegraph

A Bible which belonged to a man known as the father of modern policing is set to be among exhibits at a new museum planned for Belfast, Rebecca Black writes.

The Bible, which dates to 1608, belonged to Sir Robert Peel and will be the oldest item on display at the Museum of Policing for Northern Ireland.

It is hoped the museum will be completed and open to the public by autumn 2028.

It is to be run by a new charitable company within the grounds of the existing police headquarters at Knock Road in east Belfast.

The Board of Trustees is to include representatives from the PSNI, the Royal Ulster Constabulary George Cross Foundation and the Police Historical Society (NI), alongside a number of independent members yet to be appointed.

Some £5.5m has been set aside by the government to fund the building project, while a further £385,000 has been secured from the Part-Time RUC Reserve pension settlement.

Chief Constable Jon Boutcher said it will be a facility for the whole community.

"I am delighted that we will be able to progress the building of a new museum here at police headquarters," he said.

"The museum will offer cross-curricula and whole-life learning opportunities for schools, students, adults and community groups through exhibitions, educational programmes and engagement activities.

"This will be a facility that the whole community can enjoy as we highlight the ongoing role of policing in conflict resolution, reconciliation and keeping people safe."

Stephen White, of the RUC GC Foundation, said the stories of police officers will be preserved for future generations.

"The foundation is proud to support this project to make the important role of policing more accessible," he said.

"It will exhibit the service and bravery of police officers across the decades and ensure that their stories are preserved."

George Clarke, of the Police Historical Society (NI), added: "The Police Historical Society is delighted with plans for a new and fitting museum.

"The new facilities will enable us to present and preserve the many artefacts we hold relating to policing in Ireland.

"Our collection contains approximately 12,000 artefacts of a diverse nature, including uniforms, medals and other items telling the story of policing from 1814 to the present day; our oldest exhibit is a Bible from 1608, which belonged to Sir Robert Peel.

"We look forward to these being accessible to the wider public to illustrate the history of policing over more than 200 years."

Peel established the Metropolitan Police Force for London in 1829 at Scotland Yard with 1,000 constables. His name led to them being nicknamed 'bobbies' or 'peelers'.
